



Climate and Crop Bulletin.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin of the Weather Bureau, Michigan section, for the week ending April 26.

The mean daily temperature for the week was 48.3 degrees or 2.2 degrees above normal, the average rainfall was 1.22 or 0.70 of an inch above the normal, the average sunshine was 38 percent of the possible amount.

The early part of the week was dry and warm and unfavorable for crop growth, the latter part was cooler with a general rainfall, which greately improved vegetation. The rainfall has been beneficial to wheat, rye, meadow and pastures, which show a general improvement. Reports regarding winter wheat are encouraging, the plant is still small but looks strong and healthy. Pastures are beginning to green up, but as yet afford little feed, in a few southern counties stock is being turned out, but in most cases is being fed.

The soil in the Upper Peninsula is wet and heavy and delayed field work somewhat, in the lower counties it is in fine condition for plowing. Plowing for corn is general in the lower peninsula, in the southern counties it is nearly completed. Ground is being broken for potatoes, sugar beets and beans.

Oat, barley and pea seeding has been quite general, oat seeding is well advanced in most of the southern and central counties, the seed-bed continues cool and oats are germinating slowly. Early potatoe planting is in progress in most counties as far north as Leelanau and Grand Traverse, some sugar beet seeding is reported from having tasted food since his former Dated Tawas City, Mich., May 1, 1902. Reports regarding fruit, except peaches, continue very promising, but peaches in the southwestern counties indicate a rather short crop, although in other counties their prospects are





Calfakins For Wall Drapery.

A decorative artist who is enthusiastic about natural calfskins says: They are simply ideal for the den in the summer cottage, the lodge in the woods or the bungalow, for those cream and brown and black and white tones will harmonize perfectly with the usual furnishings, and the hairy skins will serve admirably as wall drapery or to throw over a table or tabaret. Furthermore, entire mantels are to be covered with these spotted skins, and in rooms in which 'natural' ornaments, as they are called, are used, such as bows, arrows and other Indian implements, oddly fashioned gourds, fishing rods, etc., the effect will be excellent. They are the most thoroughly artistic things that have made their appearance so far for the summer home."

The use of these skins is not, however, confined to the summer home. They have already found their way into the library and den of the city home, and one of the most highly prized possessions of a local bachelor is a tablean ordinary pine affair painted greenon top of which one of these skins in cream and brown is fastened with small bronze headed nails.-Exchange.

Sunshine Pudding With Snaw Eggs. Cover half a package of gelatin with half a cup of cold water and let it soak until tender. Whip dry one part of cream and place it on a fine wire sieve in a cold place to drain. Put one pint of milk' in a double boiler to scald Separate five eggs; beat the yolks with one cup of sugar until light; add to the hot milk with the dissolved gelating and cook a few minutes. Then strain into a basin and set aside to cool. Beat the whites of the eggs with five tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar until stiff and white. Shape like eggs with a spoon and steam them a few minutes over hot water to "set" the white. Decorate a mold with these. Then add the strained juice of four large oranges to the pudding and stir it over cracked fee until it begins to thicken. Carefully stir in the whipped cream and turn the mixture into the mold and set away to harden. Serve with orange compote for garnish.

A German Delicacy.

A "chopped roast," as it is called, which is frequently served in German households is somewhat similar to the American veal loaf or beef roll, but sufficiently unlike to offer variety. Get from a butcher whom you can trust a pound each of beef, veal and pork, the meat free from sinews and chopped separately. With this mix fifteen pieces of zwieback rolled very fine, three beaten eggs, one cup of water, an even tablespoonful of salt, a half teaspoonful of pepper, a little grated nutmeg and a small onion, grated. Mix thoroughly and shape into a loaf. Lay over the top three or four thin strips of salt pork. Bake an hour and a quarter in a quick oven, basting thoroughly.

A Handy Bag.

This little receptacle will be found very convenient for soiled laces and handkerchiefs or embroidered pieces which are not to be consigned to the general laundry bag.

It can be made of silk or, if desired, of wash material. To make the bag proper take a large circle, say twentyfour inches in diameter. Face the edge all around to a depth of one inch and a half with some material, then sew the two together half an inch nearer the edge to allow room to pass the drawstrings.

square, cut out a six inch circle from the center and bind neatly the raw edge thus made. Draw the strings in the bag apart so that it will be the size of the handkerchief's inner circle and sew the handkerchief in place to form a drapery to the bag. A little tassel at each of the four corners of the drapery and at the bottom of the bag, plenty of ribbon on each side for drawstrings, used also to hang up the bag, and the receptacle is ready.

A Simple Trick.

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
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
