The Eye in the Dark.

Toward nightfall, as the light grows
scarce and dim, the pupil of the eye in-
creases to its greatest size so as to

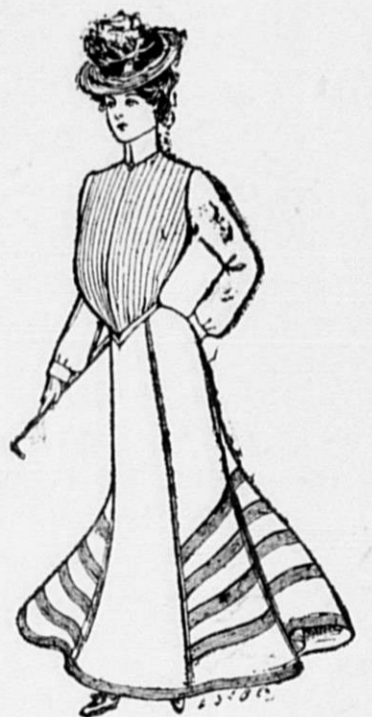

Ex-Sheriff Clark Esmond, of Hale, died last Friday, at Welch's camp near Loon Lake where he was at work. He was taken ill with inflammation of the bowels early in the week and died very unexpectedly. The deceased was about 56 years of age and one of the pioneer residents of this county. He leaves one son and one daughter, besides other relatives and a large circle of acquaintances.
