## ASTOUNDING FIGURES

### Cost of Overwhelming Republican Majorities

State Expenses Three Million Dollars a Year More Now—than Under Democratic Rule—Tables Showing Expense of Government from Year to Year.

The Michigan Campaign Book, a copy of which any voter can obtain by sending 25 cents to the Democratic State Committee, at Detroit, contains many convincing proofs of the ruinous effects of the enormous Republican majorities in this state. Official figures from the books of the auditor general show that the burdens upon the people have been increased year by year as increasing Republican majorities have made the men in control of the machine feel more and more secure. One of the tables of official figures shows the entire expense of the state government from year to year. The total expenses of the State government of Michigan for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1902, were \$3,065,143.78 more than for the corresponding fiscal year of 1892, under democratic rule.

It is doubtful if there were a hundred men in Michigan, outside of the State officials themselves, who knew that the annual State expenditures in Michigan have been increased over three millions of dollars a year.

The official reports are cunningly manipulated to make the people believe that the annual tax levies apportioned among the counties show the whole increase. The steady increase of these direct taxes is of itself enormous, but the increase of the burden of direct taxation is only a fraction of the whole increase.

And it must be remembered that every dollar of money expended by the State of Michigan, no matter how, or by what method of taxation it is put in the treasury, is a tax upon the producers.

Dollars do not grow upon bushes. They come out of the pockets of the people, and it makes no difference who gets the receipt for the money, the whole burden of the increased expenditure rests upon the shoulders of the men and women whose brain and muscle create the wealth which is taken from the public treasury.

The human mind cannot comprehend the meaning of three million dollars. But the enormity of the extravagance and corruption shown by the increase of expenditures this year over the expenditures under an honest and economical Democratic administration ten years ago can be partially comprehended by the following facts:

If this increase of expenditure, a single year's extravagance, were invested in wheat at 75 cents a bushel, the entire population of Michigan—men, women and children—could not lift it!

If this enormous increase in yearly expenditures were in bars of solid silver, there is only one county in the State in which there are enough voters to carry that silver to Lansing at a single trip!

Vote for a Democratic legislature and a reduction of state expenses.

### The Ward-Lowrey Bill Vetoed by Gov. Bliss.

In 1893 the Republican legislature repealed the mortgage tax law passed by the Democratic legislature, but in 1901 so great was the demand for the restoration of this law that the legislature re-enacted it in a measure known as the Ward-Lowrey mortgage tax bill. Gov. Bliss vetoed it, and it was openly charged by the newspapers at the time that he did so at the demand of the railroad corporations, who were the principal beneficiaries of the veto.

The railroads are now compelled to pay taxes on practically the same basis as individuals, and therefore the more property they can get placed upon the assessment roll the less will be their percentage of taxes. Gov. Bliss placed this veto solely on that ground.

The injustice of the present system can be shown by an illustration: A man owns a farm paid for worth \$5,000 and he pays taxes on that amount. Now suppose he sells to a man who can pay only \$2,000 down and takes a mortgage back for \$3,000, the purchaser has only a \$2,000 interest but he must pay taxes on the full \$5,000. Then the mortgagee must pay taxes on the \$3,000 mortgage. This is double taxation—\$3,000 in taxes levied upon a \$5,000 farm. But this is not all. The mortgagee will compel the mortgagor to pay the tax direct, or else will compel him to pay it indirectly by increasing the rate of interest. So that the man with only a two thousand dollar interest in the property will be obliged to pay taxes on eight thousand dollars.

Every fair-minded man can see the injustice of the double taxation of property of individuals under the present system, and every such man will vote against the present governor, who, in the interests of the railroads, vetoed the bill which corrected this injustice.

and thus help to place an equitable mortgage tax law on the statutes of Michigan.

