## Republican Convention.

The republican convention for the nomination of county candidates assembled at the court house last Monday, at 10 o'clock and completed its labors before adjourning for dinner. All township and wards were represented except Reno, although all delegations were not full.

The convention was called to order by P. E. Shien, chairman of the county committee, and Hon. G. A. Prescott was chosen temporary chairman, and Judge A. R. Wier, temporary secretary. The following committees were appointed:

Credentials—C. R. Jackson, Will McGillivray and Adam Cataline.  
Permanent Organization and Order of business—George Sutherland, W. B. Kelly and Norman Murchison.

A recess of fifteen minutes was then taken to give the committees time to report. On reassembling the committee on permanent organization and order of business reported in favor of making temporary officers permanent, which was adopted. W. W. Ramage and Thomas Bradley were appointed tellers.

After a resolution was adopted permitting all delegations to cast the full number of votes to which their township was entitled, the convention proceeded to the nomination of candidates.

W. B. Kelly presented the name of Collie Johnson for the office of sheriff and no other nomination being made the rules were suspended and the nomination made unanimous.

When the nominations for clerk were called George Sutherland took the floor and said that four years ago he placed in nomination John A. Mark, and two years ago repeated the trick, and he now presented the same candidate for the third time. No other nominations were made and Mr. Mark was unanimously nominated.

James H. Nesbit presented the name of Charles A. Jahraus for prosecuting attorney and he was accorded the same treatment as previous candidates and named by acclamation.

The first ballot of the convention came for treasurer. C. R. Jackson presented the name of James Richards, who held the office for the past two years. John Doyle presented the name of Harry Stockman, of AuSable. The result of the first ballot was, Stockman 21, Richards 19, J. M. Walker 1. A motion was made to declare Mr. Stockman the nominee of the convention, which was amended to proceed to another ballot. The chair ruled that it required a majority of all votes of the convention, 42, to nominate. After considerable discussion a motion was carried to proceed to another ballot. The result of the second ballot gave Stockman 25, and Richard 16. The presenting of Mr. Stockman's name came as a surprise as it was generally believed that all candidates who were serving their first term would be renominated, and no inkling of Mr. Stockman's candidacy had been heard until just before the convention assembled.

Register of Deeds E. A. Crandall was given a unanimous renomination, on his name being presented by W. B. Kelly.  
Edwin Rawden, was nominated for circuit court commissioner by acclamation, as was Howard M. Belknap for surveyor, and Dr. N. J. McColl and George C. Walker for coroners.

Delegates to the state convention to nominate a candidate for justice of the supreme court were elected as follows:

C. R. Jackson, East Tawas.  
W. H. Simpson, AuSable.  
W. M. Blakley, Oscoda.  
C. A. Jahraus, Tawas City,  
Peter E. Shien, of this city, was re-elected chairman of the county committee, and Will McGillivray, of Oscoda was elected secretary, for the ensuing two years.

## Death's Doings.

Nellie, the beloved wife of Allen J. Grenney, died at her home in this city, Friday evening, August 2, 1902, of general tuberculosis, aged 26 years, 7 months and 5 days.

The deceased was born in this city, January 28, 1876, and the only child of Mr. and Mrs. James Hamilton. She was united in marriage to Mr. Grenney, August 2, 1899, her death occurring on the third anniversary of her marriage, at almost the same hour. She was a young woman of many attainments and was universally beloved and respected by a large circle of acquaintances, and her death, in the prime of womanhood, has cast a gloom over our entire city. Besides the bereaved husband and parents she leaves a little son, thirteen months old, and a large circle of relatives to mourn for one whose place cannot be filled.

The funeral was held from the M. E. church Monday afternoon, and was largely attended by sorrowing friends. Rev. E. King conducted the services. The remains were laid at rest in the city cemetery.

Ruby, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Armstrong, died at the family home in this city, Tuesday, August 5, of tuberculosis, aged 16 years, 10 months, and 9 days. The deceased was born at Rockton, Ont., and came to this city with her parents in infancy. She was stricken with that fatal disease early last spring and has been a patient sufferer until death released her. The bereaved parents have the sympathy of all in their sad affliction. The funeral services were conducted from the home yesterday afternoon, Rev. A. Waterbury officiating, and the remains laid at rest in the city cemetery.

## Circuit Court.

The adjourned term of circuit court convened last Tuesday, with Judge Connine presiding. The first case on trial was that of the people vs. Peese Shampine charged with attempting rape. Prosecuting attorney Jahraus appeared for the people and J. E. Simerson for the defendant. The jury rendered a verdict of assault, and the defendant was remanded to jail to await sentence later in the term.

