### COST OF OCEAN SPEEDING.

Much has been said of late regarding the speed of the German Atlantic greyhounds. Not enough, perhaps, has been said regarding the cost of this speed. The latest creation of the North German Lloyd, Kaiser Wilhelm II., is designed to do twenty-four knots an hour at an expenditure of 40,000 indicated horsepower. Our White Star liner Cedric, the largest ship in the world, will go seventeen knots with 14,000 horsepower. But, says the Shipping World, the Kaiser Wilhelm will burn 750 tons of coal per day, which is 190 per cent more than the Cedric, and she will need 256 more hands to work her. Curiously enough, of her crew of 600 only forty-five will be ordinary sailors, the remainder being mechanics of various orders.—London Telegraph.

### Carnegie's London Palace.

Andrew Carnegie is to become one of the nabobs of Park lane, the most fashionable and high priced street in London. He has purchased from the young Duke of Westminster a plot of ground in South street, leading into Park lane, just beyond the handsome house of J. P. Morgan, Jr. It is said the house will be as much like Mr. Carnegie's great mansion in Fifth avenue, in New York, as it is possible for a London house to be and that the cost will be something like \$5,000,000. Mr. Carnegie will have for his immediate neighbors Lord Brassey, the dowager Countess of Rosslyn, Lady Henry Somerset, Alfred Beit, the richest man in England, and Mr. Eckstein and J. B. Robinson, two other South African millionaires.

### Utilizing a Turtle.

Tradition says that the queen of Sheba asked Solomon to thread an intricately pierced stone and that he did so by means of a hair tied to a living worm. A long sewer in an Ohio factory recently became clogged, and a son of Solomon came to the rescue. Tying a long ball of twine to the shell of a mud turtle, he put the animal into the entrance of the sewer and turned on a stream of water. The turtle burrowed his way through the refuse, was "watered on" at each manhole and emerged victorious at the outlet. A rope attached to the twine, a swab and strong arms accomplished the rest swiftly and economically.

### Ballooning For Consumption.

Ballooning is now receiving attention as a possible remedy for pulmonary affections. The conditions are not the same as those of mountaineering, the change of altitude being more rapid and muscular fatigue being absent. In the trips of the French Society of Physiology Dr. Henocque proposes to regard the atmosphere as divided into three zones. Up to about three miles the surrounding air supplies all the oxygen needed, but ascents beyond five miles are held to require a closed car, as was first suggested in 1871, or an aerial diving suit.

### How to Get Into Touch With Nature.

M. Maeterlinck has discovered that the only way to get into touch with nature is to travel at full speed in a motor car, for by this means only do you get into "intimate relations with rivers, fields and trees." One can imagine M. Maeterlinck as the contact with the tree trunk or brook became imminent repeating the old exclamation of the falling steeplejack. Only M. Maeterlinck would say, "Now for the intimate relation." It is a prettier phrase than "the blooming bump."—London Globe.

### Annexing by Assimilation.

More than a hundred thousand Americans have emigrated to Canada within a year. At this rate there will soon be no trouble about the inevitable annexation of the Dominion. Americans will be in the majority and will come into the Union as a matter of course, as chickens come home to roost. Canada now buys from us \$119,000,000 worth of goods annually, three times as much as she imports from what is facetiously called "the mother country."—Town Topics.

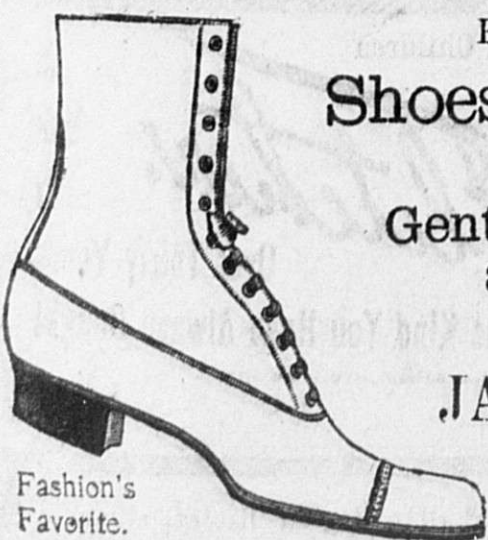

**ELECTION.**

**The Republicans Carry State and County by Large Majorities.**

**Col. George A. Loud will Represent the Tenth District in Congress.**

The general election last Tuesday resulted in a very light vote being polled, even for an "off" year. The state went republican by about 67,000, although Gov. Bliss was badly cut, running 35,000 behind the balance of the ticket.

Hon. L. T. Durand made a phenomenal run for governor. He carried Wayne county by 11,000, the largest majority ever given any candidate for governor in that county.

Alfred Lucking defeated John B. Corliss for congress in the first district by about 3,500. The republicans carried the other eleven districts of the state by good majorities.

