

The committee on resolutions made September, 3,869,281. This is 231,249 bushels more than reported marketed in the same months last year.

> Oats are estimated to yield 31.75 bushels per acre, barley 21 79 bushels, and corn 58 bushels of ears. The estimate for oats is from threshers' records. The estimates indicate that these are all full average crops. Corn was very generally harvested without damage by frost.

Potatoes are estimated to yield 68 per cent and beans 66 per cent of average crops. The estimate for potatoes indicates a very general belief that the crop has

been badly damaged by drouth. The percentages for winter apples are: Southern counties 47, central 77, northern 72, and state 56. One year ago winter apples were estimated at 11 per cent in the southern counties and 18 per cent in the state. . .

The percentages for late peaches are: Southern counties 82, central 73, northern 92, and state 81.* One year ago the figures for the southern counties were 8, and state 12.
