Death of T. F. Thompson.

Thomas F. Thompson, a former well known and highly respected citizen of this county died very suddenly at his home in Saginaw, Monday. The following is from the Saginaw Daily News.

Thomas F. Thompson, one of the pioneers and most highly respected citizens of the city passed away at his home, 1422 South Washington avenue, shortly before noon today. Mr. Thompson had been in good health and arrived home Saturday last from Florida, where he and his family have been for two months past. The immediate cause of death was angina pectoris, and the fatal illness was of a few hours' duration, Mr. Thompson being first taken down late last evening.

Mr. Thompson was born in the north of Ireland Sept. 12, 1831, and had had been a resident of America and this state for many years. He came to Saginaw from Tawas over twenty years ago and since has been connected with the lumbering business

in this city and in the state. He has of late years been retired from active work in the interests in which he was concerned, although his mills were always the subject of his earnest attention. Mr. Thompson is survived by his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Adams, of Detroit; Mrs. Charlotte Thompson Wheeler, of Tawas, and Helen, of this city, and two sons; Thomas, of Tawas, and Henry, who has always been associated with his father in his Florida interests, and also one sister, Miss Thompson, who resided with him in this city.

Mr. Thompson has always been prominently identified with the business circles of this city, and also has been a staunch Republican. About four years ago he accepted the nomination of mayor from the party of his choice, but was defeated by the present incumbent, after making a good run. His death causes a great shock to the entire community, from which it removes an able and public-spirited citizen, whose loss will be keenly felt.

SHERMAN TOWNSHIP QUARANTINE.

At a special meeting of the Common Council of Tawas City, acting as a Board of Health of the City, held at the Council rooms, April 5th, 1902, the following resolutions was by said Board adopted unanimously.

WHEREAS, there is an epidemic of Small pox and scarlet fever in the township of Sherman, Iosco county, and it is the opinion of the Health Board of the city of Tawas City that stringent measures should be at once taken, to prevent the spread of such disease to this city;

RESOLVED—That until further notice no resident or person from the township of Sherman be allowed to enter within the boundaries of Tawas City, and

FURTHER,—That an officer be stationed at the railroad depot, who shall prevent any such person from Sherman township entering Tawas City from trains, and,

FURTHER,—That no person or resident from Tawas City be allowed to visit or go to Sherman township or have communication therein, under like pain of exclusion from the city during such prescribed time; and,

FURTHER,—That any person found in the city from Sherman during such time, shall be forced to leave town at once or be apprehended and kept in confinement during such period of quarantine;

FURTHER,—That the supervisor, of Sherman, as chairman of the Board of Health, be notified of the action of this Board, and he be required to take such measures as will insure the stamping out of said disease, and the prevention of its spreading to surrounding municipalities;

FURTHER,—That the City Marshal see that these rules be stringently enforced until revoked by this Board, or all danger of contagion is passed.

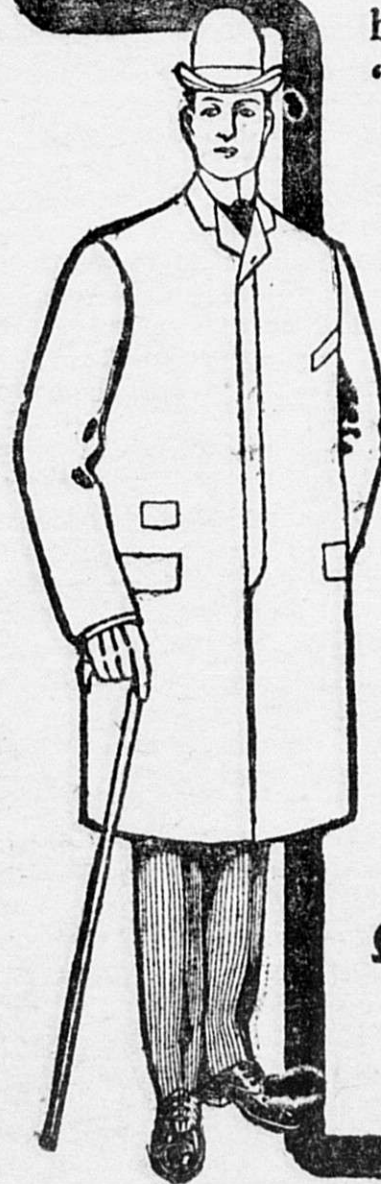

THE ELECTION.