### Throw Off the Yoke

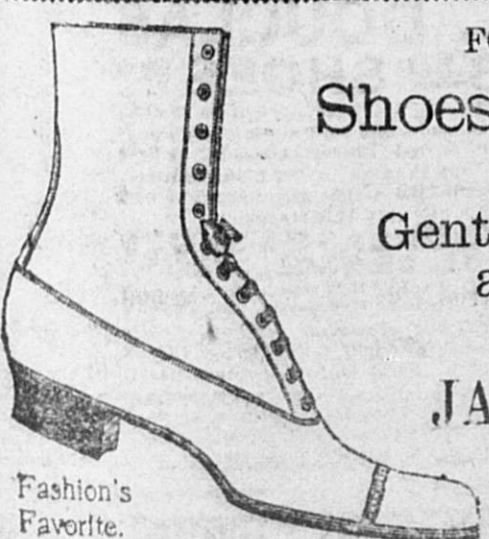

**ROBERT K. POINTER.**  
 Robert K. Pointer the democratic candidate for the office of senator of the 20th district was born forty three years ago on his father's farm in Barton county, Michigan. **CONGRESS.**  
 THE ISSUE of a new treaty with the old one, as well as a number of other matters, are being discussed in the republican caucus at Tawas. The people of the tenth congressional district have important interests to discuss at Washington. Business interests that want every thing to the prosperity of our people. Interests which, in a large degree, are the dependence of many families of well-to-do, of many communities of farmers, and of importance to our mercantile firms.

These business interests whose manifestations affect us all, as interested parties are we on the economical success of the enterprise established among us—have been attacked before in congress, and may be attacked again. We must be vigilant, and we must be strong in their defense.

Considering the republican administration now in power, and ready to be continued, for it is inadvisable that the people of this country will make any change in our system that has so wisely considered national affairs and through the adoption of the republican policy of protection and sound money, has brought the United States to a condition so prosperous that it has become the foremost among nations, and in point of national and individual progress, wealth and freedom, the greatest country in existence, it is inadvisable that this admirable and beneficial policy should be changed. We are to continue the republican policy and the republican administration.

This being so, what weight or importance would attach to a democrat congressman in a house having a republican majority? A democrat in congress would necessarily vote against the administration. He would oppose all its measures. He would be antagonizing at all times. His best endeavors would be to thwart all measures industrial, economic or political, favored by the republican administration.

However able such a democratic representative might be, or however personally agreeable, his political attitude would always place him at a disadvantage. All his propositions would be looked upon as distrust, if not positive disfavor. Such a representative could summon no votes sufficient to pass his propositions—no votes at all except those of the feeble minority to which he owes allegiance. He could accomplish nothing by favor, either in administrative or legislative fields. The lines on such matters are sharply drawn at Washington, and the congressman in opposition is kept out in the cold.

If the business interests of this district wish an effective representative in congress, they must elect a republican congressman. If the working men of this district wish to manifest their power in congress and sustain the admirable policy which has been of such benefit to all, they must elect a republican congressman. Their voices would be stifled if trusted to the utterances of a democrat, impotent as summer thunder which reverberates through the sky but accomplishes nothing on the earth.

Aside from matters of public interest, so material to the community, there are matters of private importance no less vital to the happiness of individuals. Congressmen have been styled the messengers of their constituents. The name suits, for a good part of the daily work of an industrious and capable congressman consists in making the rounds of the many departments of the government, doing the business of individuals. The business put upon him, which he alone, by reason of his official position can perform, is as various as human circumstances. But whatever it may be, whatever influence it may invoke, the offices or the good will of the president, the state, war, navy or treasury department, the post office, the ministry of the interior, agricultural or justice, be its purpose something useful, necessary or desirable to science, art, education, or things more or less sordid in their nature, no matter what that calls for administrative correction or administrative power, it is plain that the congressman who is of the majority, who stands with the administration, will have his demands given attention, his representations complied with, his appeals satisfied. This is the congressman who is persona grata to all the departments and all the officials of the government.

The moral of this is that the people of the tenth district should vote for George A. Loud for congress. They should take pains to do so for their own prospective benefit for the good

of their community, for the welfare of the interests of the district and the general good of the nation. It is worth while to make pains to do this and not neglect to vote because of the thought that there may be votes enough. The one who for the sake of influence or some trifling amount neglects to vote on this issue as vital may hamper the well being of our district.

