## A FISH-TIGER STORY

We were traveling along the north  
branch of the Gadevey river.

I left camp at an early hour in the  
morning for the purpose of fishing.  
While I carried my rifle with me, I had  
no intention of going out of my way to  
find game. On the previous afternoon  
I had observed what seemed to be a  
capital spot in the bend of the river,  
and it was to this place I hastened as  
I left camp. Catching a frog for bait, I  
flung in the hook, and it wasn't five  
minutes before I was meeting with  
such luck that all thoughts of tigers,

into the neighborhood while the tiger  
was playing with the fish, and, softly  
climbing a tree, he uttered the call of

away!" He meant that the spirit of a  
good nature had been transformed, and  
it was clearly the common sense way

one of the fish. Each one as caught was

hour before he grew tired of the sport.  
I expected he would turn to me sooner

The tiger suddenly left the last fish  
landed and came stalking over to me,  
purring like a cat and acting very play-  
fully. His first move was to worm his  
head under my left arm, and I'm telling  
you the solemn truth when I say that I  
smoothed down his fur as if he had  
been a favorite dog. I had on a big

straw hat, and this he got hold of in his  
teeth and played with it for ten min-  
utes, or until he had torn it all to pieces.  
I had no more bait to fish with and sat

## An All Wool Test.

He flashed in seven colors on the sight.





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

## Good Roads Necessary.

In the forthcoming report of Superintendent Machin, of the free mail delivery service, there will be an extensive discussion of the necessity of good roads in the extension and maintenance of the service. Hereafter it has been required that in the establishment of the service first consideration should be given to the condition of the roads. It has developed that inspectors have only superficially considered this question.

Recent official inquiries disclose the fact that a portion of the roads of more than 1000 of the 4,500 routes now in operation require some repairs. While the roads in southwestern states, as a rule, are in good condition there are sections where repairs are regarded as essential in order that an uninterrupted service may continue during all the year. In several states the routes will be discontinued unless the roads are improved. In most of these cases the warning of the department has been heeded. It is evident, however, in several instances that no serious consideration has been given to the announcement of the postmaster general in this connection.

In such cases the department is advising road supervisors and other interested officials that the lack of care given to roads covered by rural routes will, if continued, endanger the permanency of the service. In discussing this question Superintendent Machin expresses the opinion that rural free delivery will eventually solve the question of good roads.

## A Way to Get After the Fly-by-Night Merchant.

Marquette has taken an advance step in municipal legislation which should be followed by every city which has a due regard for the protection of its own business interests. Marquette has suffered from the invasions of fly-by-night, fire-sale and bankrupt-sale merchants. They come from nowhere in particular and vanish as they came, leaving unpleasant memories. They have no reputations to sustain, and therefore they can afford to be reckless in their methods. They can misrepresent in their advertising and in their individual dealings. When they sell a bill of goods to a customer they never expect to see him again, and they soak them as much as they are able. At the same time they offer unfair competition with local merchants who have reputations to sustain and taxes to pay. It is known to all who are in business that these traveling concerns are a general detriment to the towns which they invade, because they injure the local trade and too often swindle the general public. Bungling laws have been enacted to handicap them, but these have usually been unconstitutional and of no effect.

Marquette has met these itinerants by inflicting a license upon all merchants. Merchants are to pay a \$25 license fee for the first year in business and \$5 a year for each year thereafter. In case a merchant pays personal taxes for the support of the government, the license fee is to be deducted. This is a round-about way of making the traveling "sale" concern pay a license without making any discrimination against it. If the moving-van firm stays right along and pays taxes like the other merchants in town, he can get his rebate the same as they do. This \$25 license fee may be effective in a town the size of Marquette, but the license seems quite inadequate for the privilege of defrauding the public of a city like Detroit. Evidently the fee system must be modified to meet different conditions, but there is a valuable suggestion in this ordinance.—*Detroit News.*

Portland, Ionia county, has just found out what several other schools are finding out, viz: that her pupils are being pitch-forked through the course. Portland has done nobly by standing by the Superintendent for putting pupils back in the eighth grade who had been conditionally promoted to the ninth. We are well pleased with the comments of the Portland Observer on the situation: "Because the grades below have been crowded to the extent that some must be pushed out to make room for others before it should have been done, as alleged, is no reason, at all, why they should be put beyond where their standing says they should be. There has, in the past, been too much pushing and cramming of children in our schools, and it is a good thing that they are being and will be held back where they rightfully and educationally belong. There are more things than graduation day to be looked forward to, or should be, in our schools which cost so much, for there is no doubt that scholars have been graduated in years past who had no more business to be than someone who had never been to school. For we have seen this fact demonstrated time and again in communications to this office by so-called graduates. It was time long ago that a curb-bit was put on this advancing business in our schools and the Observer is glad it is being done. The more there is of it, if honestly and conscientiously done, the better off the pupils and the school will be."

