### Hazing at West Point.

The report to congress on the West Point hazing trouble deals with the subject with out gloves. It shows how this disgraceful custom has grown from year to year until the fights have come to be necessary in order to keep it up. Without them as a means of punishment it would have been impossible to maintain the system. It is fine training for "an officer and a gentleman" to teach him that he may not look an upper classman in the face, and must always address him as "mister" or "sir", while in return he is called by what ever insulting name the fellow who got there a year or two sooner can think of.

It is sure also to cultivate a man's dignity and self respect to turn him into a body servant of an upper classman, to sweep his tent, make his bed, change his collars and cuffs, send the dirty ones to the laundry, and do all the other dirty work that the upper classman can devise.

If we were training a set of overseers for convicts in order to make them harsh enough, we can imagine no better way, and it is not inspiring to learn that many enlisted men feel that the West Point course has been successful in this respect. But since our officers will have to deal for some time to come not only with free-born Americans whom they can insult as they choose, but with alien races, who must be treated with some consideration, the slight change in the curriculum by congress may not be out of place.

One cannot but wonder whether the elegance of our West Point curriculum accounts for the report that our officers in China have been found to be socially "impossible."—*To-Day*.

### Scientific Forestry.

Interest in scientific forestry is rapidly increasing in the South. A preliminary examination has been made by the Division of forestry of the U. S. Department of Agriculture of the large forest in Polk and Monroe counties, Tennessee, owned by Senator George Peabody Wetmore, of Rhode Island. The examination has been established the suitability of this tract to be handled under practical forest methods. Work will now be begun and pushed in making a working plan for the forest, which contains 84,000 acres of hardwood timber.

The Division has also received from the South two other important requests for expert assistance in forest management, both from owners of private tracts. The first is from Okeetee Club, which owns 60,000 acres of Shortleaf Pine land in Beaufort and Hampton counties, in South Carolina. Mr. Overton W. Price, Superintendent of Working Plans in the Division of Forestry, will make a preliminary examination to ascertain whether a working plan for the tract is feasible.

In addition to Shortleaf Pine, this tract contains Cypress in the Swamp lands, and also some hardwood timber. The Okeetee Club's tract borders on the Savannah River, with markets by water and rail at no great distance.

The other request to the Division for assistance comes from northwestern Georgia, where a preliminary examination of 16,000 acres of Shortleaf pine is wanted.

THE state supervisors' association, in session at Lansing, has declared against the fee system and favor of salaries for all county officers. Several years ago the Indiana legislature abolished the fee system, and placed all officers on straight salaries. The change has proved of immense advantage to the taxpayers of that state. The fee system is a pernicious one. One of these days it will be swept aside.

A MANUFACTURER has recently patented a novelty in umbrellas. He is fixing a small electric lamp on to the stick of all his better class umbrellas. If any wayfarer is armed with one of these lamps and is caught in a fog or evening shower, he switches on the electric light by touching a button, and so has a ray of light ahead, enabling him to pick his way without embracing every fellow pedestrian walking in an opposite direction. —Exchange.

A BILL was passed by the senate last week, with provision to give it immediate effect, that changes the time for registration of voters in all towns, villages and cities in the state outside of Detroit, where the matter of registration is controlled by special act. This act requires the registration to be made at all elections two weeks before election day instead of two days before, as it is at present. The intent of the act is to prevent as far as possible the colonization of voters a few days prior to election, by requiring at least two weeks actual residence in the precinct in which a man intends to vote.

HAVING unhorsed the festive lightning rod agent, who gave them so much trouble in former years the farmers of Michigan are now demanding protection from the man who sells fruit trees. During recent years the farmers have had an unpleasant experience with agents who indulge in misrepresentations, both as regards the varieties of trees and the nurseries which they represent. A bill has been introduced in the legislature at Lansing requiring fruit tree agents to deposit security with the clerk of the county in which they desire to do business, guaranteeing that the trees are the varieties they are sold for and that they are the bona-fide agents of the companies they claim to represent.

