

## IN THIS CITY

### The Republicans Elect Their City Ticket, Except Justice.

THE ELECTION WILL LONG BE REMEMBERED AS THE MOST REMARKABLE IN THE HISTORY OF THE CITY.

The city election last Monday was the most remarkable ever held in Tawas City. While there were two tickets in the field, the fact still remains that almost every nominee on the democratic ticket was there under protest, and after having declined to accept the nomination. This is also true of several on the republican ticket. The result was that no work was done by the democrats and the election practically went by default to the republicans. The plain facts of the case are that the affairs of the city are in such condition that but few men desire to hold municipal offices, and both parties had difficulty in filling their tickets. We believe that those elected will use their best endeavors to place our city government in better condition, yet they are accepting a most thankless task.

There was a comparatively light vote cast and the republicans elect Wm. Nisbet, mayor; Orlando Elliott, clerk; Thos. Davison, treasurer; John B. King, Thos. J. Moore and J. M. Walker, aldermen; G. L. Cornville and W. W. Ramage, supervisors; Frank M. King and John G. Phelps, constables. The democrats elect Thomas E. Conners, justice; Henry Gale, supervisor, and Frank Seiloff, constable. Robert A. Howey, republican, and Edward Livermore, democrat, are tie for alderman for the full term, in the first ward. The vote for ward officers is as follows:

To the Farmers of Michigan.

The following address has been issued by the officers of the state Grange:

Firmly believing that the time has arrived when all good citizens should take a more earnest and active part in the Public Affairs of our State to the end that just government shall prevail and that the honor and good name of Michigan be upheld, and being desirous of calling your immediate attention to the importance of this matter, we have deemed it advisable to issue this appeal.

We wish to preface it with the avowal that it is not issued from a partisan or factional standpoint. We recognize (and are glad of the fact) that the agriculturists of our state represent all shades of political opinion, and for this reason can exert if they will, in their respective parties, an influence that will be felt for good.

We therefore appeal to you before party passion is aroused and prejudice incited to look carefully over the situation in Michigan. You are confronted by enormous increase in expenditure, by a multiplication of state institutions, by an increase of state boards and commissions and by a constant increase of officials in nearly every department of the state government. You are also confronted with an almost continuous effort to increase the salaries of these officials.

Burden after burden is being added to the list. Taxes are being levied to meet these expenses until many citizens are being actually oppressed.

Wealthy corporations under the plan of "Specified Taxation" are receiving enormous benefits while escaping the payment of their just share for the support of the state.

Our mines and forests are paying tribute to outside capital, while our farms are bearing an undue proportion of the public expense.

Farmers as a class are not opposed to reasonable and necessary extension of state institutions and the public service, but as interested citizens all should study more thoroughly to learn the real needs of the state and to exercise such intelligent influence as will prevent unnecessary increase in taxes, often to merely satisfy localities and persons.

Being tax payers and not tax dodgers, Farmers should also unite in the demand that the expense of the state shall be justly and equitably levied and collected, all classes of taxable property bearing its proportionate share.

Thus the great question of economy in appropriations, honesty in expenditures, justice in taxation and a clean administration of public affairs are before you. In view of these and other facts which might be enumerated, we urge you, as representatives of the greatest and most staple interest of the state, to attend your party primaries and see to it that only men of known integrity and faithful to trusts imposed, are placed in nomination for state and legislative offices. Leave the professional politician, together with the men who have been tried and found wanting, at home and vote and work for men who are in favor of equality of all classes of property as to assessment and taxation, and who believe in the adage that "A public office is a sacred trust."

If you will do this, then good men will be placed in nomination by all political parties, and no matter which party is successful at the polls, we shall have just legislation; and will not have cause to blush for breaches of public trust and the finger of scorn will cease to be pointed at Michigan.

The Grange through its organized capacity has given opportunity to deliberate upon the importance of greater interest in public matters, and the co-operation of all Farmers is hereby solicited in creating such public sentiment and power as will result in establishing economy, justice and honest service in state affairs.

**The Republicans Elect Their Candidates for County Road Commissioners**

**THE RESULTS IN THE TOWNSHIPS.**

Notwithstanding the fact that the republican candidates were placed on the official ballot by the county election commissioners, and on the advice of the prosecuting attorney, in direct violation to the law, they were successful in securing a majority of the light vote polled last Monday. With no returns secured from Burleigh and Wilber, James Quinn has 142 majority over Clark Esmond; John H. White has 164 over Thomas Lowe, and John Curtis has 74 over John M. Waterbury. The returns from Burleigh and Wilber will probably increase these about 100. This leaves the Tawas without a member of the board of county road commissioners, a fact which they will probably regret in time.