Michigan Maccabees Are Not Affected.

The great camp of Michigan, Knights of the Maccabees, is not in any way affected by the defalcation of Charles D. Thompson, of Port Huron, supreme finance keeper of the supreme tent, K. O. T. M. His pecuniations amount to \$60,000, it is said, but as these organizations are separate institutions the members of Michigan order have no grounds for apprehension as to the safety of their insurance. We make this statement for the reason that there have been numerous inquiries regarding the matter. The supreme tent of which the defaultering finance keeper was a member, is a national organization, having jurisdiction to do business throughout the United States, while the great camp of Michigan is confined exclusively to this state. There has been more or less confusion in the minds of the people in general regarding these fraternal societies, and even the members themselves in many instances actually believe that the society to which they belong has been defrauded.

## FOR THE HOUSEWIFE

### The Bedstead's Place.

Now that we know that consumption is a disease communicable from one to another by contact and breathing the air already breathed by the consumptive the hygiene of separate beds ought to receive public recognition. In all bedrooms the heads of the beds should be an inside wall. If this cannot be arranged, then the wall and the ceiling for a space corresponding to the bedstead should be covered with a thick serge, loosely attached to the wall, to prevent the formation of catarrhs of air chilled by the cold wall which will otherwise fall on the sleeper.

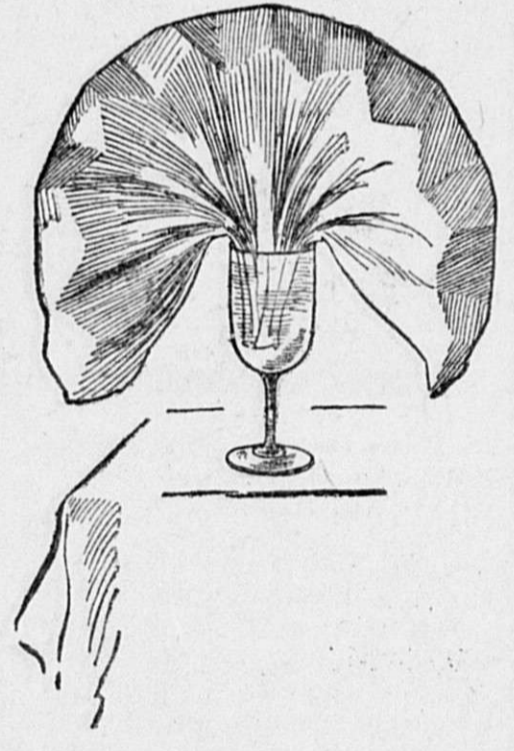
The worst of colds are caught in this simple way in the small hours of the morning, and many a fatal senile or infantile bronchitis might be prevented by this timely expedient. Remember that for very old or very young people nocturnal variations of temperature are extremely dangerous. For the same reason the bed must not be placed between a badly fitting window and the fire or the doorway.

### Compressed Air Housecleaning.

Compressed air is the means by which carpets, hangings and walls are cleaned by a process which has been patented. To clean carpets a metal box with a balloon shaped white linen cover bulging with air is pushed along the floor. A long, sinuous tube trails after the box, supplying the compressed air from the apparatus, which is left in another room, usually in the basement, as it is heavy and cumbersome. The effect on the carpet is marvelous. The receptacle is quickly filled with dust, and so thorough is the process that no dust can be made to arise from a treated carpet. Walls and hangings may be cleaned in the same way. To disinfect carpets, furniture or hangings the current of air is charged with a disinfecting liquid which is forced in a fine spray into the articles to be cleaned.

### Folding Napkins.

Table napkin folding is an art and one of those things in which both skill and taste can be shown. The fan pattern is one of the most simple and effective, and any girl who is fairly deft with her fingers can easily copy it after a close inspection of the illustration herewith. The best way is to practice

with a piece of paper cut to exactly the same size as the napkin, and it will be found that the design can be modified in a hundred ways. Thus, by folding a strip about four inches wide right along one side before proceeding to make the close folds to form the fan a pretty design can be produced when the first fold is pulled out to make an overlapping top. When placed in a wineglass, the fan falls down on either side, making an almost complete circle.

