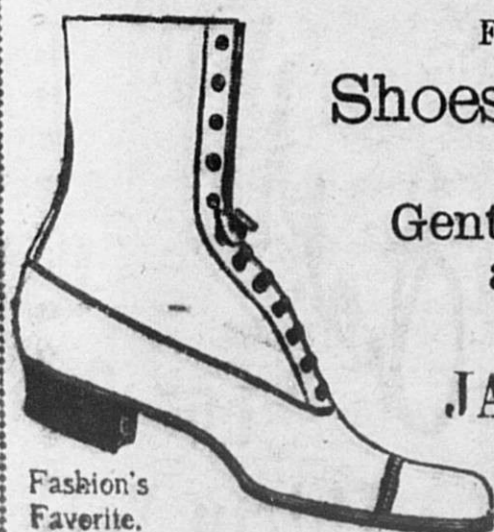

The SPORTING WORLD

Career of "Boots" Durnell.
C. E. Durnell, the young turfman who recently has become a factor in western racing affairs, has had wide experience for a man of his years. He is only twenty-six years of age and has followed the turf in America, England and France. He has served with

Enoch Wishard, the trainer for the stable of John A. Drake; has been a jockey, and is now gathering a strong stable of thoroughbreds.

Durnell is nicknamed "Boots" and bears a striking resemblance to Manager Clark Griffith of the Chicago White Stockings. He went to work for Scoggan Bros. in Kentucky in 1888 as a stable boy and jockey. At that time Enoch Wishard was working for the same stable. In 1893 the partnership of McCafferty & Wishard was formed, and Durnell became associated with the two turfmen as assistant trainer.

In 1897 he went to California as trainer for Galen Brown and there brought out his first horse, Potente. He next purchased Dr. Sheppard from Burns & Waterhouse, afterward taking the horse to England.

Durnell returned to America and arranged a partnership with Emil Herz. The latter is a native of Germany, and the present is his first connection with racing in this country. The firm has engaged Jockey Buchanan's riding services for the winter and will retain Jockey Treanor for lightweight riding. It has not been decided whether the firm will race in California or New Orleans.

Concerning "Rube" Waddell.
Some baseball managers declare that "Rube" Waddell, the interesting and eccentric pitcher, apparently has no idea of the "eternal fitness" of things. He is something of a spendthrift, and when he wants money he will promise anything and sign any agreement to get it. In this connection it is related that on one occasion when his services were in demand and he was being bid for by several clubs he had an appointment with a manager at the latter's hotel. They agreed on salary, and the contract was drawn up ready to sign. Then Rube insisted on having some money in advance.

FOR THE CHILDREN

Liquid Layers.

Everybody knows that some liquids are lighter than others. But there is nothing like an actual experiment to illustrate this important principle of physics to boys and girls or to grown people either for that matter.

The experiment here described may be made by any careful young person, and it is well worth making, if only for the amusement it will afford. Get a tall wineglass and into it pour cold sweetened coffee to a depth of half an inch.

Then make a cone of writing paper with a very small opening at the lower end, and bend that end until it makes a right angle with the cone. Into the cone pour water very gently and carefully, so that it will pass out of the small end against the side of the glass and thence down on to the surface of the coffee.

Make another cone and through it pour a little claret wine, then through a fresh cone a little salad oil and through another fresh cone a little alcohol, making the depth of each liquid the same as that of the coffee and being careful to let them pour from the small end of the cone against the side of the glass and not directly down on the liquid already in the glass.

Thus you will have five layers of liquid in the glass—brown, white, red, yellow and white—and by pouring them carefully, as has been directed, they will remain separate from each other simply because their specific gravity is different.

A Loving Daughter.

The Sugar Factory.

There was much doing last Monday toward the new sugar factory. Besides Mr. Gilbert, who contracted for 1,000 acres of beets. Mr. Welch, the promoter, was also at East Tawas, and expressed himself well pleased with the prospects, the 4,000 acre mark having been reached on that day. He assured the citizens that he would return to Detroit and at once complete the organization of the company, and it appears now that work will be begun within a few weeks at the erection of the factory.

Our farmers should remember, however, that the remaining 1,000 acres of beets must be contracted for, and this must be done at once. The acreage is the only thing now required and if such a thing as failure now occurs it will be the fault of no one but the farmer. We hope that every reader of the Herald who has a farm will subscribe every acre possible to aid the enterprise. If you can see any possible way to increase what you have already contracted for do so at once. It will be good money for you in the end. Let all put their shoulder to the beet cart and push.

A Big Contract.

