GOOD ROADS.

This Important Matter is Now Being Agitated and Should Receive Attention.

Iosco county raises each year between \$8,000 and \$16,000 to fix up her roads.

Do the roads show it? No. The main roads of Iosco county are today but little improved over ten years ago. Yet one-quarter of this sum of money rightly expended each year should give us the best roads in the world in ten years.

How shall it be done? The board of supervisors of the county have determined to consider the matter at the January meeting of 1899, and wish to know how the electors of the county feel about it, hence this publication.

Now, let us look it over. The assessed valuation of the county is \$1,600,000. One-half of one per cent, highway tax on this is \$8,000. One-half of one per cent, highway money tax is another \$8,000, making \$16,000 each year, which can be raised for highway purposes. You know whether you pay this or not.

The country road law allows not to exceed \$2 on a thousand to be employed under the direction of a skilled man in gravelling or stoning a road, or putting clay on, if sandy and gravelly. This would give \$3,200 a year for this purpose, and the money must be expended on county roads only. We have gravel close by on Lake shore, and it can be spread for \$1 per rod on clay roads. Let us begin first with the old clay main roads and gravel them. We will the first year gravel and make hard and firm, at least 2500 rods of road, or about 8 miles. This \$2 taken out of the highway tax leaves still four-fifths of the tax to be used at home as you see fit.

The County Road Commissioners receive no more pay than the town highway commissioner, \$1.50 or \$2 per day while actually at work. No bonds, no extra taxes, not one bit of extra expense and yet in five years, hard stone roads, good in wet as well as in dry weather. How can we afford to be without them. We cannot.

COMMITTEE ON ROADS AND BRIDGES, Board of Supervisors, Iosco County.

The above circular was issued by the committee on Roads and Bridges, by the direction of the board of supervisors, and the subject is worth of careful study by the people of the county. The farming lands of our county is rapidly being settled, and no class of people should be more interested in the building of good roads than the farmers.

It is an undisputed fact that Iosco county has some of the worst roads to be found in the state. Year after year money is worse than thrown away on them because the work is improperly done. By the adoption of a county road system properly handled, we would, in ten years time, have as good roads as could be found in the state, and this without the expense of a dollar addition taxes.

We shall give this question further discussion through the columns of the HERALD, and invite all who are interested in the matter to use the paper in discussing the question.

Official Canvass.

The board of county canvassers were in session at the court house Tuesday and Wednesday making the official canvass of the votes cast at the general election, Nov. 8.

On governor there was 1675 votes cast, of which Pingree received 1098 Whiting 556; Cheever 13; Cook, 2; and Hasseler 6. Pingree's majority 523.

The vote on Secretary of state shows the republican majority in the county to be about 293. The vote on this office was as follows: Republican 1021; democrats 707; scattering, 21.

The vote on Congressman was as follows: Crump, 937, Kelly 697, Miller 2. Crump's majority 238.

For State Senator Smith received 985, and Minthorn 646. Smith's majority 339.

For member of state legislature, Gillam received 985, and Anschutz 645. Gillam's majority 340.

The vote on the county candidates will be found in tabulation by townships and wards, elsewhere in this issue.

ON TO MANILLA.

An Interesting Letter From Fred Wilkins, of the 23a Regulars.

The following letter from Fred Wilkins, of Co. A., 23d Regular Infantry, which is now on its way to Manila, has just been received by his mother, and was mailed while the transport was at Honolulu:

HONOLULU, Oct. 27, 1898.

DEAR MOTHER:—Well, when I mailed my last letter we had just arrived and I had not seen any of the Island, only what I could see from the ship. We have now been here three days and I have seen quite a bit of the Island and the whole town.

I was greatly surprised, I did not expect to see very much, but I think this is about the prettiest town I have ever seen, and the buildings are equal to anything in U. S. and the scenery beats anything I have ever seen. The climate is out of sight. The sun is pretty hot in the day time, but the nights are cool and comfortable. I do not like the people very well, there are more Chinese and Japs than anything else and the natives are big and fat and greasy, that is, the largest part of them. There are a few very good looking native girls. There are quite a few white people here. They own all the fine buildings in town.

I went through the Queen's palace the first day I was here. It is a very fine building on the outside, but inside it has been stripped and turned into government offices. I have seen some natives here that look just like the pictures of Queen Lili that you see in the papers.

But I would not like to live here for it is the most out of the way place in the world. The only way they can get news is by steamboat and it is about six weeks old when it gets here. I used to think Tawas was dead, but it is a good deal worse here. I would die in six months of "the dog." You know what that is.