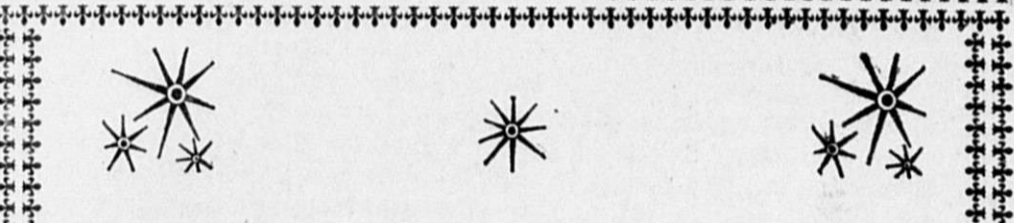

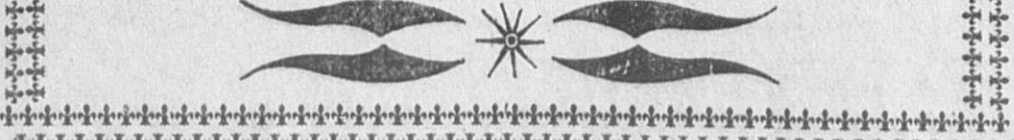

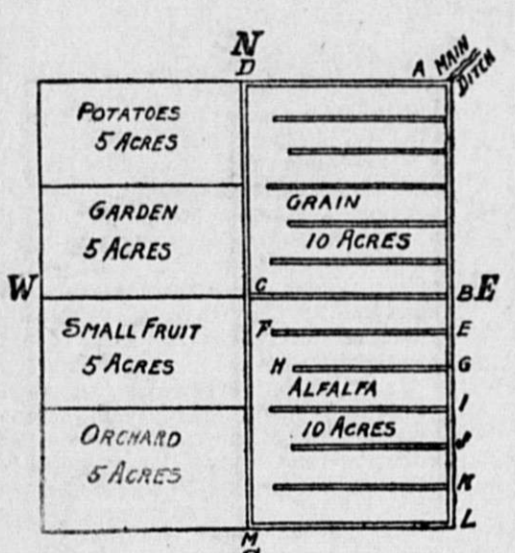


PRACTICAL IRRIGATION.

A Plan For a Forty Acre Farm—The Location of Laterals.

Irrigation has become a live question in every part of the country, and many are on the lookout for practical information on its various points.

It may be impossible to properly locate the main laterals at first, and supplemental laterals and dikes may have to be constructed.

Laterals must be fitted in and the ground leveled. Theoretically they should be given such a grade as will result in a moderate velocity for the water, but not sufficient to wash the earth along the sides and bottom of the ditch.

One irrigator of considerable experience recommends that field laterals should have a fall of at least ten feet per mile.

If the surface of the ground is somewhat uneven, the problem of locating the permanent laterals becomes correspondingly more difficult.

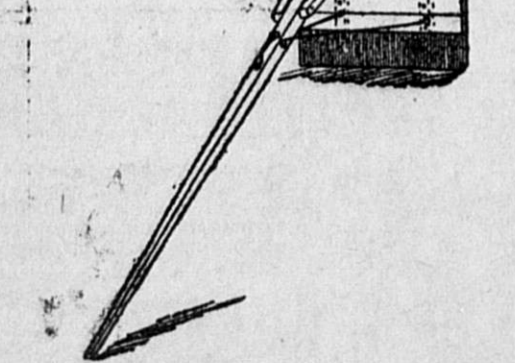
The inexperienced irrigator often considers that the ground occupied by the laterals is waste land because it bears no crop.

We will usually pay to do some work in smoothing off the little irregularities in the surface of the farm.

If it be assumed that there is a fall of four feet across the farm from north to south and two feet from east to west, the water can be made to flow either west or south from any point.

The greatest slope of the land is a little south of southwest, and this is the direction the water takes if left to itself.

If the laterals are run south from the main ditch, they will make an angle of about seventy degrees with this line.

Such an arrangement permits the water to flow away from rather than along the laterals. The main ditch divides at A, as shown in the diagram, one branch runs south to L, while a second runs west to D, the middle of the north line of the farm, where it turns and flows south to M.

Alfalfa is irrigated by the method known as flooding, which may be described as follows: Nearly parallel ditches, BC, EF, etc., are made 100 to 150 feet apart through the field.

HARDINESS OF FRUITS.

How Some of the Valuable Fruits Behave at Various Altitudes.

The ideal way of treating varieties of fruits for hardiness is considered by Professor Hedrick of Michigan in American Gardening.

A recent letter from a prominent horticulturist of Salt Lake City, Utah, gives some valuable hints as to the relative hardiness of varieties of certain fruits and at the same time well illustrates the proposition stated above.

"I have been up in the heart of the Rockies and there learned a few things about the fruits that will grow in an extra cold climate.

"The Yellow Transparent is hardy 300 feet lower down, but is invariably killed back at the 6,000 foot level.

"As for pears, the Kieffer, which is said to be hardy, is of no account here.

"There are several excellent plums that grow well up in the mountains.
