GOOD NOMINATIONS

Those Made by the Democracy of this County Last Saturday.

Democratic County Platform.

We are in favor of equal taxation, and the honest and economical administration of every branch of public affairs in Iosco County.

The democratic county convention was called to order at 10 o'clock last Saturday forenoon, by County Chairman Patterson, and Hon. C. R. Heary, of AuSable, was called to the chair as temporary chairman. M. Murphy, was elected temporary secretary.

The following committees were appointed by the chairman:
Permanent organization and order of business—J. W. Minor, S. Vaughn and George McKay.

Credentials—G. H. Cosgrove, John Scarlett and E. H. Hull.

Resolutions—E. H. Whedon, Daniel McElheron and John J. Jordan.

A recess was then taken until 12.30 p. m. to give the committees time to report.

Promptly at 12.30 Chairman Henry called the convention to order and the committee on credentials reported full delegations present from all the townships and wards excepting AuSable, Reno, Wilber and Baldwin townships.

The committee on permanent organization and order of business reported in favor of making the temporary officers permanent.

The committee on resolutions made their report which was very short and to the point. It will be found at the head of this article.

The reports of all the committees were accepted and adopted by a unanimous vote of the convention.

George H. Cosgrove, of Oscoda, and Peter C. Coldie, of Tawas township, were appointed tellers, and the officers of the convention duly sworn to the faithful discharge of their duties.

The next business taken up was the nomination of candidates, which was carried through in the most harmonious manner, and the following ticket was nominated.

The following resolution, which was unanimously adopted, fully explains the nomination of Mr. Sharpe for the office of Prosecuting Attorney.

WHEREAS, at this Democratic County convention, for the county of Iosco, Albert E. Sharpe, a staunch and uncompromising Republican, has been duly and regularly nominated to the office of Prosecuting Attorney. It is hereby

RESOLVED, that Charles R. Henry and Edwin H. Whedon be appointed a committee to wait upon Mr. Sharpe and advise him officially of his nomination, and inform him that in the judgement of this convention he has performed the duties of the office in the past, in a way commendable to the tax payers of the county. That there is no competent Democrat within the county who will accept the nomination and that this nomination is made with the distinct understanding that he is a Republican and made without any condition or proviso whatsoever from him in accepting the same. And be it

RESOLVED, that this nomination has not been in any way solicited by Mr. Sharpe, and is made because we believe it to be in the interest of economy and the good government of the county that he be nominated and elected.

RESOLVED, that a copy of these resolutions be given to Albert E. Sharpe, by the committee herein designated.

At the close of the convention Hon. R. J. Kelly, democratic candidate for congress addressed the convention and was most enthusiastically received. He commended the work of the convention in the highest terms.

The convention as a whole was one of the most harmonious and enthusiastic ever held by the democracy of Iosco county. The ticket nominated is admitted, even by its opponents, to be a strong one.

Crop Report.

The following Crop Report was issued by Secretary of State last Saturday.

The number of acres of growing wheat in the state last spring as returned by supervisors in the Farm Statistics was 1,730,224; the average yield per acre as found by threshing is 19.12 bushels, and the total yield in the state 33,683,261 bushels. The total yield is found by multiplying the number of acres in each county by the average per acre in the same county and footing the products. The average per acre in the southern counties is 19.36 bushels; in the central, 19.60 bushels; and in the northern, 15.02 bushels. These averages are based upon a return of 164,183 acres threshed in the southern counties, more than 28,000 in the central counties, and more than 10,000 in the northern counties. The average per acre in the state is 0.52 bushels, and in the southern counties, 0.55 bushels less than the September estimates.

It should perhaps be pointed out that the returns that will be made by supervisors next spring may show that the acreage actually harvested this year was less than above stated. The number of "acres harvested" as reported by supervisors the next spring after the harvest, is nearly always less than the "acres on the ground" reported in the spring preceding the harvest.