The acreage for the Tawas Sugar Company received a big boost last Monday, when W. H. Gilbert, of Bay City contracted to raise 1,000 acres of beets. Mr. Gilbert is the largest grower of sugar beets in Michigan, having raised 1,900 acres of beets this year for different Michigan factories. He was brought here by our citizens, and on Monday leased 1,000 acres of land of C. H. Prescott & Sons, situated near Prescott village, and signed a contract to raise beets for the factory to be erected here. He has engaged Thomas Davison, as superintendent and instructed him to proceed at once to plow the land. Mr. Davison wants 30 teams to begin work next Monday, and will pay \$3.00 per day or \$2.00 per acre.

This is the first practical illustration of the benefits to be derived from the location of a sugar factory in our midst, and is but a comparatively small illustration at that.

Col. Loud's Campaign.

Col. George A. Loud, republican candidate for congress is making an active campaign. He is indefatigable and day and night is active in his campaign. He has large meetings everywhere and his speeches are instructive and satisfying. For one new to the stump the tenth district has never before had a speaker so acceptable.

Meetings were held last week at Harrisville, Whittemore, Prescott, Rose City, Pinconning and Petoskey. They were fine meetings, developing the forensic talent of Col. Loud, and showing his capable grasp of public affairs. Edward F. Burns accompanied him and spoke with him at the first four places named above. At Pinconning besides Col. Loud the speakers were Judge Wm. D. Gordon, of Midland; Geo. L. Lusk, of Bay City, and Hon. W. R. Bates, of Flint, who made a great quartet, and the people of Pinconning had a treat.

The meeting at Petoskey was great. Col. Loud and Wm. Alden Smith aroused enthusiasm by their speeches that was very cheering to Col. Loud.

Monday evening Col. Loud and Congressman Smith had a fine meeting at Alpena. Tuesday they were at Bay City where the biggest demonstration of the campaign occurred. In addition to Loud and Congressman Smith, Gen. Alger spoke, and the meeting was further enlivened by Homer Warren and Robert Murray, of Detroit, famous singers, whose "Sword of Bunker Hill" is most inspiring. Col. Loud was inducted a member of Lawton Command, Spanish War Veterans, in recognition of his service as a volunteer officer on the McCulloch at the battle of Manila.

Meetings for the remainder of the week were as follows. Wednesday at Midland with Judge Sharp; Thursday at Coleman with George L. Lusk; Tonight at Gladwin with Devere Hall, and tomorrow at Wolverine with E. F. Burns. Judge Gordon spoke at Cheboygan on Monday to a fine meeting and in his customary captivating style.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

To the Electors of the City of Tawas City: Notice is hereby given that a General Election will be held in the City of Tawas City, Isosco county, Michigan, on TUESDAY, the 4th day of November, A. D. 1902, at which election the following officers will be elected, viz: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Commissioner of the State Land Office, a Member of the State Board of Education for full term, and one to fill vacancy for the term expiring December 31st, 1904; Justice of the Supreme Court to fill vacancy for the term expiring December 31st, 1907; Representative in Congress for the Tenth Congressional district, of which Isosco county is a part, Senator for the 3rd Senatorial district, of which Isosco county is a part; Representative in the State Legislature for the Isosco Representative district, comprising the counties of Alpena, Isosco, Arenac, and Ogemaw.

Also the following county officers, viz: Sheriff, County Clerk, Treasurer, Prosecuting Attorney, Register of Deeds, Circuit Court Commissioner, one Coroner, and two Coroners. You will also vote upon the following proposed amendments to the State Constitution, viz:

1. A proposed amendment to section 35 of Article IV, of the constitution, relative to the publishing of all the General Laws of any session in a newspaper, and the compensation to be received therefor.

2. A proposed amendment to Article IV, of the Constitution, by adding a new section thereto, to stand as section 47, empowering the legislature to enact a law imposing indeterminate sentences as a punishment for crime, and to provide for the parole and return to prison of persons imprisoned on such sentence.

And that in accordance with a special act of the Legislature of 1896, said election will be held at the City Hall, in the third ward, and that the polls for said election will be opened at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be, and shall continue open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon of said 4th day of November, A. D. 1902, and no longer.

YOU are also hereby notified that there will be submitted to popular vote at the General Election to be held in this state on the fourth day of November, nineteen hundred two, proposed amendments to the state constitution, as follows:

1. A proposed amendment to section 35 of Article IV, of the Constitution, relative to the publishing of all the general laws of any session in a newspaper, and the compensation, to be received therefor.
2. A proposed amendment to Article IV, of the constitution, by adding a new section thereto, to stand as section forty-seven, empowering the legislature to enact a law imposing indeterminate sentences as a punishment for crime, and to provide for parole and return to prison of persons imprisoned on such sentence.
