Detroit's Celebration.

The general public is, no doubt, much more interested in what it hopes to see than what is commemorated by such scenes. It is however, interesting to recall, to the minds of those who propose to view the grand celebration at Detroit on the three days beginning July 24, something of the landing of Cadillac, yet the patriotic women of Detroit propose, by storied urn and bronze tablet, to do more than this. They propose to put on Detroit's pleasure spot Belle Isle, (named after Gov. Cass daughter Belle), an appropriate stone cross, bearing a bronze tablet which shall recite how in 1610 two black robed priests threw down the stone image of the Manitou, the heathen god of the Algonquins, and erected on the sight thereof the great cross of Christianity. They propose to mark, also, the site of the fort where, for a long period of time, the hardy band pioneers defended themselves and their dear one from the tomahawk and scalping knives of the Indians. They propose; also, to mark the scene of the battle of Bloody Run and to commemorate, by a bronze tablet, in a suitable spot, the raising of five flags over the fort and town, and the pulling down of four of them, leaving up at last, the white striped banner that to day floats over the town. They also propose to mark other historic spots, for instance, the home of Gen. Grant, the site of old Fort Shelby, the start of the great fire, the establishment of the first court of justice and in all 15 places of historic interest about the city. These ceremonies will be interspersed between the parades, receptions, feasts and other features of the celebration during the three days and form very interesting portions of the celebration during the three days.

A Talk On Good Road.

The subject of good roads was discussed before the Industrial Commission by D. P. Hutchinson, of Charlotte, N. C. His statement, which was rather long, dealt entirely with the roads in that state. The movement for road improvement, he said, did not begin in the country, out in the towns, where its strongest advocates and supporters were to be found. The building of the first macadamized road in Mecklenburg county, North Carolina, was made possible by the citizens of Charlotte submitting to a road tax, in addition to their town taxes.

The roads, Mr. Hutchinson said, were worked by convicts. One effect of improved country roads, he said, was to increase the value of suburban property. Farming lands on macadam roads within two or ten miles of town, he said, have increased from 40 to 100 per cent in value in the last ten years. In the opinion of the witness good country roads were most desirable and the money invested came back to the people by way of increased land values.

Taxes Off.

After next Monday, July 1 the internal revenue tax will be discontinued on the following:

On bank checks, postoffice money-orders, promissory notes, leases, mortgages, export bills of lading, manifests for custom house entry or clearing of cargo, powers of attorney protests, warehouse receipts, telegraphic dispatches, medicinal proprietary articles, perfumery and cosmetics, chewing gum, drafts and order for the payment of money otherwise than at sight or on demand (drafts and orders for the payment of money otherwise than at sight or on demand remain taxable), certificates of deposit, certificates of all kinds, except certificates of profits or showing interest in property or accumulations of companies, express receipts (domestic freight bills remain taxable), policies of insurance and premiums charged for marine, inland, fire, casualty, fidelity and guarantee insurance.

Taxes will be reduced July 1 on conveyances of real estate, passage tickets, cigars, snuff and tobacco, fermented liquors, foreign bills of exchange and foreign money orders.

Richest Nation In The World.

The richest nation in the world proportionately is not Great Britain, not fat little Holland, not even the United States.

For the greatest average individual wealth we must look to the Australian commonwealth.

Last year the total value of the products of the colonies forming the Australian commonwealth amounted to fully \$550,000,000 of which their pastoral industries represented \$150,000,000, their agricultural \$140,000,000 their mineral products fully \$100,000,000 and their manufacturing and other industries the remaining \$160,000,000.

The wool alone from the 120,000,000 sheep raised in 1900 was worth \$100,000,000.

The mineral resources of Australia cannot even be guessed at. In the last 48 years the country has produced gold to the value \$1,800,000,000, in the last 20 silver to the value of \$150,000,000.

Diamonds are found in one district, rubies in another. There is at least one emerald mine in New South Wales and opals equal to any in the world are found in Queensland, while the pearl fisheries of the north-western coast produce a considerable portion of the most valuable pearls of commerce.—New York World.

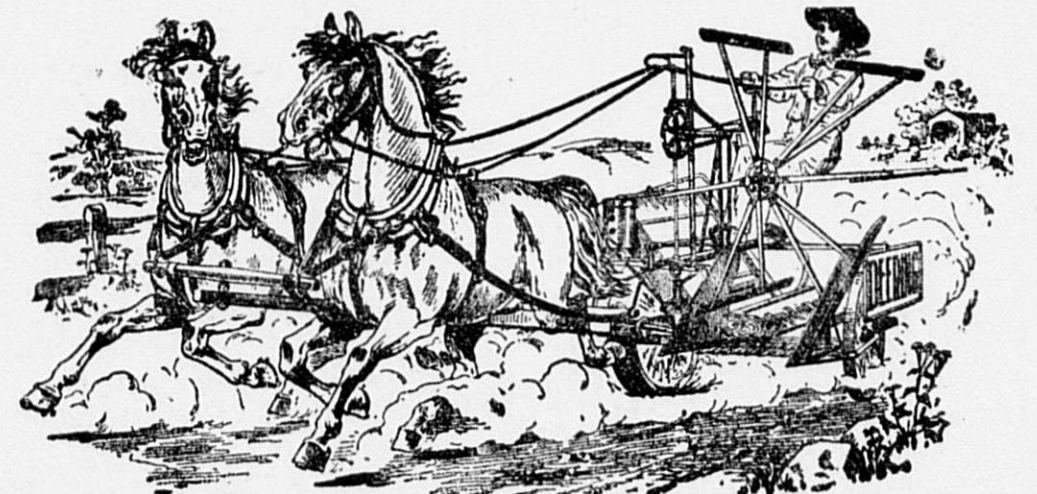
