Chocolate and cocoa are essentially beverages for the lightest and daintiest repasts, and the woman who eats her lunch alone and sparingly will be wise to substitute it with vegetable or fruit salads and white bread and butter for the proverbial cup of tea.

"Crime of '96"

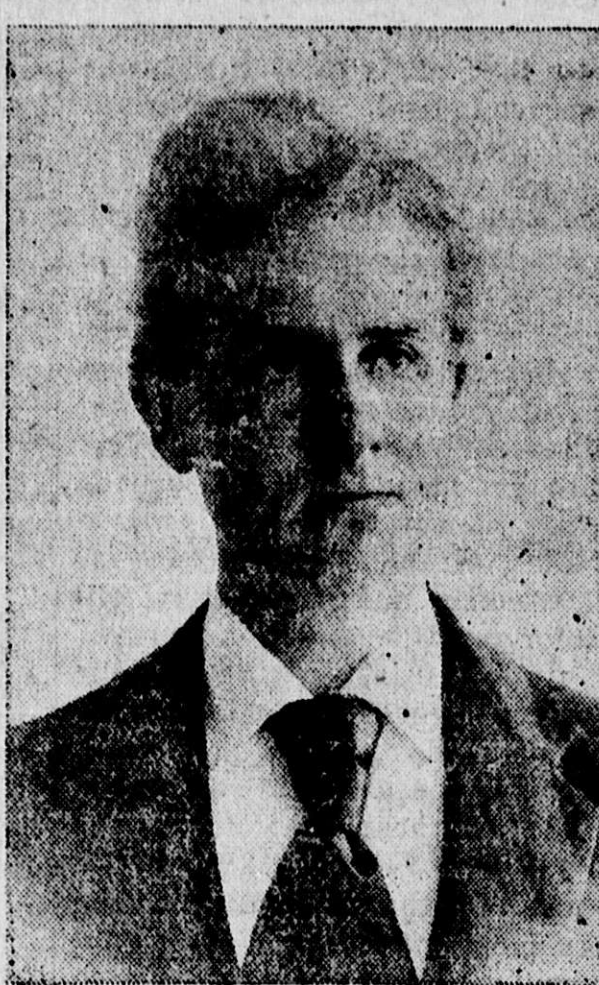
Baltimore, Vt., is said to be the smallest town in the United States. It consists of 3,000 acres of land eight miles from a railroad in Windsor county, and has 64 inhabitants, of whom 18 are voters. Under the constitution of Vermont it has an equal representation in the legislature with the largest cities in the state.

All but two of the 13 voters of Baltimore are stalwart and consistent republicans. The other two, while owing to democratic predilections, are opposed to the free coinage of silver, so that the town should have cast its solid vote for McKinley & Hobart in 1896. However, a strange thing happened. As there were no differences of opinion, so there were no debates nor political speeches and nothing to keep up the interest. Busy about other matters, the 18 voters of Baltimore kept at work and forgot there was such a thing as election day. At least it passed unnoticed, and not until the papers began to come in from the towns along the railroad and telegraph did they realize that they had forgotten to vote. 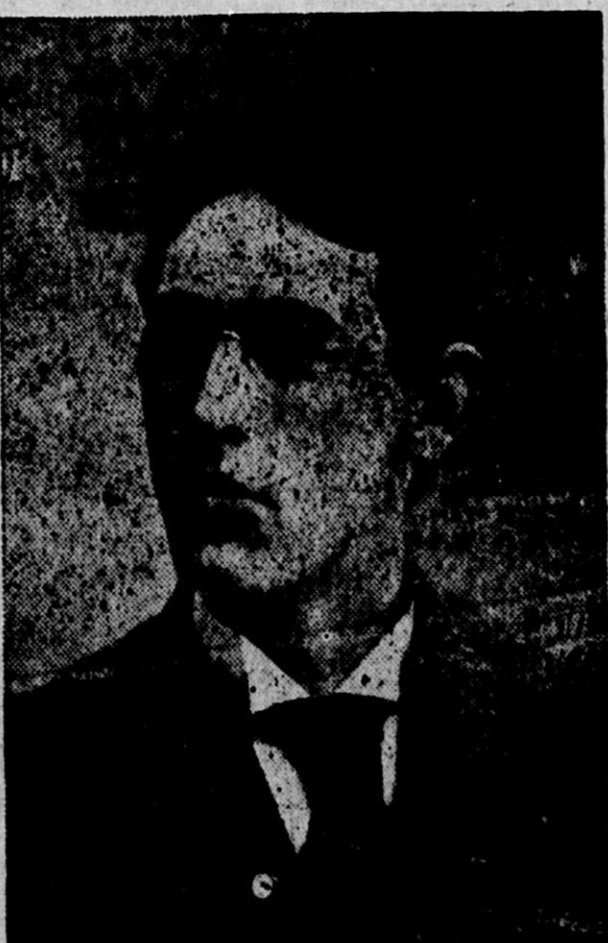
The Supervisors.