The next case was against William Sinclair charge with robbery. George L. Cornville appeared for the defendant. The jury found him guilty and he was held for sentence.

Joseph W. Holler, who pleaded guilty to horse stealing paid his fine of \$100 and was discharged.

The case of Norman Marchison vs. John McMullen et al., growing out of the removal of the old cheese factory, which was used as a hall by Vine Grange, of Tawas township, it now on trial.

## MENTAL FATIGUE TESTS.

A very interesting report by Mr. Parez of Edinburgh, issued by the board of education, discusses the question of mental fatigue. Attempts have been made to estimate fatigue by such tests as the loss of muscular power, the decrease of sensibility in the skin or increase of inaccuracy in the work done. Mathematics and, strange to say, gymnastics prove to be the most exhausting subjects; foreign languages and religious instruction come next, but at a long interval, the mother tongue, natural science, geography and history make but little calls on the system; singing and drawing still less. Afternoon work is inferior to and more tiring than that done in the morning, and even in the latter efficiency increases up to a maximum and then begins to decline.

## The Vice President's Position.

The late English ambassador, Lord Pauncefoot, while a man of democratic ways and confessing a fondness for life in the United States, was always a great stickler for form on state occasions. When he was created an ambassador, he claimed the right as the personal representative of Queen Victoria to the place next the president at all social functions which both attended. This occasioned controversy, the late Vice President Hobart, who was one of the most lavish entertainers Washington ever knew, insisting that he should precede the ambassador. President McKinley decided in Vice President Hobart's favor on the ground that the vice president occupied the same position toward the president as an heir apparent did toward a monarch.

## Effete Slang.

The worst use of slang is not when it is fresh and piquant, but when it becomes stale and passes into the regular vocabulary of the people, to the exclusion of good English, says the Toronto Globe. Such expressions as "I can see his finish" when they are first uttered are often used with considerable humorous effect. But the language is impoverished and vulgarized by the habitual use of "turn down" for reject, "call down" for a mild rebuke, "roast" for a severe one, etc. After these expressions have been used for a certain time they ought to be taken out of circulation, along with the ragged banknotes.

