

In Norway torpedo boats are now carrying the mail between Christiania and Bergen. The naval authorities have long been anxious to increase the All Work Guarante ed! efficiency of the officers and men on board of these boats as much as possible, and they finally decided that this object could best be achieved by letting the boats run regularly between the two greatest cities in the country.

For three reasons this plan was preferred to any other-first, because during the trips the boats could be thoroughly tested; second, because the officers could become fully acquainted with that portion of the Norwegian coast, and, third, because the postal service would be benefited.

There is no railroad connection between Bergen and Christiania, and all postal communications between the two cities are delivered by boat. In doing this work the torpedo boats far excel the ordinary mail steamers.
