UN-REPENTANT.

Czolzosz Pays the Penalty of His Crime.

Auburn, N. Y., Oct. 29.-President McKinley's assassin is dead. Leon F. Czolgosz, ailias Fred Nieman, was successfully electrocuted was pronounced dead at 7:16:15 a.m. With the purely animal courage that had sustained him and the innate coward within him struggling to his lips, the youthful murderer, hated by a nation and the world at large, paid the penalty for his fearful crime, In less time almost than it takes to tell it, the deadly current had passed through his body, rubbing out his and unerring swiftness.

The autopsy which was conducted by a number of physicians showed Czolgosz's brain to be in a perfect normal condition. It was above the average in weight and formation, and shoved not the slightest leision. The doctors say every organ in the body was in a normal condition at the time of his death.

Seated in the chair with the fatal current about to be applied, Czolgosz facing the witnesses, said: "I shot the President because I thought it of all nations. I am not sorry for the juveniles. my crime."

During this time the attendants were busy strapping him to the chair. His last words were. "I am heartily and other winter complaints. One sorry I did not see my father." The New Fish Hatcheries.

The Michigan fish commission met Saturday afternoon and decided upon locations for two new fish hatcheries allowed by the last legislature. The trout fishery will be on the east branch of the Au Sable river, near Grayling, in Crawford county, while the bass hatchery will be in Drayton Plains, Oakland county. The maximum out put of the fish commission hatcheries so far for any one year has been 6,000,000 trout and 800.000 bass fry. With the new hatcheries the commission hopes to produce from 12,000,000 to 15,000,000 trout fry and 4,000,000 bass fry a year.



While the varieties named and most of the lilies are hardy, some winter protection, especially in cold climates, will add to the strength of the plants the following season. During the summer, especially if the weather is dry, special care will be needed to keep the bed moist. Watering only is not enough, for a summer mulch of some kind should be provided.

Apples For Cold Storage.

Picking and packing should be carried on at the same time. If for any reason this cannot be done, have the apples taken to the packing house as fast as gathered and get them under cover. It is the very worst possible practice to pile them on the ground in the orchard.

PROFITABLE PASTURES.

From Every Square Inch of Land. One of the surprising things in farming is the gradual development of land to a point where it will yield returns never dreamed of by the early cultivators, says American Cultivator, Over Two Well Known Japanese Lilles in parts of England and Scotland farm- New ers and dairymen make a living from pasture lands which have an assessed valuation of \$400 and \$500 an acre. They do this when prices for the products are no greater than American farmers receive. The secret of their sult they have some of the finest pasand compact that it is almost impossible to cut through it. The roots form grows luxuriantly, even defying dry weather, and produce good crops in spite of close cropping late in the season, when frost ordinarily kills less successful pasture. The thing of it is the farmers have cultivated the soil, planted and replanted grass seeds, dressed the pastures repeatedly with 2 fertilizers and made them in every way productive and fertile. The soil is not more adapted naturally to pastures than millions of acres in this country which today produce only indifferent crops of grass. The soil is made artificially rich, and the sod is the result of careful, intensive farming.

So it is these English farmers make a profit from land worth ten times as much in money valuation as the pasture fields of this country. Now, if it is possible to improve pasture fields so that they will produce like these English ones, what an enormous profit awaits the American farmers who will improve their fields to the same productive fertility! SEED CORN.

Butts, Middles or Tips-A Pointer For Corn Growers.

According to the Ohio experiments, there is no practical difference in the yield from either butts, middles or tips of ears of corn and no difference in the number of barren stalks.

A contributor to Wallace's Farmer says: "Of course not. Why should there be? But if they had mixed butts, tips and middles together and planted them they would have had a better yield. Their experiment shows nothing more than that butts, tips and middles when planted separately are each one as good as the others. This I have always claimed. However, to increase the yield and have the ears fill out at each end the corn of the entire ear should be planted. The grains from the butt being a little later and those from the tips a little earlier, the period of pollenization is thereby prolonged, and better results are thus obtained."



A very showy and floriferous geranium bed, a rod in diameter, was of the variety Dryden. It is a single flower, the petals being scarlet and white in about equal parts or stripes. I returned three times to have another look at it, it was so striking and peculiar. A Long Island florist had an oblong bed of the new scarlet geranium Pasteur. It is a brilliant scarlet, of gigantic size of truss and a very free bloomer.

A very peculiar bed was a small oval one of giant leafed, copper colored coleus. The leaves were as large as large plantain leaves. The prevailing color was copper, with dull markings of lighter shades. A NEW BASKET PLANT.

A Trailing Flower For the Window. Neat Foliage and Profuse Bloom. Campanula isophylla mayii is a new trailing bellflower that seems admirably adapted for the window garden, says Rural New Yorker. It has neat, small foliage, a slow, rambling growth and is a remarkably profuse bloomer. The flowers are saucer shaped and of a clear lavender blue. Hundreds of these attractive blooms open at a time on plants small enough for a five inch pot, presenting a continuous mass of color. They are about two inches across and last several days.

The plant should be grown in a partially shaded place and likes well drained soil and an airy situation. During hot and muggy weather the plants under glass lose most of their growth from mildew, but at once start freely when removed to a shaded porch.

It is still so scarce that it has not been tried much in an amateur way, but there is little doubt it will make an important addition to the few plants really adapted to cool and half shaded windows. When grown in pots, it can it thrives especially well when allowed to trail over the sides of a deep basket. Campanula isophylla, the species from which this new variety was derived, is a native of Italy and is often grown on shady rockeries. There is a white form that is very popular, but it is not so free in bloom as C. isophylla mayii.