I expect that we will leave here about Tuesday the 30th there will be three transports leave here together the Senator Valero and the Arizona, so the rest of the trip will not be quite so lonesome.

I suppose you would like to know how we put in the time aboard the boat. You see we can get off only every other day, that is half goes one day and half the next, and the time passes pretty slow, the day we have to stay aboard all we can do is go in swimming and we stay in the water pretty near all day. I don't suppose the water is quite warm enough for swimming in Tawas, while here it is as warm as it is in the middle of the summer there.

One thing I like about this climate, you do not have to wear heavy underclothes, that just suits me.

Company A was out in the country on a practice march today and we saw coconuts and banana orchards to no end.

There is a little narrow gage railroad on the island with light B 14m engines running on it. I tell you they look natural.

A little native kid gave me some sea shells and I will send them in this letter I think they are very pretty. I could get some coral rocks but they are too large to send in a letter so I will wait and bring some home with me. I will probably have lots of other things to bring with me, that is if I live long enough to get back and I guess I will unless some insurgent gets a crack at me. I hear that they are making trouble over in Manila now.

I do not think that I will receive any mail from home for a month at least, but I will write as often as I can, and now I will have to close as it is getting late and I must go to bed and get a little rest, as I will probably be on pass tomorrow. So good-bye for this time. Give my love to all the folks.

Washington Letter.
 (From Our Regular Correspondent.)
 Washington, Nov. 14th, 1898.

There may be democrats who are down-cast over the result of the election, but if so, they haven't been seen. All those who are talking on the subject express the opinion that the party made a splendid showing, under the circumstances, and that reducing the republican majority in the house almost to the vanishing point, puts the democrats in a better position to make a winning fight in 1900 than they would have been had they captured the next house. With both branches of congress in their hands, the republicans will be certain to make lots of good democratic campaign material in the next two years. The outcome of the efforts of Boss Hanna and other McKinley boomers to jolly "Teddy" Roosevelt into supporting the claims of Mr. McKinley for re-nomination on 1900, by promising him that they will support him in 1904, will be watched for with interest. Before Roosevelt was ever thought of as a Rough Rider or as governor of New York, Mr. McKinley secured Platt's promise of support in 1900; but as Roosevelt only put on the Platt collar after he had practically made his nomination for governor a certainty, in order to get Platt's machine to help elect him, he may, through his power as governor, be able to prevent Platt controlling the state delegation to the next National Convention, thus making it impossible for Platt to deliver the promised votes to Mr. McKinley, without his consent. What Roosevelt will do, will depend, in the opinion of those who know his disposition thoroughly, upon what he thinks will best promote his own political interest and upon what he thinks he can accomplish. If he gets the idea that he can secure the nomination himself, the jangling of the riders of Mr. McKinley will have no effect upon him, whatever. It is whispered that Hanna intends to tempt "Teddy" by offering to throw Hobart overboard and make the ticket McKinley and Roosevelt.

Administration republicans have already begun to put out feelers to ascertain what chance there will be of getting an administration man elected speaker of the next house, instead of Czar Reed. They are afraid of Reed, who is known to hold anti-administration views on the expansion question, and believes to hold them upon others, but they are also afraid to show their hand unless certain that enough votes to control the republican caucus can be secured. Every republican elected to the next house is to be carefully sound to determine whether he would, if the administration desired it, vote against nominating Reed for speaker. In putting out those feelers, the name of Representative Henderson, of Iowa, is suggested as a possible administration candidate for speaker, but care is taken to leave the impression that no particular candidate would be insisted on; they only wish to ascertain whether it is possible to defeat Reed.

Should Senator Burrows fail to develop strength enough among the republicans of the Michigan legislature to get re-nominated, and his failure is expected. Secretary Alger, with the combined backing of Gov. Pingree and Mr. McKinley, will, it is understood, make a rush for the senatorship.

It is announced that the administration has sent an ultimatum to Spain, demanding immediate action upon the demand of this government for the Phillip, Inc. Just why that announcement could be made now, is a little bit puzzling, but perhaps those who made it know what they are doing, and why they are doing it.

According to those who know, the republican rejoicing over the alleged defeat of silver in the congressional campaign is premature. It is predicted that many republicans elected from Western districts will vote for silver, if it is made necessary for them to vote either for or against it, because the sentiment of their states, regardless of politics, is for silver.

The farm statistics are taken at the time the annual assessment is made and the supervisors are paid for their time at the rate of \$3 per day. They are not entitled to double pay.—*Alcona Echo.*
