On Monday last the National Salt Co. decided to advance the price of table salt from \$1.10 to \$2.50 per hundred pounds.

McKINLEY's plurality at the recent election was 840,000, which is the largest vote ever given any candidate for the presidency.

Gov. PINGREE announces that he will call another special session of the legislature to meet Dec. 10, for the purpose of re-enacting the Atkinson bill.

DEATH claimed two of America's best known capitalists last Monday, in the persons of Marcus Daly, of Montana, and Henry Villard, of New York.

Announcements is made of the formation Friday of a steel plate pool consisting of the principal steel and iron plate manufacturers in the country, 14 in number. The combination at once advanced the price of plates from \$1.25 per pound to \$1.35.

ONE of the duties of the coming legislature will be to redistrict the state into congressional, senatorial and legislative districts, which was last done in 1891. It is to be hoped that they will have sense enough to improve the ridiculous organization of the 28th senatorial district.

THOSE perjury cases in Kentucky are bewildering. When a man swears that he lied when he swore that he wasn't lying, it is a question whether he may have been bribed to swear that he wasn't lying or bribed to swear that he was lying when he wasn't lying.

SENATOR McMILLAN is quoted as saying that probably the only thing that congress will do in the line of trust legislation will be to pass a bill requiring the big combinations to file periodical reports of their transactions. The senator says that the people do not seem to be much alarmed about trusts, judging by the last election.

A CANVASS by Labor Commissioner Cox shows the agricultural implement industry to be in a flourishing condition. Forty-one firms in 35 cities were canvassed and they show an aggregate of \$4,438,626 invested in the business. The output for '99 was valued at \$7,138,340; men employed 3,217; average wages \$1.57 for all kinds of labor

Of the 1,957 patients admitted to the University hospital during the University of Michigan during the year ending June 30, 1900, 1,635 per cent were natives of the United States. The other countries most largely represented are the number or natives of each were: Canada, 94; England, 32; Germany, 92; Ireland 45; Sweden, 14; Scotland 11.

CAPT. JOHN D. HART, of Cuban filibustering fame, died Tuesday of apoplexy. During 1896 two of Capt. Hart's vessels, the Bermuda and the Laura, made frequent trips to Cuba with arms and ammunition for the Cubans. Capt. Hart was convicted in 1896 of participating in a filibustering expedition and sentenced to two years, but was pardoned by the president after serving three months.

CHIEF JUSTICE MONTGOMERY, of the Michigan supreme court, has allowed a writ of error in the case of the Michigan Sugar Co., of Riv City against the auditor-general, to compel the allowance of the claim of the

THE annual report of the superintendent of the dead letter office shows the large increase of total receipts of undelivered mail matter over the previous year of nearly 10 per cent. The number of pieces of matter received from all sources was 7,536,158, against 6,855,983 for the preceding year.

COMPLAINTS made by the state tax commissioners to the governor and attorney general against assessing officers in various cities and townships are the basis of petitions just completed by Attorney General Oren for the removal of these officials from office by the governor. The list includes supervisors in the cities of St. Joseph, Benton Harbor, Adrian, Manistee, Jackson, Marquette, Negaunee, St. Ignace and Mackinac Island, and the townships of Ford River, Delta county, and Dowagiac, Cass county. All are charged with wilful failure to obey the law relative to the assessment of property at its true cash value, or to require the filing of sworn statements.

HARRY H. SMITH, of Washington formerly of Kalamazoo, has just issued an 80 page pamphlet in which he shows why senator Julius C. Burrows, of this state should be expelled from the United State Senate. He makes a strong case, and if one half can be proven, Burrows should not only be expelled from the Senate but sent to states prison. Smith is not much better than Burrows, as he admits that, until he quarreled with Burrows he aided in "fixing up" many of the schemes whereby Burrows robbed the government. The book makes excellent reading for all who wish to learn of the various schemes used to rob the government.

Better Navy Needed.

A Washington dispatch says Rear Admiral Crowninshield, chief of the navigation bureau, makes the statement that the present personnel of the navy would form barely one-fourth of the total establishment necessary to fight a first-class European power. It is barely sufficed for the Spanish war.

The admiral says that the service is being harmed by lack of officers. The naval academy is suffering for want of instructors, and the present high standard of training cannot be maintained, and the admiral predicts that the navy will deteriorate unless proper steps are taken to prevent it. Many of the best officers are being lost as a result of breaking down from overwork.

The admiral calls for naval barracks to replace the unsanitary receiving ships. He says that the physical condition of the navy cadets is averaging lower every year to the abandonment of of the weeding-out system, which formerly prevailed. He complains that thus far there has been no recognition by congress of the services of the naval officers during the Spanish war, except of those who shared in the victory at Manila and three who served elsewhere in the war.

There were 2,452 desertions from the navy and 86 deaths during the past fiscal year. Over 68 per cent of the men in the navy are native born.

Knowing Things.

