MENTAL FATIGUE TESTS.

A very interesting report by Mr. Parez of Edinburgh, issued by the board of education, discusses the question of mental fatigue. Attempts have been made to estimate fatigue by such tests as the loss of muscular power, the decrease of sensibility in the skin or increase of inaccuracy in the work done. Mathematics and, strange to say, gymnastics prove to be the most exhausting subjects; foreign languages and religious instruction come next, but at a long interval the mother tongue, natural science, geography and history make but little calls on the system; singing and drawing still less. Afternoon work is inferior to and more tiring than that done in the morning, and even in the latter efficiency increases up to a maximum and then begins to

The Vice President's Position.

The late English embassador Lord Pauncefote, while a man of democratic ways and confessing fondness for life in the United States, was always a great stickler for form on state occasions. When he was created an embassador, he claimed the right as the personal representative of Queen Victoria to the place next the president at all social functions which both attended. This occasioned controversy, the late Vice President Hobart, who was one of the most lavish entertainers Washington ever knew, insisting that he should precede the embassador. 
Effete Slang.



Insoluble Phosphates.

The use of insoluble phosphates, whether in the form of phosphatic rock land is Sir Frederick Treves. It was er of the so called Thomas slag, has he who performed the operation on long been a bone of contention or debatable matter not only among the scientific men, but the practical farmers. The former have questioned physicians and surgeons of Great Britwhether the insoluble phosphate could ain. Sir Frederick Treves is a fellow be of any value as plant food, and some of the farmers have claimed that their crops were very much benefited by it. Although we have not tested it, our opinion leads us to believe that the farmers are right, and those who rely only on scientific principles may be wrong. We do not place sufficient confidencé in the power of the soil and the action of frosts, rain and summer heat upon what are sometimes called insoluble fertilizers.

We know little of the power that these elements may exert, and when to the natural elements of the soil there may be added the effect of decomposing vegetable matter, either as stable manure or as green manure, plowed under, we can only say that we think they have much effect in making soluble not only phosphatic but other mineral elements in the soil. Those who have used the finely ground rock or Thomas slag upon fields which had received a liberal dressing of stable manure or had been treated with a green crop plowed under are so unanimously in its favor that we cannot doubt but that the so called insoluble phosphates do become soluble in the soll under certain conditions, depending upon the soil or the treatment it has received .- American Cultivator.

Trickery Not Possible.

Just after the oleo bill was passed there was some fear among butter makers that the oleo men would be able to get around the law by using butter containing artificial coloring matter. It will be remembered that J. W. Wadsworth, the New York congressman, tried to saddle the bill with an amendment providing that "colored butter shall not be construed as coloration." Had this become law the oleo people could have taken red butter and used it to color their mixture, thus evading the ten cent tax. The treasury department has settled the matter definitely in the following statement:

"For example, if butter that has been artificially colored is used as a component part of the finished product oleomargarine (and that finished product looks like butter of any shade of yellow), as the oleomargarine is not free from artificial coloration, the tax of 10 cents per pound will be assessed and

That seems to settle it so far as colored butter is concerned, and we think honest people will agree that it is fair to all .- Rural New Yorker.

Feeding Bran to Dairy Cows. While good pasturage is one of the best, if not the best, foods that can be

supplied to the dairy cows during the growing season, yet if the best possible results are secured in the production of milk it will in nearly all cases be found advisable to feed the dairy cows some wheat bran daily. The quantity need not be large, but it should be supplied regularly. If a little cornmeal is added, the results would be still better. But bran and good pasturage will enable a cow to maintain a full flow of milk throughout the summer, and the milk will be richer and better for making of good butter than if pasturage alone is depended upon. It is not necessary to put the cows in the stables to feed bran. Convenient boxes or troughs can be arranged in the lot or pasture where the cows are milked and the feeding be done with very little trouble.-St. Louis Republic.

To Handle a Balky Horse. A correspondent of the Prairie Farmer thus tells how to manage a balky

As I was very much interested in the way in which the driver brought his balky horse to a start, so pleasingly told in a recent issue of the Prairie Farmer, I send the following, which I know to be very effective in bringing a balky horse to his senses: Make a large loop in one end of a rope, and into it, about half way from foot to knee, put one of the horse's fore legs, then pass the other end of the rope to the driver, who will gently draw it till the horse raises his foot from the ground and shows an inclination to go. As soon as the horse starts loosen the rope around his leg and let him go at any pace he chooses. This experiment I saw tried with great success on one of the balkiest horses I ever saw.
