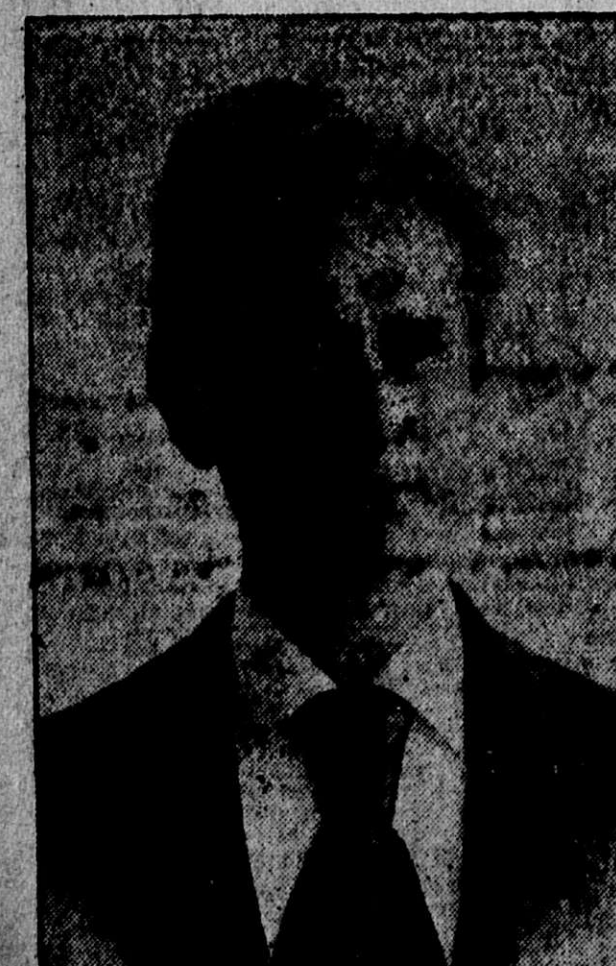

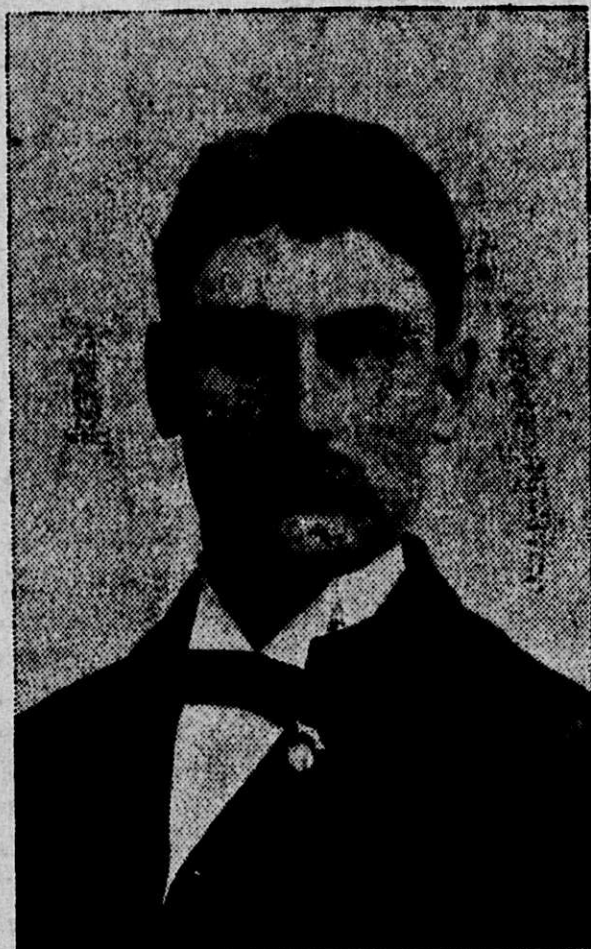

FOR REGISTER OF DEEDS.

Crump's Record.

On several important and leading questions the record of R. O. Crump in congress has been such as to lose him the support of any of the active members of the state grange. This organization has grown and spread very rapidly during the past few years and it has a powerful influence at this time. It is absolutely non-political and nearly all of its members will vote against R. O. Crump because he had failed to carry out their declaration of principles.

