Lost, a Large Quantity of Water.

It is stated that the normal discharge of water from the inland lakes that find their outlet at Cheboygan is 175,000 cubic feet per minute; yet notwithstanding the copious rainfall of the season, the flow has been reduced to 100,000 cubic feet per minute. Several theories are projected as to the cause of this falling off. Among them are—reduction of the forest area, increased drainage of the country by which the floods are carried off with a rush to be succeeded by drouth, increased abstinence from intoxicants and a larger use of water under the impulse of the prohibition campaign, etc.—*Detroit Tribune.*

Pickling Made Easy.

I notice so many elaborate receipts for cucumber pickles, involving much labor that I wish every burdened housekeeper to know my simple and successful method, which I have used for 20 years, writes a housewife to Good Housekeeping. Wash the cucumbers clean, and lay them in a crock or jar. Dissolve fine cooking salt in boiling water, making it quite strong, and pour over the cucumbers while hot. Cover and let stand 24 hours. Then pour off this brine, put the cucumbers in your pickle jar with layers of mixed spices between, and pour over them enough vinegar brought to a boil to cover. They will be ready to eat in a few days, are always firm and crisp, and will keep good two years.

Unfortunately it happened to be published in the December number, which was then the index number of the Atlantic. The person who made the index knew from Mr. Hale's handwriting that he had been the author of the story, and so, in spite of every precaution, the index at the end of the volume told the authorship.

Chinese Servants.

A suburban family of wealth, says the Philadelphia Record, has two Chinamen in pure white native dress to do the work of the house. These servants are called Ching and Pong, and their skill and diligence are incomparable. Pong, the cook, prepares puff paste, clear soups, intricate sauces and such-like difficult dishes admirably, and there is no end to the pains to which he will resort in order that everything shall be served in a first rate manner. The other day all the family were in New York, save one son, a boy of fourteen, and for this lad the cook prepared an elaborate dinner, the dessert of which was a brick of ice cream in five flavors—bisque, strawberry, chocolate, vanilla and peach. There was only one freezer in the house, and in it he had made tiny portions of each flavor, one at a time. Ching, who is the butler, puts on one and sometimes two and three clean white suits a day. Twice a week the men go to town to have their heads shaved.

The Moving Sidewalk.

A well known French engineer, M. 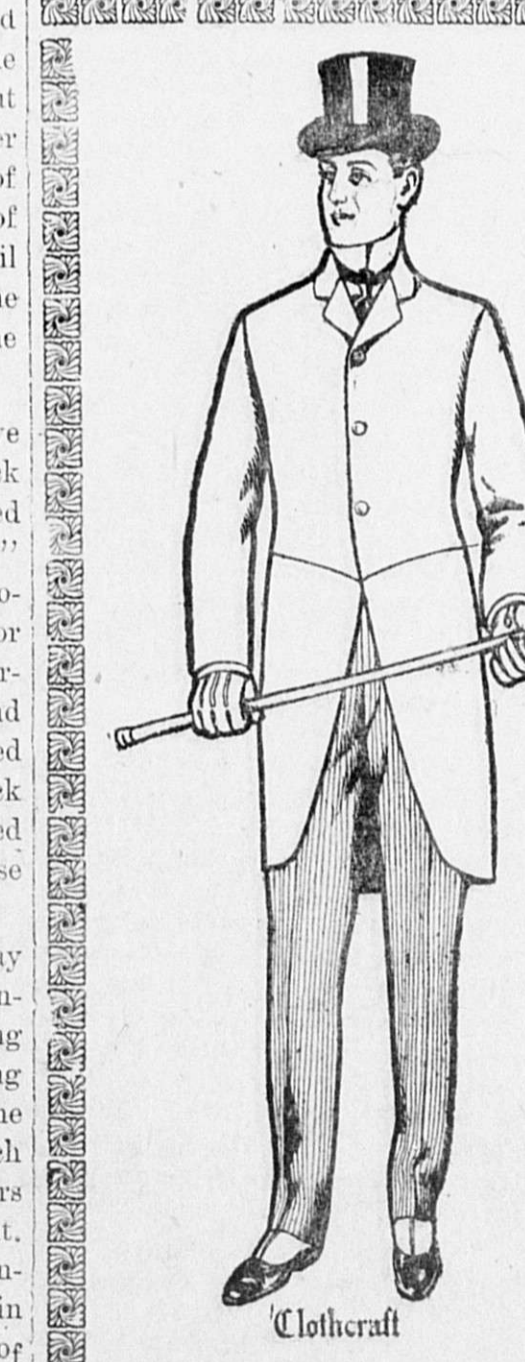
