The Blust brothers, of Tawas, have raised beets for the past three years, they being the first to engage in beet raising in this county. In 1898 they made a big profit, but in common with others only succeeded coming out about even in 1899, notwithstanding that they had had one years experience in beet culture. Last week they got their returns from this years crop and the result is highly gratifying, as the returns are the best of the three years.

Bernhart Blust raised two acres of beets, part of which were on clay loam and part on muck land. Those on the loam gave a per cent of 15.1 and those on muck of 14.5. After the expenses of freight on beets to Bay City and the seed had been deducted, Mr. Blust received a check for \$221.63. He figures the cost of raising and loading the beets on cars at \$100.00 leaving a net profit of \$121.63 on two acres of land.

Joseph Blust raised two and a hall acres, part of which gave a per cent of 15.4 and part of 14.5 for the 15.4 beets he got \$5.633 per ton and for the 14.5 beets \$5.33\frac{1}{2} per ton. His beets did not yield quite as many tons to the acre as his brother's yet he made a handsome profit.

These two examples show beyond preadyenture that our farmers made a serious mistake by failing to contract to raise beets this year. This is two often the case. One failure does not always prove that there is not money to be made.

The greatest draw back the farmers of Iosco County have to contend with is the lack of a ready market for there produce. They should neve fail to contract a crop when they have an oportunity to, do so at a fair price for average years. They will make oftener than they loose.


