NEW WOMAN NEWS

THERE are things that occasionally make even the New Woman discouraged with her sex, for a little while at least, not long. She always picks up and goes on again presently in full faith that the natural common sense and the brains in women's heads will bring them around right sooner or later, certainly in 5,000 years or so more. One of the discouraging phases of the woman question is the awful, the unclean, the villainous long skirts women drag about on the street. Some of these even in front trail two inches upon the ground. I have noticed, too, that the poorer a woman is and the less able she is to buy new gowns the longer this unclean, troublesome trail of goods is. It is very common to see a poor laborer's wife plowing her way along the street with a baby wagon, a three-year-old child hanging to her dress, another a little older the other side of her and she with a cheap, badly made skirt slopping upon the ground several inches of its length. It is so soiled and unpleasant looking that no clean woman would let it cross her threshold, and yet that poor, bedraggled, shabby creature datters herself she is gowned in the height of Fifth avenue mode. It is the pleasing custom of that noble lady, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, when a woman, millionaire or working girl, comes to see her to give that woman a rating that she does not soon forget if she has ventured into the presence wearing a street mop for a skirt. The noble lady has gone so far as to say that no street mop should come into her beautiful boudoir, bringing with it microbes of disease and poison and divers things unpleasant for her to think of. I have known of those who when they saw one of these villainous skirts directly in front of them could not resist the temptation to set a foot upon it and rip or tear it tremendously.

Every spring, when the sunshine and the long days come again, without fail I get a fever on me to go to the country and raise flowers and chickens. I never do it, but ever the longing comes back. In New York city eggs have been between 35 and 50 cents a dozen much of the winter. A friend who has no particular facilities for housing and nesting hens beyond a comfortable barn basement and an ordinary board poultry house tells me that without any special care on her part her few fowls have given her a dozen eggs a day the cold weather through. To be sure, she knows the right breed to have and the right mixture of food for them, but the hens themselves do all the rest.

The French government has lately given several war medals to women who earned them during the Franco-Prussian contest. One of the women, Mme. Laurin, actually fought in the

ranks as a zouave soldier. She was taken prisoner by the Germans, but her shrewdness enabled her to escape. Another woman was a veteran receiving a medal is Mlle. Dodu, a telegraph operator, who tapped the wires and stole messages the Prussians were sending concerning army movements. A third woman decorated is Mme. Benon, who was an army nurse.

Now it looks as if a woman can even design a railroad car better than a man can. The private car of the family of Mr. T. Ryan, a railway director, was designed by Mrs. Ryan and built according to her orders. The Ryans were traveling in their car in Texas when they encountered a wreck and a smash-up, in which the only car left whole was that planned by the woman.

In Europe more women work in balloon making factories than men. One Frenchwoman, Mme. Lechambre, will start such a factory of her own in the United States.

A New York city girl, Miss Emma Lonsdale, found a negro burglar in her room. What did she do—scream or faint? This is what: "I grabbed him and asked him what he wanted. He said he was looking for the janitor. I found my silver watch and silver knife in his pockets. Then I called the hall-boy, and he watched him while I ran out and found a policeman."

The first woman suffrage petition in England was presented to parliament in 1867, and it was signed by 1,449 names. The latest one, presented last year, was signed by 257,000 women. Woman's rights is dead, is it?
