The mean temperature during the month of May was slightly above the normal and the rainfall oelow, especially in the northern counties and upper peninsula. The month wa generally dry until the last fow days when heavy rains fell in the southern and central counties and some in the northern counties, greatly improve ferred from the dey which had suf ferred trom the dry weather. Th seeding of oats, plowing, etc. During the past month the
During the past month the condi tion of wheat has continued to de cline until, at the present time, wo have one of the poorest crops of
wheat known in the history of Michiwheat known in the history of Michi-
gan. The crop had a poor start las gan. The crop had a poor start la
fall, climate conditions during the winter were unfayorable, and lastly the Hessian fly has infested many fields in such great numbers that the crop is seriously injured.
The average condition of wheat in the southern counties, where 85 per cent of the crop grown, is 40 , a deThe average condition in the central counties is 56 , in the northern coun ties 86 , and for the ate 49 a reduc thes 86 , and for the state 49, a reducon of 5 per cent. The excellen ndition of wheat in the northern mainder of the state is due to the fact that the plant was better protectd by snow during the winter. The per cent of wheat sown in the southern counties that will be plowed up because winter killed is 20 , in the central counties 19, in the northorn counties 15, and for the atate 19. Washington Jume 12--The navy is to build warships aggregating over $100,000,000$ in cost as soon as builders "are prepared to undertake this great program, which calls for 11 arm ored ships, practically deubling the American sea power in this class, and for three highly improyed Olympia type of cruisers. The five battle ships for whose hulls and machinery congress has approprated $\$ 18,000,000$ are ready for the builders to bid up on tomorrow. Plans for the six great armored cruisers, more powerful than any ship at present in service and to cost for hulls and machine aln over $\$ 25,000,000$, hould be approved next month
The battleships are to be nearl 6,000 tons displacement, or ove , 000 tons heavier than the Oregon han 100 feet longer than that fam ous vessel and with at least three nuts higher speed. The six cruisers of the California class of 14,000 :tons, 23 knots speed and 8,000 knots steaming radius, will be unmatched in the world. They will be 6,000 tons larg er than the Brooklyn and at leas hree times as powerful for fighting uses. All these vessles will be the ost formidable ships yet laid down any dock yaruss.