The Result in the Different Cities and Townships of this County.

ALABASTER.

There was but one ticket in the field here and 33 votes were polled. The following officers were elected: Supervisor, T. G. McCausland; clerk, T. F. Robinson; treasurer, John H. Robinson; highway commissioner, Wm. Oates; justices, J. H. White; Julius Benson; member board of review, J. A. McDonell.

BALDWIN.

In addition to the regular nominees—G. C. Karus, republican, and Thos. Glendon, peoples,—John Sullivan run for supervisor as a "stump" candidate. Karus was elected, receiving 28 votes to 22 for Sullivan and 13 for Glendon. The republicans elected their ticket except clerk, Hans J. Carlson being elected clerk by 6 majority. Nelson Johnson was elected treasurer by 28 majority.

BURLEIGH.

Here the farmers ticket defeated the republican by good majorities, A. H. Wiltzie being elected supervisor by 41, Edward Williams clerk by 54, Fred Mills trrasurer by 32, Byron Lumison school inspector by 39, Charles L. Hawks highway commissioner by 24, W. S. Hall justice by 40, and J. P. Colvin member board of review by 15.

GRANT

Elected William West supervisor by 5 majority, and William O'Brien clerk, by the same; Herman Brown won for treasurer by 1, and John Watts for highway commissioner by 7; Maurice Tambling and A. O. Katterman were elected justices each by a majority of one; while William Allen for the same office had three. C. A. Curry for board of review had a majority of 13.

PLAINFIELD.

Returns Leander Gardner for supervisor for the tenth consecutive time by a majority of 15; Edwin Nunn had 11 majority for clerk, and Eugene Nunn was re-elected treasurer without opposition.

RENO.

In this town Thomas Jackson for supervisor, Alex Anderson for treasurer and George Charters for member board of review were elected without opposition. John C. Ehmeke had a majority of 18 for clerk, William Latter 11 for school inspector, James Shepard 14 for highway commissioner; for justices, John Degrow had 25 and Alfred Waters 12 majority.

SHERMAN.

We have no returns from this town but hear that the union ticket defeated the reform ticket except for treasurer. The following candidates were elected by one majority each: Supervisor, T. A. Wood; clerk, W. G. Arm; treasurer, G. A. Pringle; school inspector, R. Cox; highway commissioner, Albert Scherret; justice, Robt. Norris; member board of review, Wm. Kohn. On constables the vote was a tie.

TAWAS.

The republican ticket was successful in this town over the peoples' by majorities ranging from 26 to 45. Malcom McLeod was re-elected supervisor without opposition. For clerk, W. E. Laidlaw had a majority of 39; Lafayette Colby received 45 majority for treasurer; William Thomas 43 for school inspector; Jacob Ballinger, 26 for highway commissioner; Reuben Wade 35 for justice, and F. E. Hayes 35 for member board of review.

WILBER.

This township the union ticket defeated the republican, and the successful officers and their majorities are as follows: Supervisor, John Searles, 19; clerk, Alex Corner, 23; treasurer, John McMullin, 21; school inspector, Fred Brooks, 10; school inspector, vac., Arthur Dawes, 27; highway commissioner, John Newberry, 20; justice, J. B. Scott, 15; Robert Brooks for board of review had no opposition.

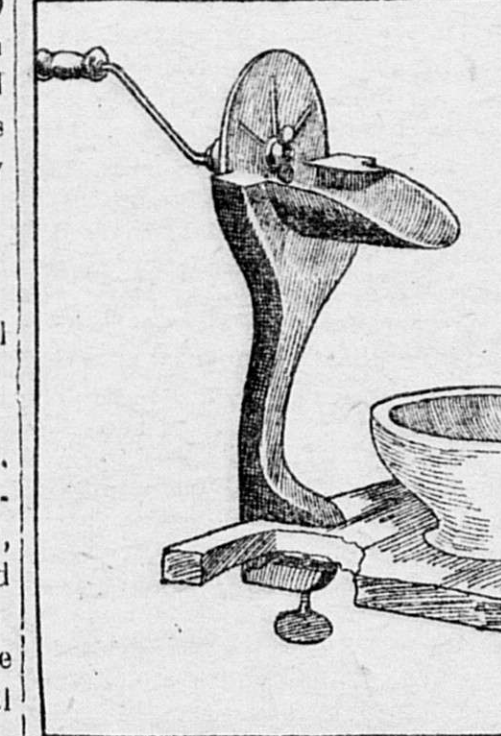
The chief function of a bed, says Anton Leister in Good Health, is to keep the proper bodily temperature during the night, just as the lay clothing regulates that temperature during the day. If this principle be admitted, then follow certain deductions—the amount of bedding, as of clothing, must change with the seasons and with the extremes of temperature from day to day; the bedding, like the clothing, should be porous to admit air to the skin and to emit skin emanations; bedding must not be excessive in quantity, or, like excessive clothing, it will debilitate the skin and weaken the body; the bedding, like the clothing, must be distributed over the body not equally in amount, but according to the physiologic needs of the different parts of the body as to temperature and circulatory and respiratory stimulation.

