

Weekly Climate Crop Report.

The mean daily temperature for the week ended June 15 was 65.2 degrees, or 0.9 of a degree below the normal; the average total precipitation was 0.60, or 0.14 of an inch below the normal; the sunshine averaged 63 per cent of the possible amount.

With the exception of the cool weather and light frosts at the begining of the week, the weather during the past seven days has been generally faverable for crop growth and field work. Frosts of some severity occured Sunday over the Upper Peninsula and portions of the northern and central counties; the damage was mostly confined to small fruits, corn, The trust business was certainly potatoes and garden truck, and generally light. The rainfall has been very unevenly distributed, being very heavy in some sections and very light in others.

> Corn shows a general improvement and much of it is now under cultivation; considerable replanting has been done during the week. Oats have also improved, but are rather short. early potatoes have made good progress and are generally yery promising. Sugar beets. although rather slow, are generally doing well, and thinning in general. The condition of wheat continues generally poor and many fields have been plowed up. Rye is in good condition. Peas and barley are doing well; barley is heading. Bean planting is well advanced and the seed is germinating finely. Buckwheat seeding is about completed in the northern and central counties and in progress in the southern. Late potato planting is well advanced. Pasturage is fair. Old meadows are rather poor, but new ones indicate fair yields of hay; haying will begin next week in the southern counties. Fruit prospects continue good, although some curl leaf is reported in peaches, and apples are not so promising as they were two

Notice is hereby given to the property owners of the city of Tawas City, by order of the Health Officer of said city, to place their premises in a sanitary condition as provided by law, and which is done to protect the health of this city. The Health Officer personally requests the cooperation of all in the work of the adminstration in its efforts to make Tawas City a clean and wholesome city. SMALL POX.

There Abpears To Be Numerous Cases In East Tawas.

For sometime there has been much discussion as to whether or net there was small pox in the Tawases or not. There has been many cases of what has been called chicken pex hy some doctors, while others pronounced it small pox. No precaution has been taken to prevent its spreading. It has finally become an epedimic at East Tawas and some four or five cases are believed to have occured in this city. The health officials of East Tawas finally sent for Dr. George E. Ranny, state expert on communicable diseases, and he arrived Wednesday, and in company with Dr. D. C. Howell, of that city visited several of the cases. He immediately confirmed Dr, Howell's diagnosis and pronounced it small pox. Dr. Ranney says, as is the case throughout Michigan and the country at large, the cases are very mild, and if due precaution is taken there is no danger of the disease spreading to any great extent. We are informed that all cases have been quarentined, and all precaution is being taken to stop the further spread. Some seven or Tuesday evening was the occasion eightfamilies are reported as afflicted at East Tawas.

Two well developed cases were reported to Health Officer Wakeman. in this city yesterday and the house was quarentined. They are at the home of George Wescott, who resides near the back end of the fair ground.

All cases are of t very mild nature the patients suffertng no particular illness aside from the breaking out. If proper caution is taken the probabilities are that the disease will be stamped out with in a short time.

FARM NOTES.

For destroying lice in poultry houses the kerosene emulsion is sometimes used, but it gives better results when a tablespoonful of crude carbolic acid per gallon is used at the time of making the emulsion, which may then be diluted with ten gallons of water to each gallon of the emulsion.

A sheep of the mutton breeds is worth more now than both a sheep and its wool twenty years ago. Farmers saw nothing in sheep but wool; hence the sheep sent to market were very inferior. Now the choice carcasses sent to market weigh heavily and give good profits independently of wool.

The pea weevil has been a pest for years, and it is difficult to secure seed perfectly free from the pests. An excellent plan is to pour the seed into a vessel containing brine. The infested peas being lighter than the others, will float, when they may be skimmed off and consigned to the flames or fed to poultry. The sound seed should then be rinsed with clear water to remove the salt, spread on mats or boards to dry.

As soon as the strawberry plants cease bearing they will send out runners. To have potted plants place small flower pots filled with rich soil, near the parent plant, sinking the pots in the ground to the level of the top soil. Place a runner in each pot, holding it in place with a small clod, until it becomes well rooted in the pot, which will be in about ten days or two weeks, when the connection between it and the parent plant may be severed. These plants will come into bearing next spring, or may be transplanted to the open ground in fall or early spring.

During the cool nights the cutworms are at work cutting down the newly transplanted cabbage, tomato and other plants. The cutworm eats only at night, going into the ground just before day, usually at the root of the plant that it has cut down. By going over the garden and digging for the worm wherever a plant has been cut it can be found and destroyed. It will hardly be possible to go over a field every morning, but they can be materially reduced in a garden be destroying them at the places of their depredations.
