### The Curse of the Tempter.

The story of the father of the victim in the Washington murder case, as told to the jury yesterday, was pathetic. A reputable citizen of Michigan, accompanied his son to Detroit and there saw him safely aboard the cars for the nation's capital, where he was to branch out upon the sea of life and buffet the waves far away from the parental roof. The boy kissed his father and received his admonition to be on his guard against the snares and tempting evils of the world. Washington is a gay city. It has its environments such as no other city in the country. The tempter is ever there present, and unless the young man just entering his manhood, has sufficient will power and strength of character to resist temptation, he soon may be engulfed by the tempestuous sea. Poor young Ayers was in high spirits when he reached Washington. He soon gained the respect of his superiors, and was beginning to see life as he had never known it in the little town of Port Austin. He got into a city boarding house. He met a table acquaintance there, and the tempter was among them. Then came his tragic and mysterious death. The silent white headstone in the Michigan graveyard at the old home marks his last resting spot. In this six feet of earth is embalmed one of the saddest stories ever penned. But the tempter still lives.

The story of young Ayers is not unlike thousands of others. The young man goes to a large city. The attractions of the country or village are few and far between, in comparison with those of a city, but the allurements and vices are correspondingly fewer. Would that every young man would accept the lesson that these stories teach. But blinded by ambition and a desire to see the world, they rush headlong into the yawning abyss that is certain to engulf them.—*Bay City Times.*

### Estimates!

Washington, Dec. 2.—The secretary of the treasury today transmitted to congress the estimates of the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1903, as furnished by the heads of the several executive departments. The total asked for is \$610,827,688, which is \$16,000,000 less than the estimates for 1902, \$4,000,000 more than the appropriations for that year. Following are the estimates in the different departments: Legislative, \$10,188,099; executive, \$294,160; state, \$2,446,328; treasury, \$156,484,925; war, \$161,920,101; navy, \$100,701,122; interior, \$161,710,535; postoffice, \$4,464,966; agricultural, \$5,509,540; labor, \$190,580; justice, \$6,917,330.

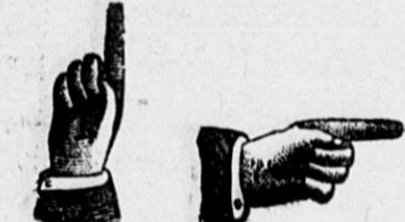

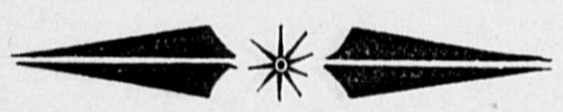

Congress convened in the 57th annual session last Monday.

Lant K. Saulsbury, of Grand Rapids, city attorney, charged with bribery, was found guilty, after a deliberation of 16 hours by the jury.

President Roosevelt's first message to congress was a most able and statesmanlike document, treating important questions in a concise manner.

Judge Newhan orders criminal proceedings against Senator George E. Nichols, on the charge of subornation of perjury in connection with the Saulsbury bribery case at Grand Rapids.

Land Commissioner Widely says that during the present year over 400 homesteaders have taken up lands in Michigan. Homesteads are taken up upon the payment of ten cents an acre, but the homesteaders must remain on the land for five years before securing absolute title to the property. The average homestead is composed of about 100 acres.

**Circuit Court.**

The regular December term of circuit court convened in this city last Monday, with Judge M. J. Conine presiding. Monday was devoted to the calling of the calendar, assignment and arraignment of prisoners.

Arthur Sills, charged with arson, in connection with the burning of Prof. Jansky's residence at AuSable last spring, was arraigned and pleaded guilty to the charge. Henry Wood was tried and convicted for being implicated in same case at last term of court. It is understood that Sills has made a confession in connection to the case which the officers have not yet made public.

Viola Middleton charged with assisting a prisoner to escape from county jail, also pleaded guilty, when arraigned Monday.

The first case Tuesday was that of the people vs. Chas Cholger charged with having hunted deer without having procured a license. A verdict of guilty was rendered. The next case was against August Litzau, on the same charge, and he was also found guilty.

The case against Antoine Ramoine, a Polish resident of Wilbur, charged with having poisoned some cattle belonging to Paul Shoft. of that township was next, and a verdict of guilty rendered.

John Lake, charged with an indecent exposure of his person was tried Thursday afternoon and a verdict of guilty rendered.

The jury was then excused until Monday morning, and the attention of the court is being given to chancery matters.

Judge Conine imposed the following sentences this morning:

Arthur Sills three years at Jackson prison.

Antoine Ramonia, eighteen months at Jackson.

John Lake, six months at Detroit house of correction.

August Litzau was fined \$10 and costs amounting to \$39.85.

Charles Cholger, \$10 and costs amounting to \$33.85.

**Fall Care of the Lawn.**

Chickweed and veronica, two pests which in many cases will at the present season almost cover the whole lawn, will in the course of two or three years be entirely removed if the mowing be stopped earlier in the fall than is generally the case. It is the writer's opinion, says a Gardening correspondent, that in nine cases out of ten where a poor lawn is to be seen the cause is that the grass has been mowed too short in the fall. Almost all weeds are harder than grasses and will grow more or less during the mild spells of the winter months. These are the means of rooting out and destroying the grass roots; hence I say again quit mowing in time to allow the grass to protect itself. A good coating of wood ashes may now be given with advantage.

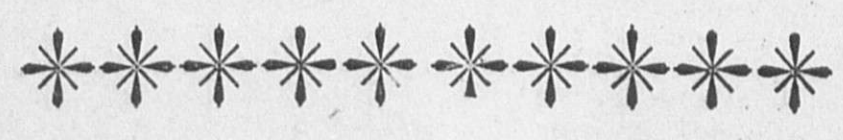
