LEAKS ON THE FARM
One serious leak on a grea many farms is the buying of machinery and then leaving it ex
posed in all kinds of weather. ave in mind a farmer who ha self binder, corn planter, sulky plow, walking plow, two cultivators, two top buggies and two wagons, and he leaves them stand-
goutin all kinds of weather I consider this a serious leak and there are many who do the same thing. Another leak on many farms is a lack of prope shelter for stock. I know men out in all kinds of weather and then feed 30 -cent corn to warm them up.