This last is the most important point of all, but also the point that has been altogether disregarded. The bed, as usually made with heavy mattress, quilts, etc., absorbs and retains all the body heat and before morning becomes practically a dry "hot pack," applied to the spine and cerebellum. Even if the covering blankets are light and porous the heated mass of material below acts as would a heavy pad of wool or felt worn on the spine during the day, greatly overheating that important part of the body.

From this nightly unequal heating of the parts of the body, from the constant overheating of the spine, there result various temporary or chronic physiologic disturbances—broken sleep, increased rate and tension of the pulse, a general weakening of the system from cerebral and spinal congestion and debilitation and other bad effects. Theory points to a bed of the same texture and thickness below as above. Actual practice has shown that this desired result is best attained by a spring wire bottom (sheet, not the upright evils), with porous blankets laid on it, just enough thickness to prevent chilling from below. In this way the heat from below can be regulated as well as from above. The overheating of spinal and cerebral nerve centers, with resulting injurious unbalanced circulation, is prevented.



Frederick Suellentrop of Linn, Mo., has invented a device for cutting or grating vegetables which is described in a recent number of The Scientific American. The vegetable cutter comprises an upright carrying at its top a tray open at the front and rear. The upright is attached to a table by means of a clamping device carried at the bot-



tom of the upright. A disklike cutter for slicing cabbages, potatoes or the like is carried on a spindle, having a bearing in an arm on the upright. By means of a crank the spindle is turned, and with it the disk cutter. The disk is formed with radial slots, and one wall of each slot is turned outward toward the tray to form cutting blades. Another form of disk can be used, provided with openings, the walls of which are extended inward to form grating surfaces, this device being designed for the grating of horseradish, cocoanut or the like.

The vegetable is held by one hand in the tray and against the disk, the crank being turned by the other hand. An inwardly turned lip prevents the upward movement of the vegetable in the tray. By means of this device vegetables are rapidly prepared for table use.

FOR THE LITTLE ONES.

Worms Make Long Halls and Plaster Them in Their Homes.

The worm's home is a hole of long halls dug in the ground. These halls are lined with a kind of glue from the worm's body, the glue making the walls firm, so they will not fall in. The balls are not very deep underground, and when the weather is cold or dry the worms dig deeper. In winter worms plug up the doors of their houses, and this is done often by dragging into it a plant stem that will fit it. They carry into their homes leaves and stalks to eat, and they bring out and throw away things which they do not like. Worms usually come out of their holes at night or in wet weather. If they get far from their homes, they cannot find their way back. Then they make a new hole. Each worm lives alone. In the evening or early morning or during rain you will often find worms with their heads stuck out of their doors. They do not come out when the sun is shining bright, as the heat dries worms up very fast and kills them. Birds know the habits of worms and search for them at sunrise or after sunset or while it is raining. A worm will die in one day in dry air, but will live for weeks under water. Young worms know as well how to build their houses and carry things in and out of them as do old worms.

The natives make use of these in preparing their meals.

Can You Circle a Cane?

All that the victim has to do is to stand in the middle of a room in the position shown in the accompanying picture. The cane over which he is to stoop should be stout and strong, and its handle should be

pressed against his forehead. Moreover, his left hand should be closed and should rest on his left knee.

After standing thus for two or three minutes he is to move slowly around the stick, still retaining the same attitude. This circular motion he will not be able to continue very long, for a strange giddiness will gradually overcome him, and his only hope of safety lies in staggering to some piece of furniture, which he can grasp.

