





CELERY TALK.

Surface Culture In Double Rows With a Manure Mulch.

Apropos of setting celery for fall and winter crops in the south, T. Grenier, a man of mark in the gardening fraternity of the north, meditates



516.1 THE OLD TRENCH SYSTEM. on past and present methods of celery culture after the following fashion recorded in Farm and Fireside:

The method usually employed there is to plant in beds six feet wide, with alleys of same width between each two beds. The space for the plants is fightly excavated, say four inches deep, and the plants are set in rows across the bed, which rows are one foot apart, while the plants in the rows are set six inches apart. The bed is then gradually filled up with earth from the alleys. The prime condition of success in growing celery thus closely together is an excess of available plant foods in the soil. It is not enough that we use plenty of manure in the soil, but this manuze should be oldthat is, well rotted and intimately mixed with the soil. I wonder what success southern people would meet if they were to try the old plan of planting in trenches. Sometimes I have a notion to plant a patch in this way again. The chief difficulty is the fact that in order to go a foot down into the ground we have to dig up a portion of the hard clay subsoil. Of course we have to set the plants in good surface After the trench is dug a lot of soil fine manure and good surface soil, well mixed, must be put back into the trench, say not less than four inches deep, and into this the celery is planted. We may have a single or a double row. I am now quite in favor of making double rows in any way we may plant. It gives double the number of plants and requires only one banking, boarding or filling up. In reality there is little difference between the old trench system and the mulching system as now practiced by me. The illustrations will make this Any way the principle is the plain. Fig. 1 shows the young plants same. in the bottom of the trenches, with banks of earth between the rows. Fig. 2 shows the double rows on the surface of the ground, with banks of coarse manure between each two double rows, the manure being held up and away from the plant rows by boards set up on long edge on each side of each double row. In either case the plants are protected from drying winds and heat. In the mulching system we have another advantage. If weather is very dry and hot, we can let a stream of water, if


The horse that is so vicious ,by nature or spoiled by training and teasing, as to develope into a chronic kicker, is a worthless piece of property. No person can afford to keep an animal who is liable to kick him to death when the chance offers.

The best feed, care and housing will not make up for the overworking of horses. City horses, those that draw heavy drays laden with heavy goods, are generally cared for in the best possible way, but they wear out with great rapidity.

The turkey is the king of birds. This bird shines especially as a roast and is certainly very fine. The yearly waste of wealth from overworkng horses is something enormous. There is no economy in forcing the work of three horses onto two horses. The farmer who regularly practices this error will, in the course of 30 years, spend nearly twice as much for horses as he will have to spend if he keeps enough horses to do his work without exhaustive overworking,

MOISTUKE REQUIRED FORCEOFS-Everybody knows ,that vegetation requires or its growth and perfection large amounts of water, but few realize how large a quantity of moisture is really needed for growing farm crops. It has been said by those who have investigated the question that a single oak tree of roud size has been known to lift through its trunk and evaporate through its foliage 123 tons of water in a month when it was in leaf. Those who are curious upon the subject can try the experiment in a small way by taking a wide monthed bottle and set a plant having a good root and leaf system into it, and then filling the buttle about two-thirds full of water, and closig the mouth of the bottle through which the stem of the plant comes, by pasting paper over the mouth of the bottle in such a way that no evaporation shall take place except through the stem and leaves of the plant. The bottle should be weighed when prepared, and at frequent in tervals afterwards. The experiment is an interesting one, and it has the advantage that alobject lessons possess of impressing the facts in regard to the moisture evaporated through plants in such a way as fhat theyt shall never be forgotten. When the loss of moisture through the plant bas been ascertained for a given time, multiply the amount of it by the number of such plants that usually stand on anacre, and the aggregate will be found to be urprisingly large. Carefully conducted experiments with a umber of crops show that to make a ton of water-free dry matter in a corn corp requires 2 433 acre-inches of water. Oats require a shade over five acre-inches to make a ton of dry mateer; clover 5.345 acre-inches, and potatoes 4.283 acre-inches. An acre-inch will weigh 103.29 tons, and to produce a toa of dry matter in corn will therefore require about 251 tons of water; in oats 516 tons; in clover 552 tons, and in potatoes 45? tons. the figures given show simply the amount of water that must be evaporated through the plant in order to secure the amount of growth ndicated. Nature's way of watering crops is a very wasteful one. Of the rain that falls, some is lost by percolation downward, much of it runs off by surface drainage, and some of it falls in showers so small as to do injury rather thas good for the reason that it destroys the effectiveness of soil mulches without contributing materially to plant growth. A great deal of what is also evaporated from the surface of the soil. The facts serve to impress upon every farmer the necessity for such methods of cultivation, continuously pursued during the growing season, as will conserve to the growing plants as large a proportion as possible of the moisture that descends from the clonds, The amount which plant necessarily take through their stems and foliage in order to make a given growth is enormous. With the losses that are inevitable through percolation, surface drainage and surface evaporation, it stands the farmer well in hand to prevent as much of the



we have it, soak through the manure, thus forcing rapid growth of the plants in any kind of weather by means of the easily assimilated plant foods which the water dissolves from the manure and carries down to the roots of the plants. With celery thus managed and protected there will be very little chance for rusts or blights to attack the foliage, but if they do spraying with bordeaux mixture in the earlier stages of growth or with a weak solution of copper sulphate will gestore the plants to health.




