Michigan's Public Schools.

General statistics concerning the public school system of Michigan have been given out by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Fall. The figurers are based on reports received for the school year ending September 3, 1900, but they are the latest obtainable. It is shown that according to the school census of the year there were 721,698 pupils of school age in the state, of this number 427,966 being in ungraded schools and 293,732 in graded schools. The total enrolment, however, was only 504,985, while the estimated number of pupils attending private schools was 52,239. The number of teachers necessary to supply the ungraded schools was 6,452 and graded schools 6.815. The total number of men teachers employed in all schools was 3,240 and women teachers 12,648. The total number of teachers employed in all schools was 15,924.

The total wages of all teachers for the year were \$4,503,549.39. The average wages of male teachers in graded schools were \$70.86 per month and in ungraded schools \$29.03, women teachers in graded schools are are paid on the average \$43.50 per month and in angraded schools \$24.78.

The number of teachers holding state or normal school certificates was 1,925 and the whole number of qualified teachers in the state was 15,313. There are 8,035 school houses in the state and the estimated yalue of the property is \$19,338.173. Male teachers were paid \$1,096,-480.93 and women teachers \$3,405-027.85. The total net expenditures of all the schools for the year was \$7.297,691. The total primary school money apportioned wss\$1,531,837.45, the per capita rate for the year being \$2.15.





Sugar Industry in the State.

Michigan stands second among the states of the union as a beet sugar producing state, and, according to the state labor commissioner, given out Saturday, it is rapidly foregoing to the front.

There are three factories at Bay City, one at Caro, one at Rochester, one at Alma, one at Kalamazoo, one at Benton Harbor, one at Helland, and one at Marine City. The plants which will be in operation for the first time this season are located at Lansing, Saginaw and Salzburg. The plants that will go into operation next season are at Harbor Beach. Sebewaing, Mt Clemens, Carrollton, Lapeer and Croswell. Companies have organized to build four new plants, two of which will be in Wayne county, one at Caseville and the other at Mt. Clemens.

Any chemist will supply you with such a compound, or it may be made by mixing one-half ounce of finely powdered camphor with four ounces of elder ointment. Another useful dressing, especially when flies are troublesome, is the glycerin and carbolic acid. In many cases it is necessary to draw off the milk by means of a teat tube or siphon. A laxative dose, 12 to 16 ounces of Epsom salts, is useful in cases of erythema mammillarum. -Farm and Home.

Don't Excite Milk Cows.

To rush cows into the stable from the pasture night or morning is to excite them sufficiently physically to heat their milk to a feverish point, quickly undermining its quality. So, in order to preserve milk in hot weather, aeration, ice and cold water are a mockery unless the cows are kept cool and free from irritation. For this reason I have no use for even the most intelligent dogs to assist in driving cows to and from the pasture, says a correspondent of Wisconsin Agriculturist.
