Weekiy Climate ane Crop Report

The following report was issued by friends here are extended her, the U.S Department of Agricultural, Climate and Crop Bulletin of the weather Bureau, Michigan Section, for the week ending June 22, 1901.

The mean daily temperature for the week ended June 22 was 65.0 degrees. or 1.7 degrees below the normal; the average total precipitation was 0.65, or 0.09 of an inch below the normal; Millersburg News of last week thus: the sunshine averaged 58 per cent of the possible amount.

The weather cenditions of the past seven days have been generally favorable in most counties; the warmer temperatures have had a decided effect on the growth of crops and the germination of late seeding; the rainfall was unevenly distributed, and in the Northern counties the absence of precipitation is being felt.

Corn has shown a marked improvement in all sections; it has greatly improved in color and made consider able growth; considerable replanting and planting have been done and its cultivation is now quite general. Oats, peas barley and garden truck have improved. Oats are heading in the southerly counties but is generally rather short. Rye is promising but reports regarding wheat continue discourage: it is siill crinkling considerably and showing the continued ravages of the Hessian fly. Bean and late potato planting are about finished; beans have germinated nicely and made a good stand. Early potatoes are in fine condition and very prombegun in the southern and central most of the cut being clover; old

Profitable but Unusual Practice.

Done After the "June Drop." This operation is much recommended, is favored by many of the growers, but as a matter of fact is not generally practiced, though it is done more in some sections than in others.

A peach tree under normal conditions will assimilate a certain quantity of food material during the time it is developing a crop of fruit.

Peach trees are inclined to overbear -that is, set-more fruit than they can a period of drought accompanied by retary Coburn in his March report. It properly mature with the amount of food material it is possible for them to assimilate. Hence it is that the fruit all remains small, not reaching the size that will bring satisfactory prices in ed: the markets.

Thinning the fruit will reduce the strain upon the tree. There will be, so to speak, a smaller number of mouths to feed, and the remaining fruit will be correspondingly larger.

As the severest strain upon the tree is occasioned by the development of the seed the thinning should be done before the seed begins to harden. This will be while the fruit is still quite small. It will be safe to begin as soon as the "June drop" is passed.

The objection that many hold to thinning is the expense of the operation. But unless there are severe storms very little of the fruit which remains on the tree after the "June drop" will fall off. It then follows that it is only a question, between picking the fruit off in June and throwing it on the ground and picking it off a little later and putting it in a basket.

If the fruit is thinned to from four to six inches apart, it will be better than if it is closer. It is a common experience that trees so thinned will actually produce a greater bulk of fruit than unthinned trees, and the fruit from such trees is practically all first grade. Even if the bulk of fruit is somewhat less than from unthinned trees the amount of high grade fruit is sufficient to commend the operation.


The fruit may be thinned considerably by keeping the tops properly pruned, but much of it must be done by hand. In this way the imperfect fruit can be removed, leaving only that which is likely to develop into the best spectmens. This method will greatly when it is marketed.

As a rule growers experience considerable difficulty in getting their men to thin their fruit sufficiently, but it is important that the matter be followed up closely .- H. P. Gould, Maryland.

About Buckwheat.

In central Illinois about the first week in July will be a good time to sow buckwheat. It requires a rich soil, a half bushel of seed per acre being the right quantity to sow. Stiff clay and wet soils are not so good for buckwheat. We could not say whether it can be made a profitable crop or not. This is a matter that has to be regulated by market conditions and demands. It makes excellent bee pasture, but the period for collecting is short. and in order to get the most good out of it succeeding crops should be grown -that is, sowing some buckwheat every week through the season beginning early in the spring. If wanted solely for bees, it can be plowed under when the blossoms have been used and again put to buckwheat. Three crops of blossoms have been known to be raised on the same ground in a single season, says Iowa Homestead.

Agricultural Brevities.

