UN-REPENTANT.

Czolgosz Pays the Penalty of His Crime.

Auburn, N. Y., Oct. 29.—President McKinley's assassin is dead. Leon F. Czolgosz, alias Fred Nieman, was successfully electrocuted at Auburn prison this morning. He was pronounced dead at 7:16:15 a. m. With the purely animal courage that had sustained him and the innate coward within him struggling to his lips, the youthful murderer, hated by a nation and the world at large, paid the penalty for his fearful crime. In less time almost than it takes to tell it, the deadly current had passed through his body, rubbing out his miserable existence with merciful and unerring swiftness.

The autopsy which was conducted by a number of physicians showed Czolgosz's brain to be in a perfect normal condition. It was above the average in weight and formation, and showed not the slightest lesion. The doctors say every organ in the body was in a normal condition at the time of his death.

Seated in the chair with the fatal current about to be applied, Czolgosz facing the witnesses, said: "I shot the President because I thought it would benefit the good workmen of all nations. I am not sorry for my crime."

During this time the attendants were busy strapping him to the chair. His last words were: "I am heartily sorry I did not see my father." This was said after the strap had been drawn across his face, yet his words were heard distinctly by all the witnesses in the room.

Wretched creature that he was, he went to his death unsupported by the comforting thought that he had made peace with his God. For the first time in the history of the prison, a condemned man marched to the fatal chair unaccompanied by a spiritual adviser. Spiritual aid had been offered him, but he scorned the entreaties of the priests who visited him in his last hours, and last night when his brother visited him, he declared that he wanted no one to pray for his soul.

The remains of Czolgosz have been interred in the prison plot and prison authorities say they will have been entirely consumed. No mound marks the place of the body, and there is nothing to indicate that Czolgosz ever lived.

A Good Decision.

The supreme court has rendered a decision in regard to the practice of children to trespass upon property in dangerous places, and the liability of property owners for damages sustained by trespassers. A Marquette county jury decided against the parents of a child who was injured while trespassing, and the case was appealed. The majority opinion, denying the appeal, says: "Pedestrians who insist on risking their lives by making a footpath of a railroad track and others who habitually shorten distance by making footpaths across the corners of village lots are none the less trespassers because the owners do not choose to resent such intrusion and be to the expense and trouble of taking effective measures to prevent it. There is no more lawless class than children, and none more annoyingly resent an attempt to prevent their trespasses. The average citizen has learned that the surest way to be overrun by children is to give them to understand that their presence is distasteful. The consequence is that they roam at will over private premises, and as a rule this is tolerated so long as no damage is done. The remedy which the law affords for the trifling trespasses of children is inadequate. No one ever thinks of suing them, and to attempt to remove a crowd of boys from private premises by gently laying on of hands and using no more force than is necessary to put them off, would be a roaring farce with all honors to the juveniles."

The New Fish Hatcheries.

The Michigan fish commission met Saturday afternoon and decided upon locations for two new fish hatcheries allowed by the last legislature. The trout fishery will be on the east branch of the Au Sable river, near Grayling, in Crawford county, while the bass hatchery will be in Drayton Plains, Oakland county. The maximum output of the fish commission hatcheries so far for any one year has been 6,000,000 trout and 800,000 bass fry. With the new hatcheries the commission hopes to produce from 12,000,000 to 15,000,000 trout fry and 4,000,000 bass fry a year.

The use of dogs or any artificial light is prohibited, as is also the killing of fawns in the spotted coat or any deer in the red coat. No deer or any portion of a deer can be shipped without a license tag accompanying the same.

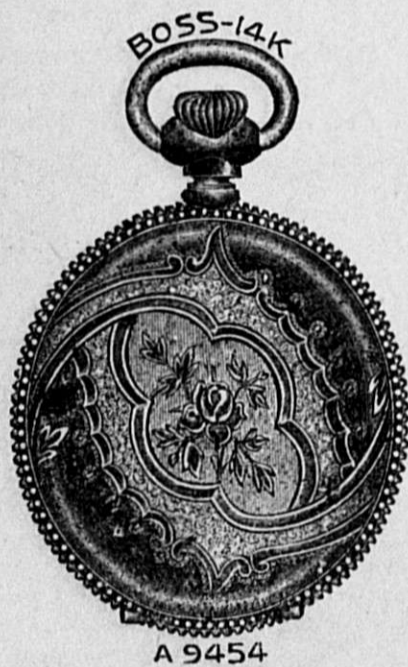
