By so doing the water cannot enter into the berries and carry away the delicate flavor of the fruit.

Crop Report.

The following crop report was issued from the Secretary of State office last Saturday.

The mean temperature during the month of May was slightly above the normal and the rainfall below, especially in the northern counties and upper peninsula. The month was generally dry until the last few days when heavy rains fell in the southern and central counties and some in the northern counties, greatly improved the condition of hay which had suffered from the dry weather. The month was generally favorable to seeding of oats, plowing, etc.

During the past month the condition of wheat has continued to decline until, at the present time, we have one of the poorest crops of wheat known in the history of Michigan. The crop had a poor start last fall, climate conditions during the winter were unfavorable, and lastly the Hessian fly has infested many fields in such great numbers that the crop is seriously injured.

The average condition of wheat in the southern counties, where 85 per cent of the crop grown, is 40, a decline of 9 per cent in the last month. The average condition in the central counties is 56, in the northern counties 86, and for the state 49, a reduction of 5 per cent. The excellent condition of wheat in the northern counties, as compared with the remainder of the state is due to the fact that the plant was better protected by snow during the winter.

The per cent of wheat sown in the southern counties that will be plowed up because winter killed is 20, in the central counties 19, in the northern counties 15, and for the state 19.

The damage by Hessian fly is, in the southern counties 39, in the central counties 20, in the northern counties 19, and for the state 31.

The acreage of corn planted in the southern counties, as compared with 1899, is 100, in the central counties 99, in the northern counties 102, and for the state 100. The condition of corn, as compared with an average, is in the southern, central, and northern counties, and state, 94.

The whether during May was very favorable for oats. The condition in the southern counties is 96, in the central counties 97, in the northern counties 91, and for the state 95.

The condition of the meadows, as compared with an average is, in the southern counties 97, in the northern counties 80, and for the state 90.

The acreage of potatoes planted, as compared with 1899, is 94 in the southern counties, 91 in the central, 90 in the northern counties and 93 in the state. The condition as compared with an average is, in the southern counties and state 95, in the central counties 96, and in the northern counties 98.

The number of colts in the southern counties; compared with an average is 86, in the central counties 91,

the state 88. The number of calves in the southern and northern counties, as compared with an average is 99, in the central 96, and for the state 98.

The acreage of sugar beets planted as compared with 1899, is in the southern counties 62, in the central 76, in the northern counties 81, and for the state 68.

Correspondents generally report fruit dropping badly. Many orchards are infested with canker worms and tent caterpillars, and some damage has been done by frost. The earliest date of shipment of strawberries was May 15.

Cigarettes Condemned.

The supreme court of Tennessee declared the law forbidding the sale or giving away of cigarettes in that state constitutional, and said, in part, as follows:

"We think cigarettes are not legitimate articles of commerce because they are wholly noxious and deleterious to health. Their use is always harmful; never beneficial. They possess no virtue, but are inherently bad and bad only. They find no true commendation or merit or usefulness in any sphere. On the contrary, they are widely condemned as pernicious altogether. That is, it looks that way now, but there is no telling what the people may see fit to do about it when the question of electing a governor is up to them.—*Marquette Mining Journal.*

THE nomination of Hon. George D. Jackson, of Bay City, as the democratic candidate for congress from this district seems to be almost unanimous. While Mr. Jackson does not desire the nomination, it will be difficult for him to refuse the demand of his party at a time when the prospects of success are so bright in the 'Old Tenth.'

CONGRESS has placed the price of armor altogether in the hands of the Secretary of the Navy. Under the provisions of the bill just passed, Mr. Long can pay any price he likes—\$1,000 a ton if he chooses—provided

GREAT WARSHIPS.

Washington June 12--The navy is to build warships aggregating over \$100,000,000 in cost as soon as builders are prepared to undertake this great program, which calls for 11 armored ships, practically doubling the American sea power in this class, and for three highly improved Olympia type of cruisers. The five battle ships for whose hulls and machinery congress has appropriated \$18,000,000 are ready for the builders to bid upon tomorrow. Plans for the six great armored cruisers, more powerful than any ship at present in service and to cost for hulls and machinery alone over \$25,000,000, should be finally approved next month.