WITH THE DOCTORS

The prevalence of dyspepsia, a name which is synonymous with indigestion among the American people, has become proverbial, and the reason for this prevalence is easily found in that distinctively American institution, "the quick lunch counter," says a writer in the Philadelphia North American.

The mechanical disintegration of food by mastication or chewing is a most important factor in its easy digestion, and when this is but partially performed the digestion is slow and often imperfect. As there are thirty-two teeth in the normal mouth, it has been suggested by an eminent physician that there should be thirty-two mastications for each mouthful, one for each tooth.

The pressure of business and the hurry and bustle of life in all of our large cities often compel people to spend as short a time as possible over their meals, and thus the food taken is bolted down rather than properly chewed and then slowly swallowed. In addition, in many cases these hurried meals are made up of food that would be difficult of digestion even if eaten slowly.

It is important to know that properly boiled meat or fish is softer and more easily digested than the same meat or fish that is fried, roasted or broiled. All forms of skin are difficult to digest, for the reason that it is impossible to disintegrate them properly by mastication. Fish, flesh or game that is "gamy" or tainted is very indigestible, because it always contains a poison resulting from its decomposition. Warm bread, freshly baked, is very hard to digest, while, on the contrary, stale bread is extremely easy.

Pastry, especially that made with cooking butter, is a frequent cause of dyspepsia, and still another and very common cause is the want of cleanliness in cooking utensils. The times at which food is taken may also be a factor. Many persons eat at very irregular hours, taking their luncheon on some days at noon, on other days not until late in the afternoon and perhaps sometimes not eating between an early breakfast and a late dinner.

Another cause which is only found in Americans is the use of ice water at meals, which causes dyspepsia by chilling the stomach and so lessening both its secretion and movements, which are very essential to a normal digestion.

A Novel Harrow Tooth.

A harrow tooth that will cut and will not clog is an invention for which Mr. Augustus H. Schaffer of Ontonagon, Mich., has received a patent. The tooth is made of flat spring steel, is tapered and is formed with a rectangularly extending flange at its upper edge, which flange is intended to fit snugly over a harrow tooth bar. The one side face of the tooth is convex and the opposing side concave. Furthermore, the front cutting edge of the tooth is sharpened and convex and the back concave.

Substitute For India Rubber.

Substitutes for India rubber and gutta percha are claimed to be attained by a new process. Fatty oils in the pure state or fatty oils mixed with various quantities of gums, resins, waxes, asphalt, pitch, tar or kindred substances, sulphur or sulphur chloride, coloring matter, a volatile solvent, such as naphtha, turpentine, carbon bisulphid, are the ingredients used.

How Long a Wink Lasts.

Observations have led to estimating the average duration of an eye wink at forty-hundredths of a second. The lid ascends four times as quickly as it descends. During the winking the eyes remain closed for seventeen-one-hundredths of a second, which is almost impossible for us to notice.

New Use For a Byproduct.

The Cereal Sugar company of Peoria, Ill., through an old German vinegar maker, has discovered a process whereby one gallon of hydrol, a byproduct in the refining of sugar, can be manufactured into one gallon of excellent crude spirits and about three gallons of good vinegar.



Some twenty years ago Poliakov described a new species of wild horse discovered in the deserts of Mongolia by the late Colonel Przewalski. The animal appeared to be intermediate between the domesticated horse and the wild asses. For a long time, however, only this single example was known, and naturalists were uncertain as to whether it was really a distinct species or only a hybrid.

A writer in Nature states that the question has finally been settled by the importation of a drove of colts of the species which Mr. C. Hagenbeck of Hamburg secured for the Duke of Bedford. The animals are now at Woburn Abbey, where the writer of the article examined them.

They are, he says, undoubtedly examples of a new species. In general appearance they are more like ponies than donkeys and, judging from their build, will never grow very large. The ears are short. Most of them have white muzzles, dun colored coats and black fore legs, manes and tails, the manes being at present upright. The hoofs are relatively large, like those of the horse and Asiatic wild ass. There is practically no forelock and only a faint indication of a dorsal stripe in one or two individuals.

Eloquent on Both Sides.