ELECTION OF SENATORS

The first declaration of the State Grange regarding national affairs is on the question of the election of United State senators by direct vote of the people. The fact that the senate of the United States is now and must for all time under the present condition of their selection, composed of nearly all millionaires, corporationists and corporations paid servants, has aroused the farmers to act in this manner. They fully realize that their only remedy is by given an opportunity to vote for their own senators. Mr. Crump has gone on record as being against the election of senators by popular vote, because he voted at the last session of the congress against submitting a constitutional amendment providing for this needy reform. For this act alone he will loose thousands of Republican members of the State Grange throughout the district.

FREE RURAL DELIVERY.

The second declaration of principals of the Grange is in favor of a non-rapid extension of rural free delivery. The farmers of this district have been shamefully treated on this subject by Mr. Crump. All of the papers in the district have bitterly denounced the failure of Mr. Crump to secure any free rural delivery. Not until after this campaign opened was anything done for this district in this respect. On Oct. 1, delivery routes were established in two townships Bay county, viz Hampton and Portsmouth, Merritt, Frankliust, Monitor, Bangor, Williams, Kawawlin and Pinconning townships in Bay county should all have had free delivery. They probably would have had but for the fact that Mr. Crump was afraid that a few postoffices would be discontinued and he would thereby lose some of his active workers. The counties of Midland, Arenac, Ogemaw, Iosco, Alpena, Presque Isle, Cheboygan and Emmett have rich and populous farming and rural districts which should have had some little part of this great advantage, but Mr. Crump has simply been "silent, silent, silent." But the voters in the rural districts thus neglected will not be silent on election day.

ANTI TRUST LEGISLATION.

The Grange is very actively in favor of anti-legislation. The position of the Republican party in this question, the fact that Mr. Crump is a party man and will always vote with his party, places him in direct conflict with the Grange and the

SHIP SUBSIDY BILL.

Mr. Crump's position regarding this question is not very clear, but the fact that Senator Hanna and other Republican leaders are for the bill, and that Mr. Crump will vote for it if a party measure, places him, in direct opposition to the Grange on this subject.

TRUST PRICES.

The great increase in the price of all articles bought by the farmer which increase is the direct result of trusts, places Crump in a bad light with the farmers. The trusts could not place the prices where they are but the Dingley Tariff Bill for which Mr. Crump voted.

The farmers are looking more into these questions than ever before. They will vote for their own interests and Mr. Crump does not represent any of those interests. Lee E. ACCORDING to the census figures announced this week the population of the United States is 76,627,907, an increase since 1890, of 13,225,464. Michigan has 2,419,782 as compared with 2,093,889.