Both houses of the state legislature are republican by a big majority, the democrats electing but 13 members.

William C. Maybury was re-elected mayor of Detroit by 1,700.

Col. George A. Loud defeated Hon. M. O'Brien for congressman from the 10th district by a majority of nearly 5,000, carrying every county in the district except Alpena. In Alpena O'Brien over came a republican majority of 600 and won by 204.

**TOSCO COUNTY.**  
Basing the figures on the vote for secretary of state Ioseo county gives a republican majority of 657. Bliss ran behind his ticket not less than 150 but will carry the county by about 490. Loud for congress has a majority of 675. Doherty, for state senator, and McCarthy, member of the legislature, carry the county by a majority of about 595 each.

The candidates on the republican county ticket are all elected by increased majorities over those of two years ago. The total vote of the county is less than 1,600 which is just about 75 per cent of the total vote. The republicans polled within about 200 of their vote of two years ago, while the democrats lack about 350 of polling as many as in 1900.

Johnson, for sheriff, has a majority of 630; Mark, for clerk, 681; Crandall, for register of deeds, 673; Stockman, for treasurer, 464; Jahraus, prosecuting attorney, 528; and the balance of the republican ticket about 650. Rawden, for circuit court commissioner had no opposition and received his party vote.

Below we give the results in the various cities and townships. The official canvass may change some of these slightly.

The vote on the amendments to the constitution was very light, but both will receive a majority in the county.

**TAWAS CITY.**  
The election passed off very quietly in this city with a very light vote being polled, the vote being only 203 as compared with 270 two years ago. There was much cutting on county candidates, the third ward taking the lead. The republican majority on secretary of state was 34. Figuring from this basis, Bliss ran 21 behind his ticket, while Loud ran three ahead. The county ticket was badly cut up as will be seen below. Thomas J. Armstrong made the banner run, overcoming the republican majority of 34 and carrying the city by 39. Below is the vote:

**AU SABLE**  
township polled 120 republican tickets, seven democratic ticket, on secretary of state. Bliss received 115 and Durand 17. The returns show 130 votes for Loud, for congress, and none for O'Brien. For state senator and member of the legislature the republicans received 120 and the democrats 7. The majorities for the republican county ticket was as follows: Johnson, 118; Mark, 112; Crandall, 112; Jahraus, 103; Stockman, 122.

When she had twelve of these droll little mirrors, her work was done, and she was surprised to find that it was only play after all.—Philadelphia Ledger.

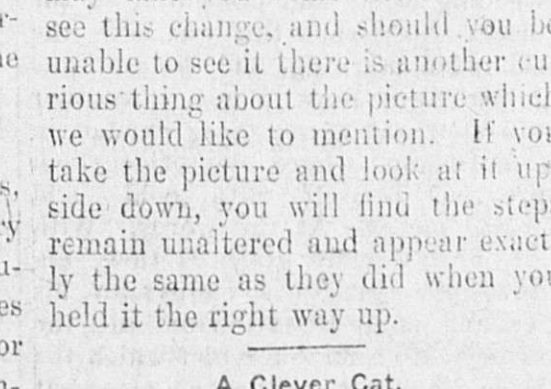
**Honest Little Dick.**

HINTS FOR FARMERS

Pigs and Milk.

The question often arises, Would it not be more profitable to buy pigs than to raise them? It would be decidedly an advantage if the supply could be filled with any kind of certainty and of a quality that would give full compensation for labor and feed and the risk of buying infectious diseases could be eliminated.

Willow Growing.

One of the nicest little side issues possible to a farmer who has a small stream running through his place is willow growing. There is a constant and if anything increasing demand for basket willows, and in many locations the bushes can be grown with little or no expense or trouble.

The department of agriculture some years ago published a short pamphlet describing the best methods of raising willows and the conditions under which they produce the highest priced reeds. Willows will grow readily wherever the ground is at all moist.

Storing Apples.

Apples should be stored in a cool, dry place, says C. B. Barrett. Warmth and moisture cause fermentation and decay. If possible, separate the over-ripe ones from those gathered before the ripening process was completed before putting up for the winter.

The Hay Press.

The farmer who has more hay than barn room will find it a good investment to have a hay press, that he may put it into smaller bulk, so that there will be room for it in the barn instead of stacking it out of doors.

A Pioneer in Orchard Spraying.

When the time comes for erecting a monument to the pioneers in orchard spraying, Mrs. Mary Deering of Orleans county, N. Y., must not be forgotten. This lady bought a full outfit over ten years ago and gave an object lesson to many of her neighbors.

Farmers Won.

An interesting suit was recently settled in the Maryland courts sustaining the pure fertilizer law. A firm sued several farmers because the latter refused to pay for fertilizer that had fallen 20 per cent below the guaranteed analysis.