In orchards badly infested with cankerworm late spraying with some form of arsenic, which is most safely used in bordeaux mixture, may do good if the worm is still feeding.

A great deal depends upon how water from one to two weeks after the plants is put on. If you begin your irrigation before it is very dry, you don't need so much water, but if you let your ground get very dry and then put on your wa-

ter you need a great deal more of it. For field culture for the canneries good strong tomato plants should be ready for the field from the middle to the latter part of June, the time which they are usually set in New Jersey and Maryland.

Completely Controlled by Spraying.

Shading Is an Advantage. Many failures with celery are due to blight or rust. The most favorable condition for the fungus which causes it is considerable heat and followed by damp weather. The Maryland station has made a study of this trouble, and from its reports the following is learn-

With one plat of celery in 1899 a framework 18 inches high was built

The shading was begun about the middle of July, as soon as the plants were placed in the beds, and was continued throughout the entire hot season of July and August. Early in September the weather turned cooler, and the shading was then discontinued, since it has been learned that the celery blight fungus will not thrive in cool weather. Just how far the shading prevents the fungus from growing or renders the celery plants more vigorous and resistant it is difficult to determine.

SHORTHORN CATTLE.

eginning and Progress of the Breed In This Country.

At the beginning of the past century there had been a number of small importations of Shorthorn cattle made to this country, more especially into several eastern states, and in 1817 shipments were made into Kentucky, from a part of which are descended the cattle known to American breeders as the unfashionable "Seventeens," says Secis scarcely possible to conjecture the number of Shorthorns that have been imported to and bred in the United States, as previous to 1845 no American herdbook was kept. Entries have been closed for volume 48 of the American Shorthorn herdbook, and that, with its predecessors, will contain pedigrees of 162,000 bulls and 279,000 cows, or a total of 441,000 pure bred Shorthorns with lineage recorded in the United States alone to date, besides which pedigrees of 4,000 bulls and 8,000 cows have already been filed with the editor for publication in volume 49.

In color Shorthorns may be either red or white or any combination of these. The red may vary in shade from a light or yellow to a very dark or mahogany, the latter at present being the favorite with many breeders in this country, while the white is least popular or, in fact, scarcely acceptable at all. In England the roan color is valued most highly, and in America it is an especial favorite in the feed lots, although breeders of thoroughbreds are partial to red, because they claim that animals of that color, unaccountable as it may seem, in consideration of their conceded superior quality, are more readily and profitably sold for breeding

The cows vary greatly in the milking quality at present, but early in their hostory were valued highly for the dairy. In later years a majority of breeders have unfortunately been so absorbed in the development of the beef making qualities of their stock as to greatly neglect the equally important matter of development in milk and butter production, a condition which true friends of the breed will hope to see modified for the better from year to year in the future.

eat the dirt to get the fodder. Green Food For Hogs.

There is nothing cheaper and nothing some kind for hogs, says a Kansas grower in Prairie Farmer. It is good for their health and to make growth and is also good for the growth of the all the good alfalfa or other grass they make as much growth on pigs as 20 rye, which also is a good green food. In the fall of 1899 I sowed a field to high enough for them to get a bite they were let into the field. They had the run of it till near harvest time, when the plants are still in the seed bed and they were shut out just soon enough to allow what they had not destroyed to ripen. After ripening it was harvested, then thrashed from the shock. The yield was 25 bushels of grain to the acre of a splendid sample. Not bad, was it? Two crops in one-a crop of pork and a crop of grain.

Another field had been prepared for the pigs to go as soon as they were shut out of the rye. One-half of this field was sown to Kaffir corn, the other half to rape in the spring of 1900. The Kaffir corn seemed to please them best for some time. They feasted on it until near fall, and then they commenced on the rape, which furnished lots of feed for them until winter. By that time another field of rye was ready for them. Rape is a splendid food for hogs. They eat it and grow, for they like it. It will still grow after being eaten off and will furnish more green stuff until winter, as it takes a hard frost to kill it.