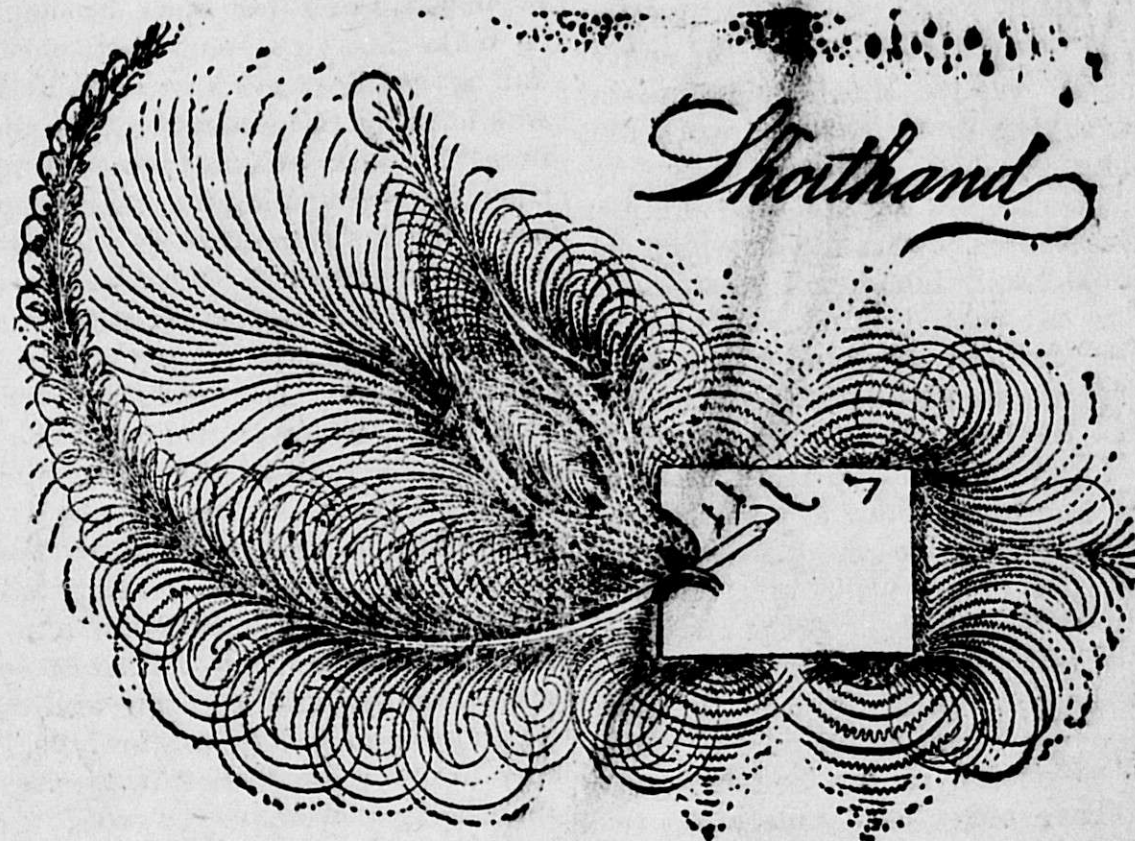





THE FARM CORNER.

Newspaper Items from the Farm and Garden

FARM NOTES.

If you must sell the sheep get them fat.

The hog is enjoying a season of prosperity.

Corn at 43 cents can be fed profitably to the hogs.

When you are feeding the calf you are making the cow.

Don't try to winter more poultry than you can take care of.

There should be less sheepless farms. Sheep give weeds that tired feeling.

Corn in the northern counties is running a little better than 100 bushels to the acre.

In improving your land improve it just below the surface and the returns will be greater.

Nebraska corn dealers estimate the present corn crop in the state at 280,000,000 bushels.

Don't plan to do more work than is commensurate with your force; for this will end in failure.

Any sugar beet grower in the northern beet belt can tell you that the growing of beets is death to the Canada thistle.

In the end nothing pays so well as thoroughness in all the details of farm management and in the care of the stock.

Don't waste your time and then complain that you have no time. Economize time and you will have no cause to complain.

Don't fail to study the farm, and see what is needed for the improvement of it. Nothing can be done without study and patience.

The general health of the hog can be helped along by a watering each day with good clean water. They soon learn to like it and look for it.

The United States leads all other nations in the matter of fruit growing. Our strawberries were valued at \$80,000,000 last year, and our grapes at \$100,000,000.

The receipts of hogs at the four great markets of the west for 1900 are the largest on record except for the years '98 and '99. For 1900 the receipts are 11,049,453.

Some farmers never fully appreciate what the Lord does to help them, and in consequence they will take a day off this fine weather and take a chance on getting the work done up.

At a recent sale of cattle in the Chicago stock yards a car load of cows was sold for \$47.50 per head. These figures indicate scarcity that must soon be felt in the products of the cow.

Comic papers picture all farmers with long whiskers, yet are constantly showing how slickly they are shaved by ever sharper who tackles them! Better give farmers credit for less whiskers and more brains.

Fowls lack two or three things in winter, as a rule. They have a hard time to get grit enough and a worse time to find a nice dust bath. Lay in a supply of grit and gather two or three barrels of road dust before it is too late.

What proportion of your flock of hens is more than two years old? On the answer to this question depends your chance for making money out of them. A well balanced flock has one third young pullets, one third hens a year old last spring, and one-third that are two years old. After that age a hen should be sent to the pot for she will not pay her way.

Pick out your most vigorous yearling hens for breeders next

ing this time she does not produce eggs. If she starts in too late the cold weather comes before she is again ready for business and she puts it off until next spring.

FEEDING ENOUGH AND NOT TOO MUCH.

Feeding is a wonderful art. But few comparatively master it in all or even in nearly all its details. The number of men who can take a calf or lamb or a pig at birth, and push it right along until maturity without taking it through some setbacks from over-feeding is very small indeed. The task is very difficult. The difficulty is caused in part, at least, by the difference in the capacity of the animals for taking feed. Very few, even of the most skillful feeders can keep a breeding herd in high condition and yet have the animals breed, yet in this respect some succeed very much better than others. Not many men have been able to maintain dairy cows under high pressure feeding for a number of years but some can succeed in this also better than others.

