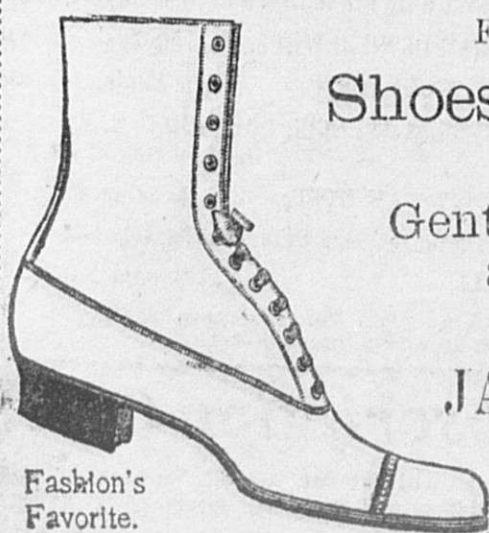

### Our Lecture Course.

The people of Tawas are to be favored with another excellent lecture course during the coming season. ### Proposed Amendments.

At the state election to be held next month two proposed amendments to the constitution of the state of Michigan, will be submitted to the electors for their approval or rejection. Joint resolutions, ordering their submission were adopted by the last legislature. The amendments were as follows: To provide by law for the indeterminate sentence as a punishment for crime on conviction thereof, and for the detention and release of persons imprisoned or detained on such sentences. This, if adopted, will be Sec. 47 of article 4, and takes the place of a section heretofore stricken out.

To change the law relative to publishing the general laws of any session within forty days, each paper in the state now being allowed \$15 for such publication. This entire section is stricken out with the exception of the first sentence, which says that the legislature shall not establish a state paper.

Voters will mark their ballots yes or no on these two propositions.

### Rural Free Libraries.

A meeting of the state library commission was held at Lansing last week when a plan was formulated to give every town and city in Michigan a library. There are many thriving and enterprising communities, having from 1,000 to 4,000 population, which support no library. The board members will visit each of these towns and will show the people how a library may be started. It will be pointed out that under a state law, a revenue is provided for this purpose from the system of fines imposed in the police courts. At present these funds are diverted for road building and other purposes. A room will be donated and a volunteer librarian called for. In time it is expected that each library association will be in a position to pay librarians for their services.

### Cahill Bolts Bliss.

Judge Edward Cahill, of Lansing, former judge of the supreme court, who has been a conspicuous member of the republican party in this state for many years and who has devoted much time and labor in the interests of better government, will not vote for Gov. Bliss, but will support the nomination of L. T. Durand. He has been actively interested in politics from the standpoint of good citizenship, and his observations, which embody the reason for his refusal to vote for the Republican candidate, are well worth reading.

"It is unusual for me," he said "to split my ticket, but I cannot vote for Gov. Bliss, for I do not believe that the corrupt methods by which he was nominated should be approved by Republicans. The only effectual method by which such corruption can be stopped is by voting against the men whom you know obtain nominations through such means. There have been laws against it on the statute books for years they have never been enforced, but the people have the remedy in their own hands and can enforce it by voting against the men who seek to obtain office by bartering for their nomination.

"I am acting upon that principle myself and the way for the people to make themselves felt is to use discrimination in voting. Spot the man who has been guilty of corruption in seeking the office. Do not get angry and bolt the whole ticket, but mark the men who are unfit to hold office and vote against them.

"While nobody believes that Gov. Bliss is personally corrupt in that he could be bribed with money, he has done a great deal to corrupt the politics of the state, and everyone feels humiliated that the man has not been—and would never be—governor in fact.

"L. T. Durand I have known for 25 years, and he would make a splendid governor. He is a man of character, brains, courage and conscience. He has always been an exceedingly modest man, and has never been prominent in politics, in that he never sought an office. Mr. Durand is essentially free from the taint of any machine, and combines those qualities which distinguish the gentleman and the scholar. He has the courage to do what he believes is right and the brains to know what he ought to do as governor of the state. If he has not I am woefully mistaken in my estimate of the man."
