 The state tax commissioner has at last deternined the average of all th rates of taxation in Michigan. For the year 1900 it is 815,47 for every 31.000 of assessed valuation. The total assments for this year are \$1,$317,450,098$. The total amount of laxes levied in Michigan for the year 1900 was $820.377,243$.The werease in real estate assessed over 1899 is $\$ 180.594,302$, or 51.8 per ent. Roughly estumated, about 870 , 000,000 of this sum was put on the nining property of the upner perinula. The increase in personal proprty over 1899 is $\$ 169,468,254$ or 119 er cent Of thisincreese in peron1 property $\$ 91,789,775$ comes the 78 cities of the state.
