## A blow to Trusts.

 The Supreme Court of the United States has decided that the Addiston Pipe Company is organized and do-ing busuoss contrary to the Shermal anti.trust law. The decision is practically ugainst all trusts.
The decision was read by Justice Peckham. The prusecution was unPeckham. The prosecution was un-
der the anti-trust act of 1890 . Six der the anti-trust act of 1890 . Six
corporations from different states had corporations from different states had consolidated as the Addiston Pipeand
Steel Company. Justice Peckhamia the decision said in part:
"An decision said in parr: An mjuarm asked to rethe agree They had ander the agreement, They had agreed to combine and agree on prices o manufacture. They auctioned of the right to make bids for furnishing pipe. The highest bidder at the auc-
tion would hid to furnish pipe. The others would either not bid at all or put in a higher bid.
"This was alleged to be a violation of the trust act and a regulation of commerce. The district cuurt held to the contrary. Appeal was had to the Sixth Circuit Court and the District court was reversed. An injunc tion was issued.
"The argument in the United States Supreme Court was on two points. One that the anti-trust act applied only to legislation by state assembly and not to individuals, The other was that if the law did ap. ply to individuals or corporaticns, diston Company was nut in regulation diston Company was nut in regulation
of commerce.
commerce.
"We find that the clause applies to agreemeuts of individuals as well as
action of state ction of state legislatures.
"That the Addiston Company contract does restrain this strict comnerce between states and is therefore void. The provisious of the injuncdiou are construed unt to intend to apply to members in the same state, but only
merce.
