Gen. Cassius M. Clay Deserves Kindly Consideration.

While the domestic disasters and mental failings which in his latter years have attracted national attention to Gen. Cassius M. Clay are not without their humorous aspects, humor is lost in pathos to those who remember the splendid achievements and noble courage of this remarkable man in his younger days. It is worth remembering that Gen. Clay graduated from Yale college five years before Admiral Dewey was born. His parents were slave-holders in Kentucky; but his reason was convinced and his enthusiasm enlisted in the anti-slavery cause by a speech of William Lloyd Garrison. Fifteen years before Sumpter was fired on, Clay with a courage and audacity hardly conceivable began the publication of an abolitionist paper in Lexington, Ky.

Familiarity with his subsequent career is sufficient guarantee that his abolition utterances were neither mild nor usual. His office was mobbed, and he was compelled to flee to Cincinnati, where, however; he continued the publication of his paper and managed to circulate it in Kentucky. That was in '45. In the two succeeding years he distinguished himself as an officer of volunteers in the Mexican war. After returning home he continued to share prominently in the agitation for abolition, though still residing in the south, and was an earnest supporter first of Fremont and next of Lincoln. The latter made him minister to Russia, where he served through two administrations, including the difficult period of the civil war, and while the negotiations for the purchase of Alaska were in progress. In the years when, as a southern abolitionist, he commanded national attention, Gen. Clay's personal safety was due in large to his prestige and powers as duelist, and throughout his long life he has given exhibitions of the same disdain for danger which in a more or less burlesque form distinguished his conduct in last week's troubles with the sheriff.

It is sad to see a man of such fine parts, who deserved so much of his country's and of humanity's gratitude, brought into general ridicule through popular forgetfulness of past achievements, and through living beyond the retention of his intellectual power.—*Detroit Tribune.*

Moving Pictures For The Blind.

The newest moving picture machine is for the blind. It is a cinematograph in which pass under the fingers of the blind a series of reliefs representing the same object in different positions the branch of a tree, a bird, or any other object. This conveys the same impression to the blind that the moving pictures do to one who can see. The scheme has been tried with success by Dr. Dussard of the Psychological Institute of Paris, who has devised an electric vibration which gives to the incurably deaf the motion of musical rhythm. For those not entirely deaf he has invented a "gradual amplifier of sounds," which supplements the organs of hearing, and in some cases improves them.—*Ex.*

The President's Fund.

What is called the "president's private fund," known in law as the emergency fund, stands nominally to the credit of the secretary of state. But Mr. McKinley is really the secretary of state and he draws on this appropriation just when and how he pleases. The manner of its expenditure is always secret, and nobody knows what is done with the money. Even congress has no right to inquire and has never done so, the idea being that there are certain matters, especially such as relate to diplomatic negotiations, which may not properly be placed before the public—that is to say, without injury to the public weal. This fund varies in amount, but of late years it has been between \$60,000 and \$100,000 per annum.

The memoranda relating to the expenditure of the private fund are kept in a safe at the department of state. Nobody, save a few privileged officials, have ever seen it, but, if they could be published they would throw a picturesque light upon the inside workings of the government, particularly in regard to its relations with foreign powers, if anything turns up which makes it expedient to obtain certain information abroad in a quiet way a draft is made upon the fund by a voucher which the president himself signs and sends over to the secretary of state, this voucher being equivalent to a check on the treasury. The negotiation of the preliminaries of a treaty, such as that for the purchase of the Danish possessions in the West Indies may make another call upon the personal credit of the executive, which is likewise drawn upon to pay for entertainment when a royal or official visitor from foreign parts comes to Washington.—*Saturday Evening Post.*

Alcohol in Cubes.

A London newspaper says that alcohol is now being rendered into an industrial product with which we are quite unfamiliar. Mixed with nitro-cellulose, such as collodion, and evaporator, the product assumes a jelly like consistency which hardens on exposure. Cut in to cubes, or pressed into ornamental shapes and perfumed the substance is obtaining a considerable vogue as a heating agent for drawing room purposes. It burns with a most power full heat, and leaves neither ash nor discoloration, and mixed with benzol it is being utilized for candles.

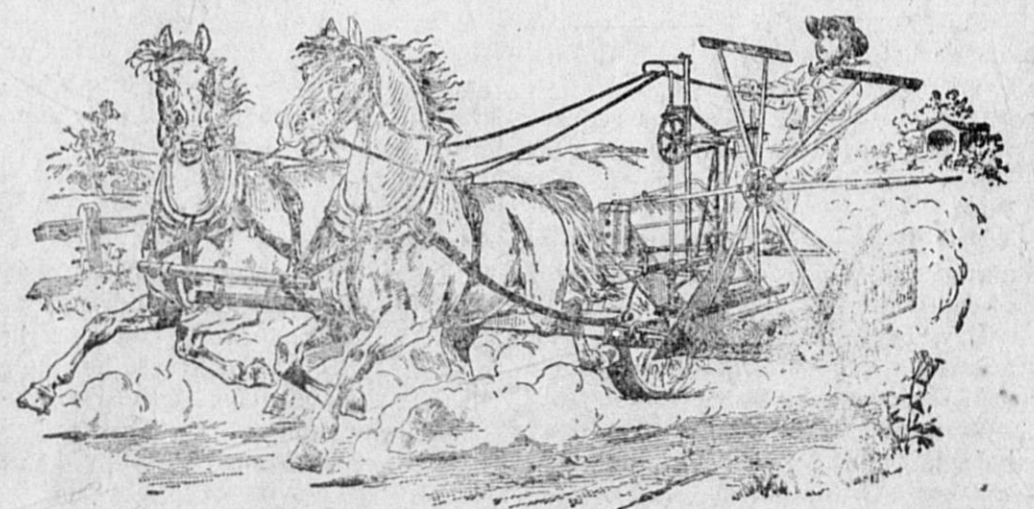
