**WASHINGTON** dispatches say the use of Pines, lying south of the western end of Cuba, is to be retained by the United States, no matter what disposition is made of Cuba. The Island will be fortified.

**MAJ. Stone**, Gov. Piugree's secretary, has straightened out Michigan's war claims at the federal war department and the state will get a check for \$22,000 more at once. There are about \$95,000 of the claims still to be paid.

**THE** trial of General W. H. White, which was set to begin at Lansing last Monday has been adjourned until next Monday. Possible Gen. White was afraid he would have nothing to be thankful for if it took place before Thanksgiving.

**RURAL** free delivery is making great strides, utterly regardless of the fact that the fourth class postmasters of the country, once a powerful political factor, will soon be a thing of the past by reason of the extension of this service. —Minneapolis Tribune.

**A** new law of garnishment will before the legislature when it meets, to replace the one vetoed by Gov. Piugree. It is proposed to change the law so that a minimum of \$7.50 per week shall be exempt and collections on debts can be made by legal process on all wages coming to the debtor in excess of that amount.

**THE** state grange will meet a Lansing next month. The past year has been the most prosperous in the history of the Michigan grange, 100 new granges having organized. The farmer's clubs will renew their agitation in favor of the enactment of the county salaries, and Torren's system of land transfer bills and other legislation will be endorsed.

**A** COLLECTION to form the basis of dewspayer museum has been begun in the general library of the University of Michigan. The purpose is to bring together the materials for the history of journalism in the state. Contributions will be gratefully received. A Washington land press, such as was used in early times, would be a particularly welcome addition to the collection.

**AN** Indian legislator advocates putting lobsters in a green uniform, with red buttons, so that the simple-minded legislators may know whom they are talking. The idea is a good one, but as a further amendment a special suit and free residence at the expense of the state ought to be provided for some of these great legislators that use money as a war horse. —Minneapolis Tribune.

**NONE** of those who are familiar with the case of Captain Oberlin M. Carter, will, notwithstanding his statement, apprehend that an innocent man has been convicted and sentenced to prison. Capt. Carter was convicted by court martial of embezzling something like \$1,600,000 from the government in harbor contracts, and the sentence was held up a year and a half, while powerful friends sought to have the president find some technicality on which Carter could be released. None, however, could be found, and Carter was unable to show where he had obtained the enormous sums of money that he had been spending. He wrote: "On mature reflection, I should award the palm to something done by a young assistant surgeon of mine, not quite twenty-one years old, Dr. T. Miner, then of Hartford, Conn., at an exceeding convivial supper party of officers, to which a few of my younger subalterns had been invited. "They sat late, and the fun grew fast and furious, the songs sung becoming gradually of that class which Thackray's Colonel Necomb did not approve. Some of the guest tried to get away but could not; and those who attempted it were required to furnish in each case a song, a story or a toast."

Miner was called upon for his share and there was a little hush as he rose up. He had a singularly boyish face, and his manliness of character was known to all. He said, 'Gentlemen. I cannot give you a song or a story, but I will offer a toast which I will drink in water, and you shall drink as you please. That toast is 'Our Mothers.'

"Of course an atom of priggishness or self-consciousness would have spoiled the whole suggestion. No such quality was visible; the shot told; the party quieted down from that moment and soon broke up."

"The next morning no less than three officers from different regiments rode out to my camp, all men older than Mr. Miner and of higher rank, to thank him for the simplicity and courage of his rebuke. It was from them I first learned what had happened. And one who has had much to do with young men will admit, I think, that it cost more courage to do what he did than to ride up to the cannon's mouth." — Charlotte Tribune.