The board of supervisors after having adjourned from last Saturday until Tuesday completed their labors and adjourned until the first Thursday in January. Before adjourning they appointed J. M. Waterbury, of this city, G. E. Oaks, of East Tawas, and John McFarland, sr., of AuSable, as the board of county canvassers.

The report of the committee on equalization which was presented Saturday forenoon, participated the warmest fight that has been witnessed on the board in a long time. The committee report equalized the taxes on about the same footing as last year, and was signed by the entire committee. A substitute to the report of the committee was presented and adopted. The principal difference being that the substitute raised the valuation of the townships, except AuSable, and left the cities at their former valuation, or nearly so. This caused a hard "kick" on the part of the county supervisors, as it will result in raising the taxes on the townships and lowering that of the cities. The substitute was adopted, the supervisors of AuSable, East Tawas, Tawas City and Baldwin voting for it, while the others voted for the committee report. Below we give the equalization for 1900 and for 1899, which shows the increase or decrease in each city and township:

The Girl And Her Vocation

"The future wage-earning girl should have in her mind during the latter part of her school life the selection of her profession," writes Margaret E. Sangster in the November Ladies Home Journal. "I think it well for her, too, very quietly but with intention, to cast about among her friends for suggestions, to ask the kind of offices of one and another, and to make known her need of immediate employment so soon as she leaves school. Many good positions are lost because of indecision or lost pride, or unwise reticence on the part of those who seek them. The mental attitude of the girl in search of employment should be neither indifferent nor patronizing; she should set in motion every legitimate means, and let those who may be able to assist her know something of her situation. They can help, and she can seek with much greater hope of success if the goal in view be something definite."

School and Pupils in Michigan.

A Washington dispatch says: in his annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30 last, W. T. Harris, the commissioner of education, states that the school property in the state of Michigan at the close of the school year, 1898-99, was \$19,746,443 and that the amount raised by the and local taxation for the support of the support of these schools was \$5,640,517.

The report shows that there were 498,665 pupils enrolled in the elementary and secondary common schools in the state, which was 21.81 per cent of the estimated population. The average daily attendance was 350,000. There were 3,417 male teachers in these schools, whose average monthly salaries were \$44.80 and 12,093 female teachers, whose salaries averaged \$35.35 per month.

The total expenditures for the schools, including sites, buildings, etc., salaries and other expenditures and excluding payment of bonds, was \$5,833,369, an average daily expenditure of 10.4 cents for each pupil.

A table devoted to city schools show that there are twenty-nine systems in the state. The total expenditures for these schools was \$2,580,715. The total enrollment in the city schools was 136,332 pupils and the average daily attendance was 100,012. The teachers in the city schools numbered 233 males and 2,712 females. There were twelve schools devoted to theology, law and medicine, with 1,919 students.

THE FARM CORNER.

Newly Items Gathered From Macy Sources.

FARM NOTES

It's time to commence fattening the Thanksgiving turkey.

The apple crop in Northern Michigan is extremely light.