Come out, friends, as you value our prosperity, our institutions, our freedom. Vote for George A. Loud! Heed that! We will then have a congressman who can do things; a congressman that will do them!

It is of no use to send a man to congress for ornamental purposes, when there is so much to be done to keep things progressing for our public and personal welfare. The best-willed sentiment is at wedal standpoints in a republican congress, and with a republican administration. Therefore elect George A. The Michigan board of corrections and charities calls the attention of the voters of the state to the importance of a full and favorable vote on the amendment to the state constitution as proposed by a joint resolution of the legislature of 1901. The adoption of this resolution will empower the next legislature to enact a law to impose in indeterminate sentences, so called, as a punishment for crime. This law is strongly favored by the most advanced penologists throughout the country, and has already been adopted by several states.

Capt. A. E. Stewart, a former republican candidate for mayor of Detroit, and a recognized leader of one of the former legislatures, declares he will not under any circumstance vote for Aaron T. No, I cannot give you the names of any of the men as that would betray their confidence, but when the time comes they will vote against Bliss, and don't let that worry you. I am for Durand."

## FIGURES JUGGLED

### Misleading Claims of Lower Taxes Exposed

Fixed Appropriations Used to Bolster Up False Pretense of Economy in Department Work at Lansing—Facts For Taxpayers

Deception is not more honorable than theft, and the public officer who stoops to falsehood or misrepresentation to gain or retain the favor of voters is as unworthy their support as though he had taken their money unlawfully.

We charge the Republican administration with attempting to deceive the taxpayers of Michigan by a misleading comparison of the general tax levy for 1902, and with having unnecessarily added the fixed appropriations to gain credit for apparent saving in general purposes.

Extravagance in appropriations for specific funds is not the fault of state officers—the Governor and Legislature are to blame. But extravagance in general expenses, for which a lump sum is asked for each year, is directly chargeable to the heads of the different state departments. TO SECURE MONEY FOR GENERAL EXPENSES EVERY PRETEXT OF SPECIFIC NEED IS FRAUD.

For 1901 the "general purposes" item of the tax levy was \$700,000, for 1902 \$500,000, an apparent saving of \$200,000. In spite of the fact that there would naturally be some increase in the running expenses of the state. There are but two conclusions to arrive at. Either the amount raised last year was unnecessarily high, or by some juggling the taxpayers were to be deceived. THAT THE LATTER IS A FACT IS EASILY PROVEN. The former may also be correct.

### ONE ATTEMPT TO DECEIVE

The copy for the press of the figures of the state tax levy for 1902 was prepared by a state officer, and cunningly gave figures intended to show that the administration had reduced the taxes. Comparison was made with the figures for 1901—a legislative year, one in which our statesmen make us pay a million or so for their time and work—with this hypocritical comment:

"The appropriation of the state tax for 1902 was completed in the office of the Auditor General today. The total levy is \$2,867,206.14. This is \$908,638.82 less than last year's levy and the smallest budget since 1898." Fortunately only hide-bound partisan papers were induced to become parties to the deception, for deception it was pure and simple. The Detroit Tribune called attention to the unfairness of the statement, and published its own comparison, using the non-legislative years of 1893 and 1900—the only "years since 1893" with which it could be made as a basis. Here is the result:

Total levy for 1898.....\$2,158,770 67  
Total levy for 1900.....2,908,680 66  
Total levy for 1902.....2,867,206 14

That is: The state tax levy for 1902 was \$708,435.48 greater than that for the corresponding year of Gov. Pingree's first term, and only \$41,474.51 less than in 1900, a year in which the state had to meet much of the extravagance accompanying the unusual demands created by the Spanish war.

Taxpayers cannot scrutinize this attempt to trap them so closely. The officers guilty of it are candidates for re-election. That they are not amenable to civil law is true; but morally they are as culpable as Gov. White and the rest of the crowd that has been punished for stealing from the state a paltry \$35,000 or \$40,000. The state administration has cost the taxpayers many times this amount.