It is a great matter to carry the animal right along and have them always ready for a good meal. There are more feeders in fitting for the show who overdo rather than underfeed, and consequently there are setbacks. Each setback, of course, means arrested development. Here then, is a business that will always belong to the few rather than to the many.

The aim should be to keep the animals in a nice growing condition. There should not be a day lost in the growth of the animal. If the animal is thus kept growing there will not be any necessity for heavy pressure feeding such as may endanger the well doing of the animals.

SHORT HAY CROP.

It is reported that there were 7,000,000 tons less hay produced in the United States in 1900 than the year before, and 16,000,000 tons less than two years ago. While this enormous shrinkage will have a marked effect on the price of hay it will not prove nearly so disastrous as it would if hay had not been largely supplemented by fodder corn. The knowledge that corn could be planted late, after it was known that the hay crop would be very light, and yet probably produce excellent winter feed for stock proved of incalculable value. Fortunately rains came after corn planting, producing a quantity of fodder that will enable many farmers to sell hay at good prices, who else would not have had enough for their own use.—P. S. and H.

PUMPKINS FOR COWS.

Do pumpkin seeds dry up the cows?

Andrew Johnson, of Fergus Falls, writes that he has a good crop of pumpkins and inquires if there is any danger of drying up the cows by feeding the pumpkins without removing the seeds.

Ans.—We are now feeding our cows very liberally of pumpkins without removing the seeds and they are increasing in flow of milk quite materially. True there is a tradition among farmers that pumpkin seeds increase the excretions from the kidneys and should be removed before feeding, yet we have never noticed any ill effects in our own experience. Henry, in "Feeds and Feeding", page 217, says that "In the dispensary the pumpkin seed is given as a vermifuge with no reference to any other property. Since the seeds contain nutriment, they should not be wasted."—The Farmer.

by stirring the soil frequently get all the seeds in it to germinate, at the same time taking care to allow none to ripen seed, says American Cultivator. Practically there are difficulties in the way, so that while some claim to have in this way greatly lessened the number of weeds in a field, yet there are more than enough to keep a visible supply on hand each year. There are some seeds so light that they are carried far by the wind; others are eaten by the birds and pass through them unbroken, while yet others attach themselves to passing persons or animals and obtain free transportation and are washed down hillsides by rain or carried along by brooks until they find a resting place in some new spot.

Then trouble arises with some kinds in the power they have of remaining for years dormant in the soil until they have just the right conditions of heat and air and moisture to start them into life. It has been related that soil from the bottom of mines thousands of feet below the surface, freshly dug and kept where nothing could reach it from the outside, has been found to produce vegetation, and some plants of varieties which grew and disappeared from the earth before ever primeval man left any traces of his existence here.

There is much less difficulty in exterminating the perennial plants which remain in one spot sending up shoots each year from the root, and extending more by an underground growth of roots than by few seeds they scattered. Most of them can be so weakened by constant cutting of the stalks each season, perhaps once in two weeks or less frequently according to their habit of growth that in a few years they will die of exhaustion from trying to grow seed and perpetuate the species.

With some of them we can call to our animals. The Canada thistle, when cut, will throw up young shoots that are well liked by sheep, especially they are attracted to them by a handful of salt thrown over them. Poultry closely confined in small yards will pick every green thing so closely as soon to kill them out root and branch. There are some kinds of swine which like the roots so well that they will keep them well eaten out so that but few will ever start again. The roots of the bind weed or wild morning glory, the artichoke and some others, are not only eagerly eaten by swine, but they will fatten on them and on some varieties of the common brakes and ferns, if not on all of them.

It is true that the are places, like the lawn, where one does not care to pen up poultry or swine or even to feed sheep and goats for sake of destroying the weeds. Then frequent cutting of the leaves and the digging of roots must be depended upon, particularly for such plants as the docks, nettles and plantain. All will yield to persistent effort, and if some less careful neighbor does not grow plants to reseed your ground a few years will clear up these pests; but a little neglect may give them new vigor after they are almost dead.

Much, too, may be done, if not to kill out weeds, to discourage their growth, by such rapid growing plants on land made very rich as to fairly crowd out or smother down the weed-growth to the dwarf specimens, which may serve to perpetuate themselves by seed, but which do but little damage of themselves. Clover on rich soils is such a crop, and so are some of our garden vegetables.