The battleships are to be nearly 16,000 tons displacement, or over 5,000 tons heavier than the Oregon, than 100 feet longer than that famous vessel and with at least three knots higher speed. The six cruisers of the California class of 14,000 tons, 23 knots speed and 8,000 knots steaming radius, will be unmatched in the world. They will be 6,000 tons larger than the Brooklyn and at least three times as powerful for fighting uses. All these vessels will be the most formidable ships yet laid down in any dock yards.

The secretary of the navy has also been directed to contract for five Holland submarine boats to cost \$175,000 each and to be built within a year.

A Fatal Accident.

While at work at Rodman's mill Wilber, last Friday, Evert Lyon, met with an accident which resulted in his death, Monday. While endeavoring to throw a large belt over a pulley he fell on the belt and was carried to the shaft which caught his clothing and carried him around several times before the machinery could be stopped. When taken down he was apparently lifeless but after a half hour's hard work he was brought back to consciousness. He was badly bruised about the head and chest, but strange to say no bones were broken. Drs. Howell and Gates, of East Tawas, were called and dressed his wounds and he was removed to the home of his half-brother, Thos. Fowler, of this city, where he lived until 4 o'clock Monday afternoon, dying from internal injuries.

The young man was the son of Mrs. E. Wright and was 17 years, 8 months and 27 days of age. He leaves a large circle of friends and relatives to mourn his untimely death. The funeral was held from the Baptist church, Wednesday afternoon, and largely attended. The services were conducted by Rev. D. Q. Barry.

The bereaved family desire to extend their sincere thanks to all for the aid and sympathy extended them in their hour of sorrow.

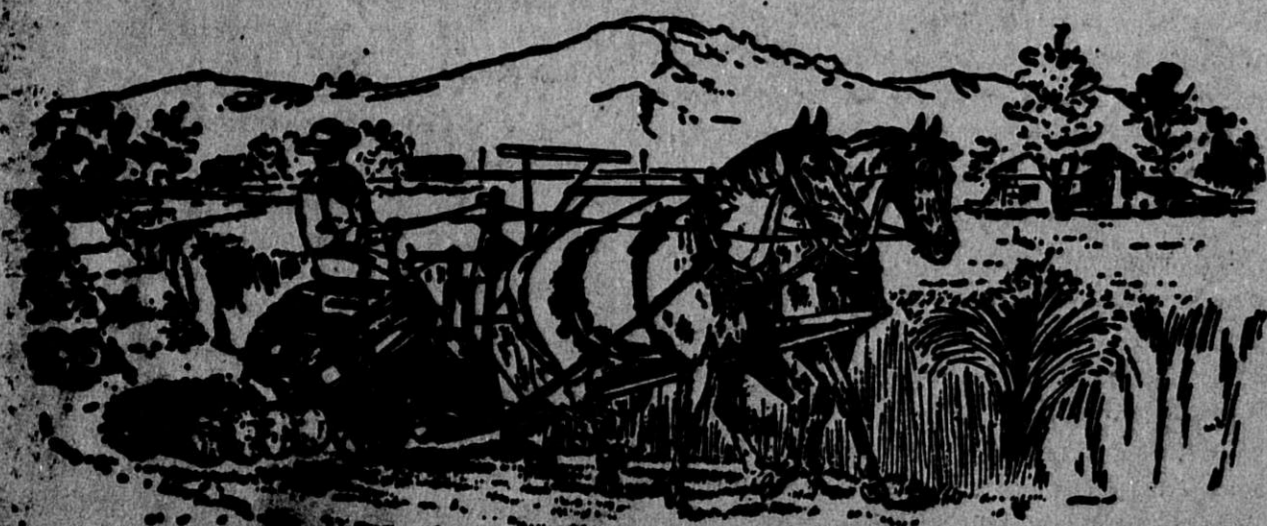

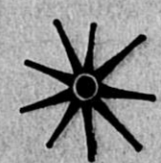
