PEACH POINTS.

By R. Morrill, the Famous Grower, What a Peach Man Must Know. Following is only a small part of some terse talk on peach culture given

by R. Morrill, the famous fruit grower, before the Illinois society:

The man who can make success of peach growing must love the business. He must understand a few essentials in selecting a location; he must know that elevation means everything to a peach orchard under trying conditions; he must understand the effect of temperatures on plant life and on peach buds particularly; he must know that cold air runs down hill as readily as water: he must know that the buds of the peach do not die as quickly in moving air as they do in still air, as, for instance, they may not kill on the top of a plateau and on the side of a hill, but kill at the lower level; he must know that there must be a proper balance maintained between root and ton in the care of his trees.

of one of these cherries sent from Tokyo by a Japanese correspondent, who says the cherry is regarded as the queen of all the flowers, the rose and other similarly exalted flowers of the European and American not being accorded any notice. Naturally there are very many forms of the cherry. The one shown, known as "fugen," is very extensively planted. It has double flowers of a bright red color.

Top Working Apples.


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GRAFTING IN BRIEF.

Popular Methods Illustrated and Described-When to Graft.

Grafting is the term applied to the process of inserting a portion of one plant (the scion) upon the stem or one of the branches of a growing plant (the stock) in such a manner that it will continue its growth much the same as it would upon its own roots. The fruit of a scion is not changed by placing it upon other roots. The requisites of successful grafting are:

1. The plants must be closely related or the scion and stock will not unite. 2. The operation must be carefully per-



Two scions are often inserted, one on each side; then if one dies the other may continde to grow. If both live, the weaker

one is cut away. Graft in the spring before the buds burst. This is the general rule, but the apple may be successfully grafted

ifter the buds have opened. Be careful with the scions; know what varieties they are, and be sure they come from a good individual tree. They may be kept in the cellar in muck soil or moss or may be buried in the earth outside .- Ohio Farmer.


OUR NATIVE PLUMS.

Becoming More Popular Every Year. Growing and Marketing.

Native plums are looking up, in the estimation of the horticulturists. Commending them in Rural New Yorker, F. Cranefield of Wisconsin tells how an Iowa man, who has produced many of the best varieties of native plums now on the market, grows them:

As the seedling plum trees are planted six feet apart each way for economy of space and after the second year cultivation is impracticable, the orchards have been heavily mulched. So far this has proved highly satisfactory in all respects. Marsh hay has been largely used for mulching as well as other coarse material free from weed seed. This method has also been employed in the older orchards. It is necessary to renew the mulch once a year in order to keep down weeds and grass.

A space of about 20 by 100 feet was heavily mulehed (about four inches) last spring with cinders. This seems

to serve the purpose as well as hay to thrive better under this method of culture than other orchard fruits

Severe thinning is practiced, beginning when danger from curculio is past. The plums at this stage are usually one-fourth to one-third grown and are thinned so that the remaining fruits are about one inch apart. This is somewhat expensive, especially with large trees, but will always prove profitable. Large plums are wanted, and only large plums will sell for a good price. The cut illustrates the benefits derived from thinning.

Among varieties Wyant, Forest Garden and Quaker still hold their own coarse and sour. Surprise, North Star and Brittlewood are all excellent. Beatty, Smith, Etta, Silas Wilson, Keith and Lottie are some of the newer varieties.

Of the various species of the native plum the Americana group is best adapted to the northwestern states.

Air and Rest For House Plants. As regards airing the plants, it is perhaps sufficient to say that what in this respect is healthful for human lungs will suit the plants. But do not forget that the plants cannot take a walk on a pleasant day; hence fresh air should frequently be admitted to them from the window. In nature all trees and plants have their seasons of growth and of rest, a principle that must be observed in house plant culture. When therefore any plant, after a period of growth and bloom, shows signs of lessming growth, water also should be somewhat withheld. In a state of rest from growth most kinds can get along with lessened light also, and this we may take advantage of by patting such sinds as fuchsias, oleanders, hydrangeas and scarlet geraniums in a light cellar while growth is suspended. 


