Good Roads.

Those who have occasion to travel the country roads at this time may observe the effect of the annual force of "working on the road" by those who, from some cause, did not do the work when it should have been done. In many instances clay, road wash, or even sod are unevenly dumped upon the travelled road-bed, to be packed by the first rain and then frozen into a roughness that cannot be fully appreciated until one rides over it. No material so totally unfit for roadmaking should be placed in the roadway at this time of year, and I believe the law should be so amended as to prohibit the placing of anything excepting gravel or equivalent material upon the traveled road-bed of any highway after the time when the same may not now be lawfully plowed up. It is also much to be regretted that the farmers do not take a greater interest in making good roads. No class could be so much benefited thereby as they. The present manner of working out the is also a much less burden than paying it in money would be. Therefore from many considerations, the work under the existing law should be properly and faithfully performed in each and every road district.

The fallacy held by some that they are not liable for road work unless "warned out" is entirely wrong; the road tax being as much a lawful public charge as any other tax, and if not worked becomes a first lien upon the property at the time and in the same manner as other taxes when properly assessed. Let every hour of highway labor be honestly performed in the right way and in proper season and we shall soon have much better roads and will have occasion to be prouder of our country and thankful that we have assisted in some degree toward making it a more desirable place in which to live.—Ex.

Try It Just for Fun.

Take an ordinary glass tumbler, a quarter, and a piece of thread. Tie the thread around the quarter crossways, hold the thread firmly between the thumb and forefinger of the right hand, resting the elbow on the table. Let the end of the thread, with the quarter attached, hang just inside the glass and keep the hand perfectly still. In a moment or two the quarter will be seen to move backwards and forwards, and will presently touch the sides of the glass. Listen intently to it. The coin will tell the time exactly to the nearest hour. For example, if it is 25 minutes to 7 o'clock, it will strike the glass seven times. The coin never fail to tell the correct hour, whatever it may be.—Ex.

Lives Lost on Lakes.

The total number of lives lost on the great lakes during the season of 1901 was 132, as compared with 110 last year; 100 in 1899; 95 in 1898; 68 in 1897, and 66 in 1896.

Despite the improvement of lake ships and the life saving service the number of lives lost this season is just twice as large as that in 1896, and the only explanation given is the fact that the number of vessels on the great lakes has doubled in the last six years.

The greatest loss of life on the lakes this season was caused by foundering, 59 sailors going down with their boats. 24 of this number being the crew of the freighter Hudson which went to the bottom without apparent cause on Lake Superior, Sept. 16.

Twenty-seven sailors were lost overboard or drowned in harbors; eight fell through open hatches; seven were fatally crushed, five met met death by collision, and five committed suicide by leaping overboard. Four lost their lives by fire, three were killed by breaking lines; one crushed beneath a spar, and one scalded. Two lighthouse keepers were drowned by the over turning of their boat.

Forty-six were drowned in Lake Superior; 34 in Lake Huron; 22 in Lake Michigan, 11 in Lake Erie and 6 in Lake Ontario.

Eight were lost in the Detroit and St. Clair rivers and five in St. Mary's river.

The loss of life on old schooners shows the necessity for government inspection of these crafts.