A knowledge of the common things of life is imperative for our comfort and well being. Call it household chemistry, and alas many a housewife shakes her head in a doubting way and thinks it sounds all very fine; but her mother never studied chemistry in order to be able to cook, and she was famous in her day not only for her good dishes, but for having brought up a strong and vigorous family. And why? Not only were conditions then very different and the food material in use of the simplest and most wholesome kind, as it was probably before the age of food adulteration, but that mother realized that she was building up a nation's brain and brawn and directed her work accordingly. Unfortunately the many examples we have to show as the result of mother's system of feeding do not lead us to conclude that they all worked with the same intelligence.--Ez.

County Canvassers.

The county board of canvassers, which is composed of B. F. Oakes, of East Tawas, John M. Waterbury, of this city and William McFarlane, of AuSable, meet Tuesday for the purpose of canvassing votes cast in this county at the recent election. They finished their labor yesterday.

On the proposition to amend the state constitution there were 2065 votes cast, of which 1889 were for and 176 against.

The vote on presidential electors was 2112, of which 1472 were republicans, 680 democratic, 23 prohibition, five Social Democracy and our each for the populists and socialist labor

There were 2116 votes cast for governor, of which Bliss received 1,321, Maybury 770, Goodrich 18, and seven were cast for other candidates.

The vote on Lieutenant governor was 2109, of which 1398 were for Robinson, 685 for Ramsdell, 21 for Johns and seven for the other tickets.

For congressman 2106 votes were cast, Cruik receiving 1335, Joslyn 745 and Leighton 26.

For state senator Doherty received 1358 and Hartley 763. For member of legislature, Sharpe received 1237 and Macgregor 804.

THE LIFE SAVERS.

No Life Has Been Lost Through Their Inefficiency or Neglect.

Washington, Nov. 14.—S. I. Kimball, general superintendent of the life-saving service, in his annual report to Secretary Gage, says that at the close of the fiscal year the establishment embraced 269 stations, 194 being on the Atlantic, 58 on the lakes 16 on the Pacific and one at the Falls of the Ohio, at Louisville, Ky. The number of disasters to documented vessels within the field of operations of the service during the year was 364. There were on board these vessels 2,655 persons, of whom 2,607 were saved and 48 lost. The estimated value of the vessels involved in disaster was \$6,127,500 and of their cargoes \$3,342,390, making a total value of property imperiled \$9,470,190. Of this amount \$7,234,390 was saved and \$2,235,500 lost. The number of vessels totally lost was 61.

In addition to the foregoing there were during the year 329 casualties to small craft, such as small yachts, sailboats, rowboats, etc., on board of which were 781 persons of whom five were lost. The property involved in these instances is estimated at \$267,070 was saved and \$10,300 lost.

Besides the number of persons saved from vessels of all kinds there were 595 others rescued who had fallen from wharves, piers and other positions of extreme peril, many of whom would have perished without the aid of life-saving crews.

The crews saved and assisted to save during the year, 371 vessels, valued with their cargoes at \$4,005,590, and rendered assistance of minor importance to 685 other vessels in distress, besides warning from danger 194 vessels.

The investigations made into the details of every shipwreck involving loss of life, and into the conduct of the life-saving crews, shows that no life was lost through lack of prompt and faithful efforts on the part of the life-saving men. More than one-half of those that perished were lost by reason of their own boats, instead of remaining on board the wrecks.

The cost of the maintenance of the service during the year was \$1,535,936.

POULTRY AND PET STOCK.

Mammoth Display of Feathered Favorites to Be Made at Buffalo.

There are some 45 national associations interested in poultry raising in the United States. The Live Stock division of the Pan-American Exposition, of which Frank A. Converse is superintendent, is in correspondence with all of these, and a most cordial co-operative spirit is shown on the part of every one toward making the poultry and pet stock show of this Exposition the greatest of the kind ever held. The displays of poultry will comprise about 100 breeds. To these will be added six breeds of turkeys, 11 breeds of ducks and nine breeds of geese.

As an evidence of their interest in the coming show many of the associations have volunteered to duplicate the prizes offered by the Exposition. It is also proposed by the associations to do all in their power to boom this feature of the Pan-American Exposition at the winter poultry shows to be held in Boston, New York, Philadelphia and other cities. It is estimated that not less than 75 per cent of the poultry associations will offer special prizes.

An important feature of the Pet Stock Show will be the exhibit of Belgian hares. The classification, however, covers all kinds of pet stock. The Belgian hares are being extensively raised in various parts of the country on account of the value of their meat. The fine stock in these animals brings a very high price, and the demand is surprisingly great. The Belgian hare is much heavier than the common rabbit, weighing some seven or eight pounds and quite a different animal. Its flesh is described as a cross between venison and mutton and is highly prized in European countries for food. It breeds rapidly and feeds upon such simple and cheap foods as carrots, white oats, lettuce, clover and tender green food of many kinds. It does not burrow and is very tame. Children are very fond of them as pets.

Aside from their value for food, their fur is in demand for making fine felt. This will be the first noteworthy exhibit of these animals in America and will afford an opportunity for every one to gain useful knowledge concerning them.