As some farmers are situated it pays to raise young cows for the market.

Clean the stables twice every day and use plenty of absorbents in the gutters.

It is claimed that the average bee makes about a teaspoonful of honey during its life.

Winter is the best time to destroy the eggs of the tent caterpillar on the branches of the tree.

It is not worth while to worry over the chance of overfeeding young ducks. It can't be done.

The farmer who is behind with his work this fall has either had a streak of bad luck or is a sluggard.

A pekin duck will lay more eggs than any hen of any breed. They usually lay from 150 to 200 eggs in a year.

For fattening the turkey try some whole wheat boiled to bursting. It makes a profitable food for both young turkeys and for fattening.

A bee loaded with honey weighs three times as much as it does when it leaves the hive. That is a bee carries twice its weight in honey.

A good way to destroy plant lice is to dip the affected parts of the plants into a bucket of strong tobacco water, or else syringe with this solution.

A well fed, well-cared-for cow not only pays back every penny laid out on her, but she pays you a good profit in hard cash every week in her life.

Churning when you "get time" and churning at any time and all degrees of ripeness of cream, account for the varying flavor of dairy butter.

A farmer who raises his own grain and has cows to produce milk can feed a flock of Leghorn hens a year for less than 50 cents. The larger breeds will eat a little more.

Have you got that warm light poultry house provided for yet? If not let us remind you that winter is coming and hens won't lay in cold weather unless kept warm.

Don't neglect the calves and heifers. They require special care and attention. They should be kept clean by brushing, and should be handled every day to keep them gentle.

It pays to give cows water with the chill taken off. There is no economy in letting them drink ice-water in a cold yard, and worse still to drive them to a creek to drink.

Do not permit overfeeding, thus making your towns sluggish, but feed the proper amount of food. It is the hen that is active and constantly scratching and searching that lays the greatest number of eggs.

The census will show a decrease of population in some agriculture districts owing to the rapid increase of labor saving farm machinery. It does not take so many men to sow and reap a given area as it did only a few years ago.

The small and inferior cabbages are valuable as food for poultry, and will be highly relished in winter, when green food is scarce. They are easily handled, as the heads require no cutting, the fowls picking them to pieces and consuming them down to stalks.

Farmers in the vicinity of Tiffin, Ohio, are complaining that a plague in the shape of species of cut worm are destroying the corn. The worm cuts from the small of the ear to the thick end, eating out the heart of the grain and then the

wash should be applied as hot as it is possible to have it. It should also be thick, so that it will fill up the cracks and crevices. The whitewash is valuable not only as an insecticide, but also as a germicide.

The practice of turning cows on young rye late in the fall is a good one, but when the ground is wet damage may result. Grazing the rye causes it to stool and the young rye provides late green food, but while the rye field may be used for cows if the fall they should not be turned on too early in the spring. It does not do so much harm for cows to change from grass to rye as it does from dry food in spring to the young rye.

We heard some time ago of a young man that solved the question of meat food for his poultry by feeding them on rabbit meat. He trapped the rabbits, killed and skinned them, and hung them up where the hens could get at them. The result was that he supplied eggs to the market in the winter time when they brought fifty cents per dozen. This might not be a bad idea in some localities where rabbits are superabundant, and bring little or nothing for human food.

One poultryman says that he keeps lice out of the nests by sprinkling in them coal ashes that have had some crude carbolic acid on them. He says that to saturate the ashes he puts about a bushel of them in a tight box and puts in two or three spoonfuls of curd carbolic acid. This box he keeps shut for some days, when the ashes are thoroughly permeated with the smell of the acid. We have never tried this but it will do test.

The frost is one of the agents of the farmer for pulverizing the soil. Every clod or lump in a field is a detriment according to its size, as the finer the soil the greater the feeding capacity of the plants and the easier the roots can penetrate. As heat expands and cold contracts all lumps, it is for the frost to break down all the coarse portions which work cannot be done with any implement when a piece of land is well drained the frost goes deeper, and when the land is plowed in the fall and subsoiled the frost prepares it for the spring plowing by going down deep and tearing all coarse portions apart by expansion.