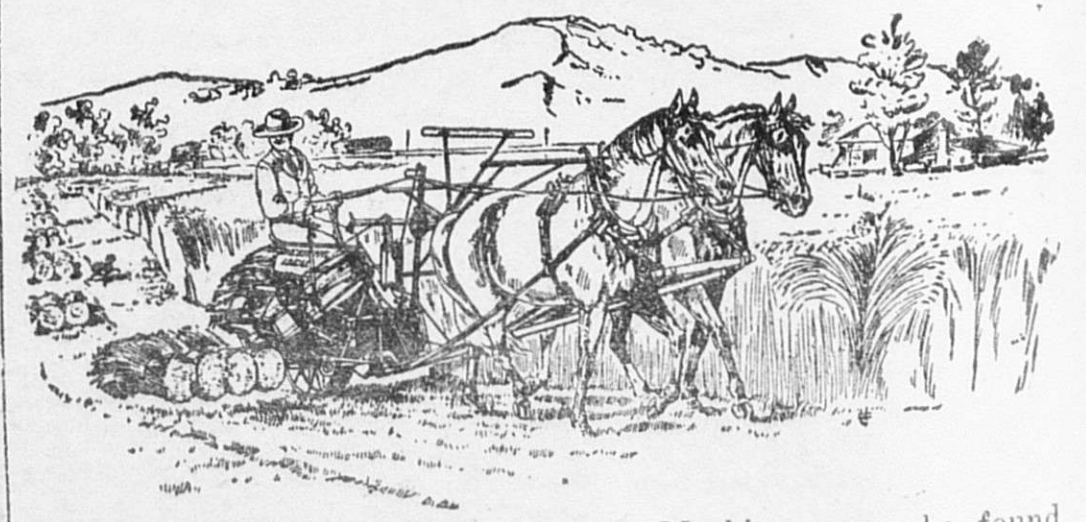



HINTS FOR FARMERS PEOPLE OF THE DAY

Insoluble Phosphates. The use of insoluble phosphates, whether in the form of phosphatic rock or of the so called Thomas slag, has long been a bone of contention or debatable matter not only among the scientific men, but the practical farmers. The former have questioned whether the insoluble phosphate could be of any value as plant food, and some of the farmers have claimed that their crops were very much benefited by it. Although we have not tested it, our opinion leads us to believe that the farmers are right, and those who rely only on scientific principles may be wrong. We do not place sufficient confidence in the power of the soil and the action of frosts, rain and summer heat upon what are sometimes called insoluble fertilizers. We know little of the power that these elements may exert, and when to the natural elements of the soil there may be added the effect of decomposing vegetable matter, either as stable manure or as green manure, plowed under, we can only say that we think they have much effect in making soluble not only phosphatic but other mineral elements in the soil. Those who have used the finely ground rock or Thomas slag upon fields which had received a liberal dressing of stable manure or had been treated with a green crop plowed under are so unanimously in its favor that we cannot doubt but that the so called insoluble phosphates do become soluble in the soil under certain conditions, depending upon the soil or the treatment it has received.—American Cultivator.

The King's Surgeon. Among the famous surgeons of England is Sir Frederick Treves. It was he who performed the operation on King Edward, though associated with him were several of the most eminent physicians and surgeons of Great Britain. Sir Frederick Treves is a fellow



of the Royal College of Surgeons and for many years has been a distinguished operator and surgeon in London. He was one of the many numerous medical men who went to South Africa during the progress of the recent war for the purpose of enlarging his clinical experience. For more than twenty years he has been recognized as an authority on abdominal operations.

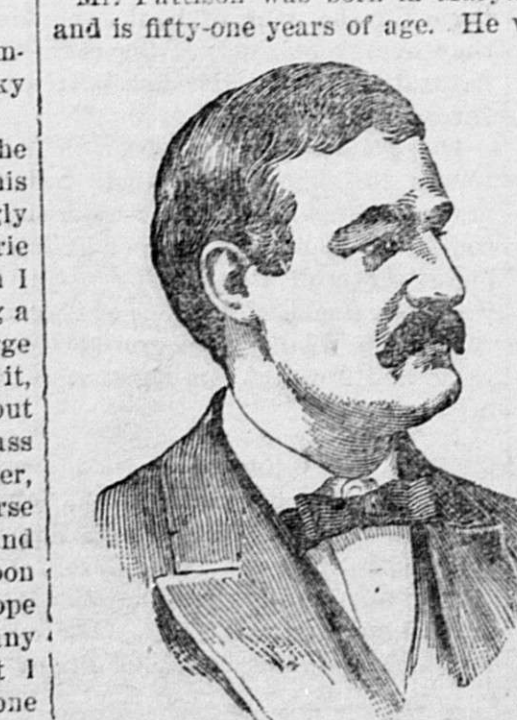
Buffalo Bill Off Duty. Among the tens of thousands of persons who saw Buffalo Bill on horseback at the wild west show less than a hundred probably know what he looks like out of the showman's arena, says the Philadelphia Press. William F. Cody is a very tall man, about 6 feet 3 inches, broad of shoulder, deep of chest and lithe of limb. He has a complexion like a healthy schoolgirl, eyes keen as a hawk's and a tongue like a baby's. Except for his whitening hair and the faintest suspicion of crow's feet around the eyelids no one would imagine that he is fifty-seven years old.

In dress Buffalo Bill is most fastidious. The close fitting buckskin riding breeches and embroidered hunting shirt that he wears in the ring are indicative of his carefulness in general attire. He wears usually a black cut-away coat of rough texture cloth, a double breasted fancy waistcoat of modest pattern and trousers with a thin white stripe that add to the effectiveness of his height. He is fond of jewels and has enough of them in the shape of gifts from potatoes in lands he has visited to make a creditable showing. He is seldom seen without a magnificent scarfpin presented to him by the Grand Duke Alexis after a hunting trip in the northwest. The only indication of the prairie scout that appears in his everyday dress is the slouch hat, with an unusually broad brim.

Nominated For Governor. At the recent state convention of the Democratic party of Pennsylvania ex-Governor Robert E. Pattison was nominated for governor. Mr. Pattison has twice been elected governor of Pennsylvania, in 1881 and 1890, and enjoys the distinction of being the only Democrat elected to that office since the war of the rebellion.

Mr. Pattison was born in Maryland and is fifty-one years of age. He was educated in Philadelphia, which city has been his home since boyhood. He studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1872. He entered politics soon after taking up the practice of law and was elected city controller of Philadelphia in 1877 and was re-elected in 1880, but resigned to become governor, to which position he was elected, as stated above, in 1881, at the age of thirty-one.

An Revolt of the Cambons. Jules Cambon, the French ambassador, with his wife, sailed the other day from New York for France. The ambassador commented on the good feeling existing between the two republics. Mme. Cambon, who is a comparative stranger in America, said, "What struck me most was the independent ways of the American women."



