Where miles she trudged from grass to the nitrogen exists in the soil drink, with scarcely strength there the roots of plants are certain to find their way. We need more humus ordinarily than any other element known.

Besides the manufacture of plant food that goes on where humus is in plentiful supply ni the soil, there is another advantage in having plenty of humus. This is in better mechanical condition of the soil. It becomes porous and friable and this allows the aid to readily penetrate the soil carrying with it atmospheric too great provided the returns there nitrogen which is converted into nitric acid and prepared for use by the plants. Humus also renders the soil capable of retaining more moisture than it could if it were solid and compact. It makes the soil spungy and the spaces hold water that would be otherwise escape from the reach of the roots of the plant.

> To fill any soil with humns it is only necessary to grow crops that may be ploughed under. The most valuable of these are clovers. Any sort of vegetation turned under and allowed to decay makes humus and even a crop of weeds served in this manner helps to enrich and modify the soil so it will produce better crops.


