The President's Fund.

What is called the "president's private fund," known in law as the emergency fund, stands nominally to the credit of the secretary of state. But Mr. McKinley is really the secretary of state and he draws on this appropriation just when and how he pleases. The manner of its expenditure is always secret, and nobody knows what is done with the money. and has never done so, the idea being that there are certain matters, especially such as relate to diplomatic weal. This fund varies in amount, \$60,000 and \$100,000 per annum.
