THE COUNTY CONVENTION

Of the Iosco County Democracy was held at the Court House last Monday.

The Iosco County Democracy held a convention at the court house, in this city, last Monday, for the purpose of electing delegates to the various conventions and electing a county committee for the ensuing two years.

The convention was called to order at 10 o'clock, with George C. Anschuetz as temporary chairman, and Nelson Braband as temporary secretary. The following committees were appointed, after which a recess was taken until one o'clock.

On credentials—N. Hennigar, Oscoda. Wm. Groff, Tawas, and John Jordon, Sherman.

On resolutions and permanent order of business—S. Vaughn, Oscoda, L. J. Patterson, Tawas City, and Edward Winchel, Tawas.

The convention convened again at 1 o'clock and after the report of committee on credentials, the committee on permanent organization and resolutions reported in favor of making temporary officers permanent and resolutions endorsing W. J. Bryan for presidency; the re-adoption of the Chicago platform as a part of the platform for 1900; denouncing trusts, the new monetary law and the corruption and excessive taxation in state affairs. Also in favor of the election of U. S. senators by a direct vote; government control of all money; an independent government for Cuba and the Philippines. Also instructing the delegates to Port Huron to support Hon. D. J. Campau as the chairman of the Michigan delegation to Kansas City, all of which was adopted.

Crop Report.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin of the Weather Bureau, Michigan Section for the week ending April 28, 1900, says:

The mean daily temperature for the week ended April 28th, was 53.5 degrees, or 6.2 degrees above the normal; the average total precipitation was 0.17 of an inch, or 0.35 of an inch above the normal; the sunshine averaged 77 per cent of the possible amount.

The generally warm dry weather of the past seven days has greatly advanced farm work; a large amount of sunshine and small amount of rain has dried out the ground so that most fields can now be worked. The warm weather following the warm showers of the week previous has greatly improved the condition of grass, rye and meadows and also been beneficial to wheat. Wheat, however, continues in generally poor condition and many correspondents continue to report that wheat fields are being plowed under for oats and corn. Oat seeding has advanced rapidly in the central and southern counties and been quite generally begun in the northern counties and some portions of the upper peninsula; in the extreme southern counties early sown oats are coming up nicely. Barley and pea seeding are also well advanced and farmers have quite generally begun plowing for corn. Early potato planting is well advanced in the southern counties and quite generally begun in the central counties. Reports regarding the condition of fruit buds are usually encouraging this year; with but one or two exceptions in a very large number of reports all correspondents agree that the condition of fruit trees could not be better at present. Stock is being turned out to pasturage in the southern counties, but is still being fed in the more northerly portions of the state. Although some fields on low lands are still too wet to work. Wheat, rye, meadows and oat seeding would be benefited by warm rains.
