Crop Report.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin of the Weather Bureau, Michigan Section for the week ending April 28, 1900.

The mean daily temperature for the week ended April 28th, was 53.5 degrees, or 6.2 degrees above the tion was 0.17 of an inch, or 0.35 of an inch above the normal; the sunshine averaged 77 per cent of the possible

The generally warm dry weather of the past seven days has greatly advanced farm work; a large amount of sunshine and small amount of rain has dried out the ground so that most fields can now be worked. The warm weather following the warm showers of the week previous has greatly improved the condition of grass, rye and meadows and also been beneficial to wheat. Wheat, however, continues in generally poor condition and many correspondents continue to report that wheat fields are being plowed under for oats and corn. Oat seeding has advanced rapidly in the central and southern counties and been quite generally begun in the northern counties and some portions of the upper peninsula; in the extreme southern counties early sown oats are coming up nicely. Barley and pea seeding are also well advanced and farmers have quite generally begun plowing for corn. Early potato planting is well advanced in the southern counties and quite generally begun in the central counties. Reports regarding the condition of fruit buds are usually encouraging this year; with but one or two exceptions in a very large number of reports all correspondents agree that the condition of fruit trees could not be better at present. Stock is being turned out to pasturage in the southern counties, but is still being fed in the more northerly portions of the state. Although some fields on low lands are still too wet to work. Wheat, rye, meadows and oat seeding would be benefited by warm rains.

Three courses in nature study will be given in the summer session of the Scott, who is now organizing schools

Course one is entitled Plant Study. It comprises a consideration of germination, tree study and the study of a nation, tree study and the study of a DC Howell, number of the most common large Chas Curry, flowered, wild and cultivated plants, abundant in the summer and fall. The next important thing the orchard should receive a fair dressing of fertilizers, such as well rotted barn yard manure and wood ashes, then plough (no deeper than is neccessary to do a good job) and harrow and keep well cultivated until the latter part of July, then sow to oats or peas as a cover crop, to remain on the ground over winter, to hold the leaves and snow.



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
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