Senator Gorman of Maryland in a recent speech in Baltimore said: "I remember during my former service in the United States senate when we had quite a sharp division in our ranks. One very great man introduced a resolution which some of us thought was unwise. He made a half hour speech, full of eloquence and force, in favor of this resolution. Just before he sat down I caught his eye and shook my head. The great man turned at once to the president. 'Mr. President,' he said, 'that was one side of the question. There is another side.' He then spoke with equal eloquence and force against the resolution for half an hour. He said it was too serious a matter to take snap judgment on and ended by moving to adjourn. Afterward he came over to me and asked, 'What the devil is it all about anyway?'"

Value of Guernseys.

In my opinion, the best plan for the man who wishes to raise larger butter cows from grade Jerseys is to get a "business" Guernsey bull, says a correspondent in Rural New Yorker. He will get more size than the pure breeds of either breed. A Guernsey male used on high grade Jersey cows seems to get better average results in producers than is obtained with pure breeds of either breed. This is contrary to the best accepted theory, I know, and does not apply to all cross breeding, but the facts of extended observation and experience with both breeds have changed a strongly preconceived bias against mixed breeding with grades. A good Jersey-Guernsey grade is today the best dairy cow for the ordinary farmer, and I believe the further crossing will be just as successful if continued in one direction, but promiscuous mixing is hardly desirable. With a good registered herd of either breed permit no crossing, but with a herd of high grade Jerseys I am sure the size and also the dairy qualities can be improved by the use of a Guernsey bull of high dairy qualities. In your selection beware of beefy tendencies.

Russianizing Finland.

The Russification of Finland proceeds apace. A correspondent of a London paper, writing from Odessa, says that scarcely a week passes but some new imperial ukase, ministerial edict or gubernatorial order deprives the Finns of one or another of their old self governing institutions, rights and privileges. Finland, he says, can no longer be called an autonomous grand ducal appanage of the imperial crown. The latest ministerial edict, promulgated at Helsingfors, orders the disbandment of the Finnish metropolitan police, who are to be forthwith replaced by Russians, and the Russian system of organization and administration.

The Immortals.

The French academy has appropriated a sum for the maintenance of an album in which three photographs of every immortal, one showing the full face and two the profile, will be carefully preserved. When an academician dies, it is usual to adorn what may be called the literary Hotel des Invalides with his bust, but occasionally the sculptor experiences difficulty in finding a trustworthy representation of the departed great.

Pasture For Hogs.

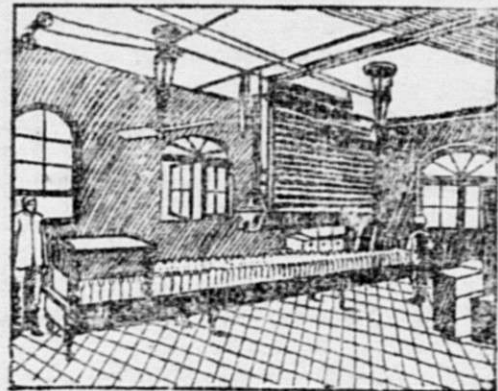
Every hog raiser should prepare a pasture for his hogs, and a good one, not just one or two acres for fifty or more hogs to run on all season. Get a good, large pasture and plenty of range, as it is a great profit with little cost, and it will not pay to keep hogs in dry lots the year round. They will not make you much money after you count up the cost of feed.—Exchange.

IN A MODEL DAIRY.

Cooling and Bottling Room of the Fairfield Dairy Farm.

In Dairy and Creamery Nelson W. McLain gives an interesting account of the big Fairfield dairy farm at Montclair, N. J. The article is profusely illustrated. The illustration herewith reproduced shows the room in which the milk is cooled and bottled.

As soon as the milk is drawn it is taken to the milkroom and strained into large bright milk cans, and the full cans, four in a group, are carried by an endless overhead wire cable to the dairy building, which is located on slightly lower ground about fifty rods distant from the barns. There the milk is delivered in the second story.



COOLING MILK AND FILLING THE BOTTLES where it is emptied into a three compartment strainer containing three felt strainers. From the strainers the milk runs over a huge star cooler and aerator in a large tile walled and floored sterilized milkroom on the first floor. From the cooler the milk runs into the bottling tank and is bottled in sterilized bottles, sealed and put in crates, twelve quart bottles in each crate, and the space between the bottles filled with clipped ice and salt, then loaded on large three horse trucks for delivery at the railway station or at the distributing depots.