### There is Money in Sugar Beets.

Canadian farmers living adjacent to the boundry line have undertaken the raising of sugar beets for Michigan refineries. Not only is no bounty needed to stimulate their interest, but they find it profitable even though placed at a disadvantage equaling 80 cents a ton as compared with the Michigan raiser. Figures printed in the Dominion papers show that 9,000 tons of beets for the Marine City sugar factory were raised last summer on the Canadian side of the St. Clair river. The rate paid the Canadians was based on the \$4 a ton rate paid to Michigan farmers. The duty on each ton of beets was 80 cents, leaving \$3.20 for the Canadian farmer. The farmers of Sombra township have formed a refining company and propose to erect during the coming season a factory from which they can get the full rate, for their beets without anything subtracted for the customs officers.

Michigan farmers who allege that there is no money in beet raising even at \$4 and \$4.50 a ton may be interested in one Canadian farmer's experiences. He grew 20 acres of wheat and five acres of beets. He finds that his profits from the five acres of \$3.20 beets were greater than those from his 20 acres of wheat. There are many indications showing that the sugar industry will have a sturdier existence in this state without the bounty than it would have had with the bounty. There may not seem to be an intimate connection between sugar and good roads, but up in Saginaw the establishment of the local sugar factory has already resulted in a sentiment for improved highways among the farmers.

The hauling of the bulky crop to market over the present roads has shown the need for better highways and the money received for the crop has made them so prosperous they think they can afford to pay the high taxes which a comprehensive system of road improvement would make necessary. —Detroit Tribune.

# THE FARM CORNER.

Newsy Items Gathered From Many Sources.

## PEAR BLIGHT.

Every grower of pears should at this season of the year examine his trees for blight. The disease lives over through the winter in the affected branches, and the organisms which produce it are ready to begin work with the first opening of spring and extend their destructive efforts to other branches. Now the trees are denuded of leaves and the condition of all the branches can readily be seen. Those that are dead should be cut off and burned, and all the stray wood lying under the tree should meet with the same fate. Inspect the trees carefully and cut out all infected wood at least a foot below the lowest point where the infection can be seen. A little careful work will now save many a good tree during the coming season.

## DAINTY CALVES.

Probably any one who has ever had experience with calves has noticed a difference in their feeding, says a correspondent of the National Stockman. Some are greedy and eat all that is placed before them; others are always dainty. I have learned that it rarely pays to "fool" with a dainty calf. Better put it out of the way. It will not pay for the fussing. Once dainty always dainty and I have no use for such an animal in the dairy. We want cows that will eat heartily, the more the better, and can size an animal up pretty well by the time it is a month old.

Corn meal is a favorite feed for calves with some, but it is too fattening. A dairy calf does not need to be fat. Time was when a man was ashamed to own a pot-bellied calf, but nowadays unless caused by something else than eating it is a source of satisfaction rather. A dairy cow needs commodious paunch, and the cow is but the calf grown up. Let the heifer calves have lots of roughage. If there is a scarcity of clover hay give them corn stover. They will thrive on it after the first few weeks.

## AN EXCELLENT OBJECT LESSON.

A correspondent of the Rural World gives a very good object lesson for farmers who do not appear to know how to get the most money with the least trouble from their farms. It is as follows:

A few days ago the treasurer (his wife) and I took some butter to our neighboring city. On the road we passed a farmer with two loads of hay, mostly clover. I enquired of him the price he received delivered; it was \$11 per ton. I called the treasurer's attention to our respective loads. This farmer and his hand had two teams and wagons, and his loads were worth \$22. Our load was under the seat of a one seated carriage and sold for \$24. The farmer was taking to town \$12 worth of fertility in his hay, while we took in our load four cents worth. His income from the hay crop came once a year ours came daily.

Farmers have yet to learn a great deal as to the best way to raise their crops, but they have still more to learn as regards what to raise and how to market it.

