ELECTION LAW CHANGES.

Several Important Amendments Which go into Effect this Spring

On entering the room the inspector having charge of the ballots shall deliver to him one of them, and the clerk shall enter his name upon the poll list, together with the number of the ballot given him, and on his request such inspector shall give explanation of the manner of voting, etc.

"When two or more candidates are circuit court commissioners, [or constable, and the voter desires to vote for candidates on different tickets for such office, he must mark a cross in the circle under his party name, and mark a cross in the square befor the name or names of the candidates for whom he desires to vote on the ticket or tickets, and also erase an equal number of names of the candidates for such office on his party ticket: Provided, That if such elector sugar beets, leaving the roots in rows shall not cross off the names of an equal number of candidates for such office on his party ticket, he shall be deemed to have crossed off the name which is printed on his party ballot opposite of the candidate on some other party ticket in front of whose name he has made a cross.

"On leaving the booth, the voter shall at once deliver, in public view, such ballot to the inspector designated to receive the same, who shall thereupon announce audibly the chines and top another beet in name of the elector offering the same and the number of the ballot. and shall acertain by comparison of the number of the ballot with the number of the ballot given such elector as shown by the poll list whether the ballot presented is the same one given to the elector, and if it is the same the inspector shall tear off the corner of the ballot, where perforated containing the number, and shall then in the presence of the elector and the board of inspectors, deposit the same in the ballot box, without opening; and if it is not the same ballot given the elector it shall be rejected."

A Valuable Machine.

M. W. Palmer, of Hamilton, Mich,, has perfected and tested a machine for pulling and topping ready to draw to the factory. For years the great difficulty has been to make a cutter that would work in of each candidate for such office, grass or when roots are left upon the ground. This topper is composed of two revolving heads, each consisting of six discs, so arranged as to give a square cut and force feed, thus avoiding the canting or slipping of the beet. It will top a beet, throw out a chunk that would clog other maspace of eight inches. Automatic in its action, it is positive in its work, regardless of the hand of the driver if he simply drives so the beets enter the machine. The digger, too, is a new construction, and while it runs but five inches in the soil, will pull or lift beets of any length. When we consider the fact that thus far every beet pulled and topped has had that work done by hand, and that Germany, France, England, Canada and Austria as well as the United States, grow beets for the manufacture of sugar, the importance of Mr. Palmer's invention will be understood. Free Rural Delivery.

The question of free rural mail delivery is being discussed in this locality, and one of the opponents of the system has furnished the HERAID with the following, with the request that it be published. In complying therewith we do not wish to be understood as opposing the establishment of such a service.

"I am opposed to rurai free delivery for the following reasons: 1st, It is unfair to deliver mail to one farmer and make another go a mile or more to his mail box or to the postoffice, when all help to pay for the smaller towns, as all the trade cost of establishing another much more expensive to the government. 7th, A true American cannot serve as a carrier, maintain his outfit, support himself, to say nothing of a family, on \$500 a year. Rural delivery is not efficient and does not give dispatch in delivering to all, any more than an established office. 8th, It fayors the few and not the many. It is not free to all. Equal rights to all is the watchword of our constitution. Why do they call it free when they compell men living from one to four miles off the main route to travel that distance to get their mail? Why are the many compelled to such inconviences while to the few their mail is delivered at their door? Free and equal to all is something of the past, but this is free and equal to the





FARM CONVENIENCES.

Orb and Watering Trough For Cattle. Both Movable.


We have used the movable crib one year and find it very useful. It cost \$12. We used it in a large field; haul it from one place to another when empty. It gives a clean place to feed and distributes the manure and cobs where needed most; saves much labor. The



A MOVABLE CRIB

crib has a shed roof, is 7 feet high in front and 5 feet at rear, 5 feet wide and 10 feet long, placed on runners 12 feet long, 5 inches thick and 8 inches wide. The crosspieces resting on the sled are 3 by 6 inches and 5 feet long. The side end, floor and end door are left open in the cut to show construction. The upper door (D) falls down. The crib is filled through it. If this crib is wanted for a self feeder, put in an inclined floor.

The accompanying cut shows a very convenient trough for watering or feeding cattle in the barn. It can be made any size desired, but the most serviceable size is about four by one and a half feet. The sides should be built slanting, as shown, for then it is easy for stock to eat out of it, and it can also be more readily cleaned. It is also convenient to water cattle with in winter. Provided the mangers are composed of nothing more complicated than the bare floor, the trough, filled with water, can be rolled in front of

the cows and from one cow to another. Where running water is available it can be let run into the tub and speedily rolled to the animals. With wheels made of hardwood the device will last for years and, aside from watering the stock, can be used for a variety of other purposes about the barn, saving labor and adding to the profit. Both of these devices are described by correspondents in the Ohio Farmer.

When a Tree Is Girdled by Mice.

If a tree is girdled by mice, it usually dies. If, however, as soon as the injury is noticed, the wound is cleaned and covered with grafting wax and wrapped with cloth so that the air is excluded and the wood prevented from drying out, the sap which rises through the soft wood will continue to do so, and, returning through the inner bark, growth will be made all around the upper part of the wound, and if the latter is not too large there is a chance of its healing over. If, however, the wood becomes dry before the bandage is put on, it will almost certainly die. When the wax and bandage are applied, the tree should be headed back considerably to lessen the amount of transpiration of moisture. as there will not be as much sap rise as if the tree were uninjured. Girdled trees are sometimes saved by connecting the upper and lower edges of the girdle with scions, which are inserted all around the trunk. Mice may be de-. stroyed in the orchard by using a mixture of one part by weight of arsenic with three parts of cornmeal. To use this safely nail two pieces of board each six feet long and six inches wide together so as to make a trough. Invert this near the trees to be protect ed and place about a tablespoonful of the poison on a shingle and put it near the middle of the run, renewing the poison as often as is necessary .- W. T.

Boil granulated sugar to a thick sirup and when done so that'it breaks like a pipestem when dropped in water take it off and as it begins to harden stir it until so thick it will just pour and then pour into pans or dishes so that it hardens in cakes about an inch thick. A different candy can be made if you can get good extracted honey, but it must be of the best quality. Heat the honey until it is thin, but don't boil it, and then stir In all the pulverized sugar it will take up. Then knead it with the hands and Work in more sugar until it becomes a

Doesn't Like Cowpeas.

A dairy farmer in Carlisle, Pa., with 200 cows does not like cowpeas for food for his herd. He sowed two acres, and the yield was good, but the cows refused to eat them. He thinks they might do for southern cows that cannot get a square meal without taking a mountain walk of a mile or more. He cannot understand how well fed cows can be induced to eat them. But there are farmers who claim that both cows and horses eat them greedily and seem to prefer them to other food, says the American Cultivator. But, as all do not, and it seems to be an acquired taste, and as they are as difficult to cure as hay, we see no reason for urging a trial of them on northern farmers or those who can grow clover, which seems to suit the appetite of all our animals and which produces nearly if hot quite as much food per acre as the cowpea and as much milk per ton of dry or green food as any crop grown. The Massachusetts experiment station has spent much time and some money in testing various fodder crops, but we think it has not yet found any better than the combination of corn fodder and clover, which seems to grow in almost any fertile soil to furnish food that all animals like and thrive on, whether green or dry cured, and that leave the land in as good if not better condition for future crops as any crops that have been tried.