Colonel Gillmore's Promotion. Colonel Quincy O. M. Gillmore has been appointed by Governor Murphy of New Jersey brigadier general, succeeding the late General Cooper in command of the Second brigade of the New Jersey national guard. Colonel Gillmore assumes command at the Sea Girt encampment.

The Supply of Hogs. Hog supplies at the markets continue light. The failure of the corn crop in 1901 cut down materially the productive machinery. What should now be parent stock went to the slaughter pens. The outlook is good for the man who raises hogs for market.

Wanted the Senator to Prevent the Crowning Outrage. Senator Platt of Connecticut had a caller one day in May last at his hotel in Washington. An elderly and dignified man sent up his card, and the senator came down to see him. The senator was familiar with the man by name, but had never met him. They chatted for a few moments on various topics. Then the visitor said: "Senator, you are from my state, and I come to you to see about a matter of the greatest importance. You can prevent the crowning outrage in the history of the world."

The man had been talking sally before that, and Senator Platt looked at him curiously and said: "How can I be of such service to humanity?" The man brought out a portfolio of papers and took from it a wax impression of a seal used on the diplomas granted by the Centennial exposition at Philadelphia and an old Egyptian coin. He held them out to the senator. "Here," he said, "are the two proofs that show that my ten-year-old son is the lawful king of England. Another man, an impostor, is to be crowned, and I want you to stop it so my boy can get his kingdom."

Senator Platt said he would see about it, but could do nothing that day, as the president was in New York. The man said he would come around again.

His Father's Advice. The father of Lewis Sells, the circus proprietor, used to visit his son occasionally on the road. One day he saw Lewis in earnest conversation

Would Have Bankrupted Rhodes. Cecil Rhodes once was conversing with Emperor William in regard to an agreement entered into between the German government and himself about the construction of the Cape to Cairo telegraph line through German territory in Africa. The emperor said, "Well, Mr. Rhodes, I hope you are satisfied with the arrangement."

"No," replied Rhodes, "unless, sir, you want to see Cecil Rhodes file his petition in bankruptcy." "What do you mean?" asked the kaiser. "I mean," was the reply, "that there is a clause in this document which provides that while your majesty undertakes to protect the telegraph against attacks or injury Cecil Rhodes has to pay the whole cost incurred in such defense. Now, sir, there is nothing in the clause to prevent you from sending a whole army corps for this purpose, and if I had to pay for that I should have to file my petition." The kaiser laughed and said, "Quite right," and, turning to Count von Bulow, who was present, said: "Add words limiting Mr. Rhodes' liability to £40,000. That's fair, I think." To which Rhodes replied that he was perfectly satisfied.

Distance Lends Enchantment. During the session of the British parliament in 1879 James Lowther, the chief secretary for Ireland, rose from his seat and was hurriedly leaving the house just as Mr. Synan, an Irish representative with a very loud voice, began to call attention to some Irish grievance. New Yacht Class. Another new class, one design fifteen footers, has been adopted by the famous Savannah-Corinthian Yacht club of New York. The members believe that the new craft will rival the famous knockabouts of 1897. The new boats will be keel sloops measuring fifteen feet, racing under the new measurement rule. They will carry mainsail, jib and spinnaker, with a sail area of not over 350 square feet in the mainsail and jib. They will have open cockpits and be nonsinkable.

Cruzados and McChesney. A race between "Lucky" Baldwin's Cruzados and S. C. Hildreth's McChesney for \$20,000 is a probability. These two horses were compelled to withdraw from the American Derby owing to injuries received at Harlem, Chicago. Mr. Hildreth said that he would take up Baldwin's wager for a race over the Derby route, and when Mr. Baldwin was informed he said his challenge held good and that they would make the race a feature for some near date.

Death of "Wanda." Mrs. M. F. Lindsay, wife of Milt F. Lindsay, died recently at her residence in Cincinnati. Mrs. Lindsay was well known among the trap shooters as "Wanda," having accompanied her husband to many of the prominent tournaments and also visited gun clubs throughout the central and eastern states. She formerly indulged in trap shooting, but falling health during the past few years caused her to forsake her favorite pastime.

Tripp's Good Shooting. Ernest Tripp now holds the flying target championship of Indiana, having won this honor recently at Muncie with a score of 92 out of 100.

When the President Approves. When President Roosevelt desires to express his approbation of a man in the highest possible terms, he calls him a "corker."