No further estimate of the wheat crop of the present year will be made by this department.

The total number of bushels of wheat reported by farmers since the September report was published is 2,154,384, and for two months, August and

September, 3,869,281. This is 231,249 bushels more than reported marketed in the same months last year.

Oats are estimated to yield 31.75 bushels per acre, barley 21 79 bushels, and corn 58 bushels of ears. The estimate for oats is from threshers' records. The estimates indicate that these are all full average crops. Corn was very generally harvested without damage by frost.

Potatoes are estimated to yield 68 per cent and beans 66 per cent of average crops. The estimate for potatoes indicates a very general belief that the crop has been badly damaged by drouth.

The percentages for winter apples are: Southern counties 47, central 77, northern 72, and state 56. One year ago winter apples were estimated at 11 per cent in the southern counties and 18 per cent in the state.

The percentages for late peaches are: Southern counties 82, central 73, northern 92, and state 81. One year ago the figures for the southern counties were 8, and state 12.

OUR COUNTY SCHOOLS

A FEW DON'T'S.

Don't let your pupils lean up. They should stand up.

Don't sweep your floor before school. Do it at night, so the dust can settle somewhere beside in the lungs of your pupils.

Don't be the last one to school in the morning, or the first one away at night.

Don't tell the Commissioner its all the fault of the previous teacher. He won't believe that at all.

Don't think because you have a second grade certificate, that there is nothing else for you to learn.

Don't neglect to have a large calendar in the room. If you are short of blackboard room put it on a large sheet of paper, and pin it above the blackboard.

Don't put up those pictures with tacks, when pins will do as well, are cheaper, and will not make unsightly holes in the plaster.

Don't neglect having an "Old Glory" some where in the room.

Don't neglect the Reading Circle work.

Don't think that you can afford to miss the Teachers' Association.

Don't forget to put some money aside for the trip to the State Teachers' Association, at Lansing, during the Holidays. It will cost you only ten dollars if you are careful, and for fifteen you can have as good a time as a representative at his first session.

Don't go before your class with a lesson so imperfectly mastered that you will have to keep your finger on the place in the book in order to be sure that the pupil gets it right.

Don't expect to dance all night and teach a first class school next day.

Don't grind a class in the technicalities of English grammar, when they cannot write a letter, and don't allow any one to delude you into the idea that a knowledge of grammar will make a pupil use good English in speaking or writing, and, don't think that arithmetic is the most important study in the cause, for, your father and my father, and you and I do not use arithmetic once where we use language ten thousand times, and when we do, it is almost always simple addition, subtraction, multiplication and division, with occasionally simple fractions.

Don't get along with insufficient blackboard space, when you can get dark window curtaining for fifteen cents per yard. Put it up on the wall, preferably with cloth behind it, although wide manilla paper, such as comes in long rolls will do admirably. It will take the crayon well, and erase well, and last a year with good treatment.

Don't neglect the ventilation, now the cold days are with us. Put a board under the sash and let the air enter between the upper and lower sash. That stops the draft, yet gives the air.

Don't let the little ones sit in seats so high that the little feet cannot reach the floor. Try it yourself about an hour if you don't believe it is hard on the feelings. Then do something for them. Put blocks of wood under the seats if you can do no better.

Don't think it a waste of good money to invest in a few stencils for your blackboard, and a few books to read to the children in the morning exercises, and at least two educational papers for your own benefit. Let one of these be our state journal, the Moderator, and, don't read your educational papers through and then put them aside without and further use of them, and don't try every new scheme for teaching that you see recommended in the educational papers. Think the thing over first; see if it is applicable to your school, make sure you understand it fully; then go ahead, and success to you.

Don't throw this aside after you have once read it through. Pin it up in the school room where you can glance at it once in a while. These things have been suggested to the Commissioner during his recent trip through the schools of the county. Our schools are have never seen a more prosperous outlook, nor had a better lot of teachers, and attention to these little things will help the work along.