### FIGURES WERE JUGGLED

To further show the deception intended, here is evidence that figures were juggled: To provide for expenses incurred in fitting out troops for the Spanish war state bonds to the amount of \$500,000 were issued. These had a limit of ten years, but the state had an option of payment after five years, which becomes operative next May. The statute required a mill-tax levied each year to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of these bonds. ANY SURPLUS AFTER THEY WERE PAID TO BE COVERED INTO THE GENERAL FUND OF THE STATE TREASURY. Upon the present appropriation this item amounts annually to nearly \$200,000, and ENOUGH HAS ALREADY BEEN RAISED to pay the bonds and have \$40,000 left to cover into the state treasury.

But this item of taxation was included in the official budget for 1902 as sent out by the Auditor General.

When the Detroit Free Press and the Detroit Tribune refused to publish the unfair comparison of the tax budget sent out, there was a change of heart at Lansing, and 24 hours afterward it was announced that the officers making the appropriation had "decided the levy required by the statute is not mandatory" and because the amount in the sinking fund is sufficient the item for the Spanish war tax is withdrawn. And the administration is putting itself on the back of its watchful care of the poor taxpayer.

A STRANGE COINCIDENCE. These are facts. The reduction asked for general purposes is in amount strikingly like the aggregate of the war tax, which would have gone into the same fund—the false impression conveyed in the first statement of the amount of the levy—the assumption of credit where none was due—the haste to reduce the budget to an appreciable degree below that of 1900 after the Tribune had shown the need—all prove beyond doubt that the Lansing crowd were ready to mislead and deceive.

Let every candid voter consider this matter and decide if it is not time some change should be made.

## Col. Loud's Campaign.

The political campaign is almost at an end. Men who have deferred judgement on the candidates must now decide how they will vote. Good citizens agree that it is well to discriminate between candidates; that it is better to favor manhood than party, when by so doing we gratify our personal preference and render a service to our country. It is the man, after all, who makes his service in office a benefit to the people by reason of his capacity, his honesty and his courage. If the man fails in these things, or if he lacks in other directions, the party that supports him suffers—and the people who demand fidelity, judgement and principle in the administration of public affairs—suffers most. Consider the man always in connection with the office, choose fittingly, and you have done your duty as a good citizen. Especially if you know the man, and approve his merits, vote for him. Thereby you honor your country and strengthen him who you approve. There are bright examples of the devotion of the democracy to their country. Patriotic democrats have always been guided by their in-

dividual judgements rather than by partisan bias. How those democrats in congress, so recently as 1898, voted unanimously measures to provide men and money to give the world a lesson of what was to result from the blowing up of the Maine. You find them in every crisis, these noble and patriotic democrats, branching out from the devious and narrow path of party expediency into the nobler and broader highway of national honor. We are always first for our country, and we correct by our individual judgements matters that we feel are party mistakes. So doing we act in accordance with the highest citizenship. Speaking as an Iosco county democrat I am free to say that I believe that many democrats of this county wish George A. Loud elected and would be glad to help elect him. We know him as the most sympathetic, loyal hearted man, the kindest friend, who has never failed to show his unselfish friendship in all things where his neighbors' necessities may require. This great hearted neighbor of ours is for the first time in his life a candidate for office. He wants to be congressman. We know his capacity to serve us well in that position. We know that he will be untrifling, energetic and successful in laying the claims which any of us may need to present to the president, to congress or any of the departments at Washington. We know

he will be our friend and advocate, we know that his ability, genial manners, his friendly and unselfish way will make him influential in congress and at Washington. Why, then, should not Iosco recognize the merits of her own citizen? Why not endorse by our votes our approval of him as a man and a neighbor? There is an opportunity to say to George Loud—we love you, we respect you, we have confidence in you—and because of this we will vote to show how true we are to our friendship and how high we hold the honor of our community. Fellow democrats of Iosco; let us help to make it almost unanimous for George Loud for congress.