A short time since the cow was sad, she scarce could raise her head, bogged; her hoofs were sore her tail was limp, her mane and bangs had lost their crimp, and miles she trudged from grass to drink, with scarcely strength enough to wink. The owner too, looked blue and glum and cursed the cattle business some; but since the rain the gars is tall, the cow can raise her head and bawl; her hide is sleek, no bones protrude and she prances like an English dude. God bless the rain, it makes the cow feel young again.

Farmers who consider \$300 too high for a 14-pound butter cow should remember that no outlay is too great provided the returns there from are satisfactory. There is a great difference in the price of a pure bred Jersey and a common cow, but there is also a wide difference in the butter produced. A cow is valuable only according to what she produces and the cost. One cow producing 14-pounds of butter is more profitable than two cows producing seven pounds each, because she requires less room and also entails less expense for food and labor, thus producing butter at a lower cost per pound.

Feeding the products on the farm is the cheapest mode of marketing the bulky materials. A hundred dozens of eggs will bring more money than a ton of hay, yet more ground will be required to produce the hay to say nothing of plowing, harrow-

able, or which can be marketed in a more concentrated form. It is transportation charges that largely reduce the profit.

WHAT A CARELESS MAN CAN DO.

As an illustration of how careful farmers should be in selecting a man to run a creamery a dairy paper says that, in a creamery handling 10,000 pounds of milk per day, it is easy for a 'careless or poor manager to lose \$1,500 a year on the quality of of the butter, \$3,000 a year on the quantity, \$150 on the consumption of coal and \$40 on that of oil.

Creameries are a bid thing for the farmer, and the selection of a man to run one is no trifling matter. The success of a creamery depends upon good management backed by conscientious patrons.

THE FEEDING OF MANGELS TO STOCK.

At a meeting of the English Royal Agricultural Society a farmer said that well-ripened mangels given in moderate quantity, twenty-eight to thirty pounds per head daily, can be quiet well fed to to fattening bullocks in early stages, in place of Swedish turnips if along with them be given either common cotton cake, bean meal or a plentiful supply of long hay. As soon as the quantity of mangels, reaches thirty-five to forty pounds per head daily, scouring will probably occur. When this is the case the giving of long hay in quantity will stop the trouble.

With sheep there is no scouring effect whatever produced by the feeding of mangels, and they can be fed if about a half a pound per head daily of cotton cake is given along with the food.

Attention must be called to the harm that may be caused to male sheep by the feeding of mangels to freely as they have a tendency to have a bad effect on the kidneys.

HUMUS.

The humus of soils is of great importance. Not only does it modify the physical properties of the soil, but it is the principal source of the natural nitrogenous food of plants. Thus a soil rich in humus is rich in nitrogen and a soil poor in humus is poor in nitrogen. Consequently it is the nitrogen of the humus and the carbon that is the valuable ingredient. Because the roots of plants cluster around decayed vegetable matter in the soil they are capable of feeding on humus, whereas it is the nitric acid which is being gradually formed and liberated from the moss that causes accumulations. Where the nitrogen exists in the soil there the roots of plants are certain to find their way. We need more humus ordinarily than any other element known.

Besides the manufacture of plant food that goes on where humus is in plentiful supply in the soil, there is another advantage in having plenty of humus. This is in better mechanical condition of the soil. It becomes porous and friable and this allows the aid to readily penetrate the soil carrying with it atmospheric nitrogen which is converted into nitric acid and prepared for use by the plants. Humus also renders the soil capable of retaining more moisture than it could if it were solid and compact. It makes the soil spongy and the spaces hold water that would otherwise escape from the reach of the roots of the plant.

To fill any soil with humus it is only necessary to grow crops that may be ploughed under. The most valuable of these are clovers. Any sort of vegetation turned under and allowed to decay makes humus and even a crop of weeds served in this manner helps to enrich and modify the soil so it will produce better crops.