## LETTUCE FOR CHICKENS.

Lettuce is the best green feed we have ever tried for chickens in confinement. They will turn from clover in any form and greedily devour lettuce in any stage of growth, if it is given to them fresh, or any time before it wilts. An ordinary sized breeding pen, say from five to ten, will eat about eight good sized bunches or stalks three or four times a week, and eat it clean too. By drilling it quite thick in rows and cutting (not pulling) it close to the ground when gathering it for fowls, a little "patch" of ground may be made to yield a sufficient amount for quite a flock during an entire season. Try it and we are quite sure you will arrange for quite a patch next spring.—*Interstate Poultryman*

## WINTER WORK.

Winter is a season the farmers should rejoice in not because it is a season of rest, but because it gives him an opportunity to do so many things that he neglected in the hurry of planting, cultivating and harvesting. We fear that we should not make a success of farming if we were in a region of perpetual summer. We should hinder our work by trying to do too much and leave undone the work that should be done. There are many little things for which there seems to be no great haste. They can be found at any time, and that means that they are never done. When we were farming we used the days when it was not suitable weather to work out, doors, in putting all tools and machinery in good condition including farm wagons and carts, and they were painted, if they needed it, which most of them did even after one year's use. The work might not have been done very artistically, but the paint served to protect the wood from the weather. Then harnesses were cleaned mended and oiled, and repairs made on gates, fences, etc., while during the pleasant days manure was drawn out and the summer wood brought home. All this so helped when the spring work began that if we desired to go on a farm again we should much prefer to take it in November than March unless we were sure that our predecessor had not been one who spent the winter days in getting ready for the coming season.—*American Cultivator*

## THE STATE ROUND UP FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

If you will buy your ticket on Monday February 25th, you can get passage to Lansing and return for one fare for the round trip. The state round up Farmers Institute occurs the last three days of February, at the Agricultural College. The program is a novel one. In the forenoon the crowd is divided into three sections. The women go to the women's building where for three days instruction is given in domestic art, cooking and sewing. The fruit men have a section by themselves each forenoon, with a program that would be justice to any fruit convention. In the general farm section a drill is given every day in stock judging taking up horses on Tuesday, cattle on Wednesday, and sheep and swine on Thursday. The best talent available is secured for training the people attending in the art of judging live stock. Every day at nine o'clock instruction is given on veterinary topics and at ten on stock feeding. The afternoons and evenings are given up to more general topics. The institute is thus in itself, college education in brief. No farmer who can possibly leave his business can afford to miss this opportunity.

## PREPARATIONS FOR THE GARDEN SEASON.

That the farmer's garden is as a rule too much neglected will, I think, be generally conceded. And yet I believe there is a growing interest in this direction, and perhaps such as are enough interested to begin thus early in the year to consider the needs and requirements for the coming gardening season may welcome a few suggestions.

First, let every reader who has not already done so, send for several of the leading seedsmen's catalogues, nearly all of which may be had for the asking, or at least may be secured for a nominal sum, and make a selection of such seeds, both in flowers and vegetables, as will be needed for the season's use. Order the seeds early, as by so doing the chances are better of receiving exactly what is ordered; and if any errors do occur there is time to make corrections; so that when the gardening season opens, you have on hand just those seeds, bulbs, etc., that are wanted for your garden, and the planting of early vegetables is much more likely to be attended to properly than where this work has been neglected until they are wanted for immediate use.

If the garden has not already received a bountiful supply of stable manure, there is no better time than this to make such applications, and if put on now, unless too coarse and strawy, it will work down into the soil nicely during the spring rains, and be in much better condition for appropriation by the growing plants than if neglected until the ground is settled in spring.

It is an excellent plan, too, to see to it now, while the year's supply of fuel is being provided for, as it is on most farms at this season, that an ample supply of bean poles, brush for peas, etc., is drawn and delivered for the garden; and this can be done, by a little forethought now, without scarcely any real additional labor, and will be found a valuable saving of time in the busy season, while, if it is put off until then, it is apt to be neglected entirely.

The thrifty farmer will of course, see to it that all garden tools are looked after in advance, and needed repairs made upon them, or, where necessary, that they are replaced by new ones. The sash of hot beds and cold frames, where these are used, should also be carefully looked after, and many other little details will suggest themselves to those interested in this line of work which it is unnecessary to call attention to, except in a general way.—E. J. BROWNELL, in *Country Gentleman*.
