## Supervisors' Proceedings

**Tuesday, March 11, 1902.**

The board of supervisors of Iosco county met in the court house in the city of Tawas City, Michigan, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, 1902, pursuant to adjournment from January 8, 1902.

The board was called to order by George Sutherland, chairman, who ordered the clerk to call the roll.

The following supervisors answered to roll call: Supervisors Brown, Clary, Cornville, Gardner, Jordan, King, Dimmick, McDonald, McLeod, Ramage, Rodman, French, Sullivan, Sutherland, Thompson, Walker, West—17. Quorum present.

The clerk read the report of inspectors of jail for the month of February. Moved by Brown supported by Walker that report be accepted and placed on file. Carried by unanimous vote.

In the absence of supervisor Cosgrove the chair appointed supervisor Thompson to take his place on the judiciary committee for this session.

In the absence of supervisor Rosenthal the chair appointed supervisor McDonald to take his place on the committee on claims and accounts for this session.

Moved by Cornville supported by Brown that this board appropriate the sum of ten dollars for the purpose of enlarging and framing the picture of ex-Judge Birney to be hung up in the court room with the other pictures of the ex-judges of this circuit. Carried—Yeas—17. Nays—0.

Whereupon, on motion, the board took a recess until one o'clock, p. m., standard time.

**Afternoon Session.**

The board was called to order by the chairman at one o'clock, p. m., standard time. Quorum present.

On order of the chairman the several committees retired to their respective duties and balance of board were given a recess subject to call of the chair.

Board called to order by the chairman at 5:00 o'clock, p. m.

**To the Hon. Board of Supervisors:**

GENTLEMEN:—Your committee on Supplies and Repairs report that since the last meeting of this board in January they have contracted for wood with Peter Latham and Herbert Herriman; Latham to furnish 50 cords of 18 in. wood at \$1.50 per cord, and Herriman 50 cords of 2 ft. wood at \$2.00 per cord. Your committee has measured the wood and finds that Herbert Herriman has delivered 35 cords of wood on which he has been paid \$15.00, leaving a balance due of \$51.00. That Peter Latham has delivered 52.50 cords of wood on which he has been paid \$28.50, leaving a balance of \$20.75.

Your committee also purchased of Wm. Duvall 5 cords of 2 ft. wood at \$2.00 per cord, which has been delivered and a bill for the same has been filed with this board.

Your committee has also purchased a clock as directed at the last meeting of this board at a cost of \$3.50; a bill for the same is now filed with this board.

Your committee recommend the payment of the bill of M. D. Chatterton for probate practice, which was referred to this committee at the last meeting of this board.

Your committee at the last meeting of this board was ordered to procure grates for the furnace. The grates have been got and put in the furnace and the bill is in the hands of this board for allowance.