Salary of the French President.

It is often said that the French president receives no more than \$120,000 a year for his services—that is, as a matter of fact the actual salary of the head of the republic, but it is not generally known that M. Loubet is supplied gratuitously with a number of household necessities which represent in value at least \$10,000 a year. For fruit, vegetables, game, oil, logs for his fires, gas and electricity he pays nothing, while in addition his household linen is washed free of charge.

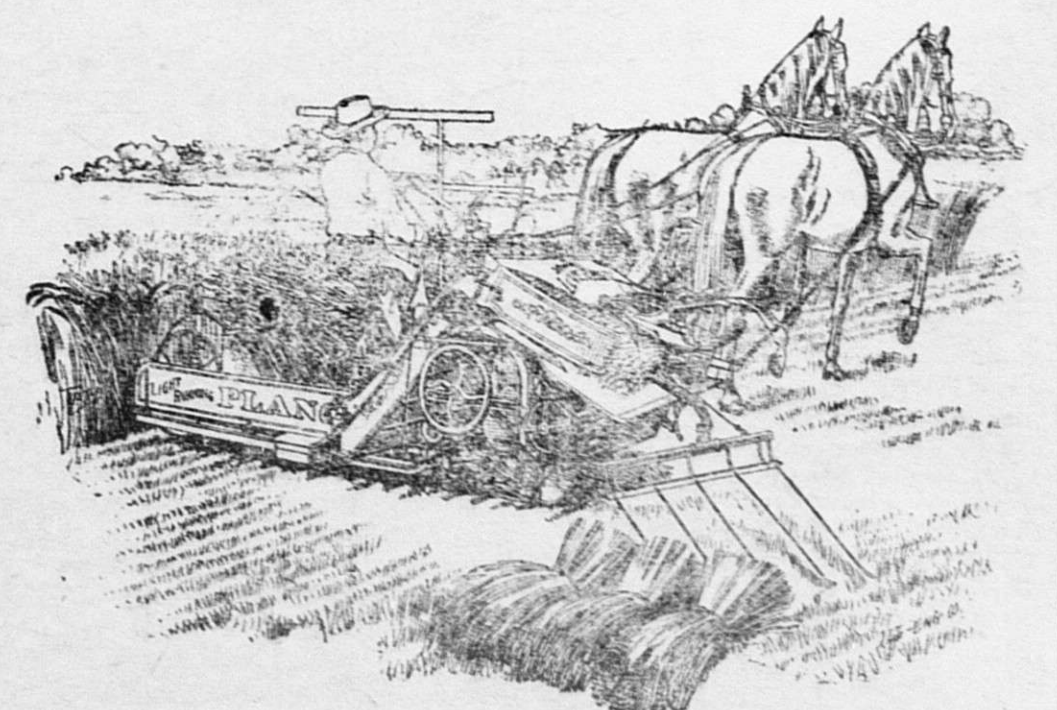

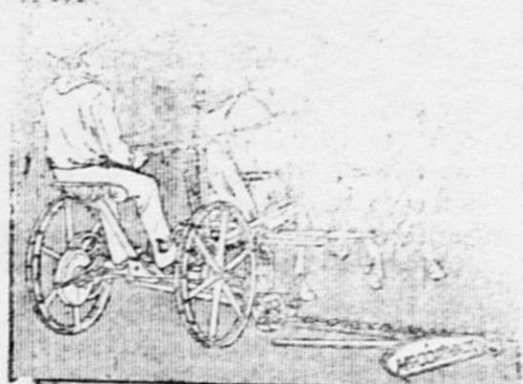

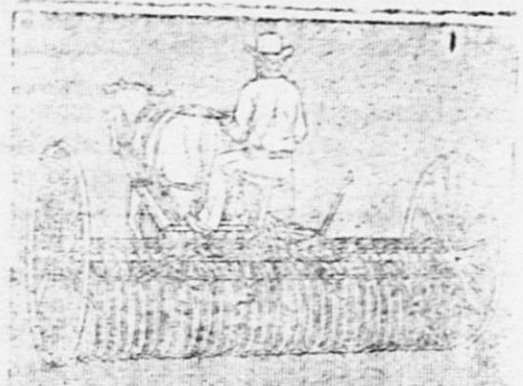
