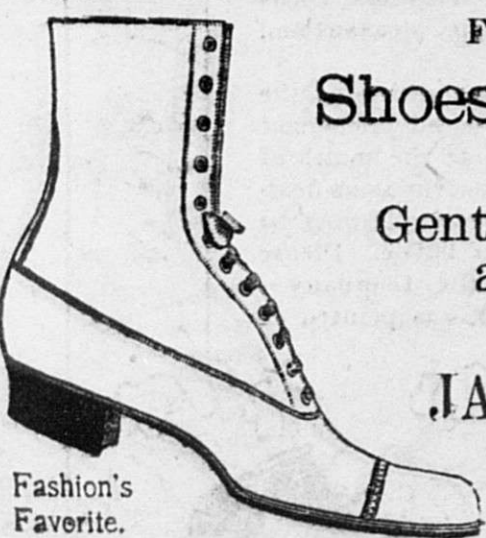

These bricks cannot explode and can be made to sell at \$5 or \$6 a ton, each ton containing the calorific energy of two or three tons of coal.

The proceedings of yesterday's meeting were at this time read by the clerk and there being no objection they were declared by the chairman unanimously approved.

The clerk read to the board the report of the inspectors of jails, signed by Alfred R. Weir, probate judge; Thomas Davison and Thomas Galbraith, supts. of the poor.

Moved and supported that report be accepted and placed on file. Carried by unanimous vote.

To the Hon. Board of Supervisors of Iosco Co.: GENTLEMEN—The county road commissioners of the county of Iosco respectfully submit the following as their annual report:

On November 9, 1901, the board met and on motion decided to purchase of the Austin & Western Co., Ltd., suitable road machinery consisting of one roller, one wheel scraper and one grader. On June 18, 1902, the machinery was received and after a careful inspection was accepted at the following prices: 3½ ton roller at \$880.; road grader at \$1,250. The scraper being donated by agent Jno. Preston.

On June 23, 1902, the board met and advertised for tenders to build and paint a bridge 245 feet long over the east branch of Anselme river, on line of Whittemore and Tawas county road. On July 23 following the bids were opened and contract awarded to Jno. Mooney, he being the lowest bidder at \$900. The bridge was completed and accepted Sept. 27, being 251 feet long—9 feet longer than contract called for, without extra charge.

On July 1 a contract was given Alfred H. Wiltzie to build 1 mile of the Whittemore and Tawas county road from his present terminus to approach of bridge over east branch of Anselme river. Said piece of road was under process of construction at last meeting of this board. That part of the road built last year has been thoroughly repaired and is now in first-class shape

for travel. The road has been underbrushed and logged out to Arn station.

James A. Perry of An Sable was nominated. There being no further nominations, it was moved and supported that the rules be suspended and that James A. Perry be elected by acclamation. Motion prevailed, whereupon the chairman declared James A. Perry elected county canvasser for the term of two years.

Benjamin F. Oakes of East Tawas was nominated. There being no further nominations, it was moved and supported that the rules be suspended, and that Benjamin F. Oakes be elected by acclamation. Motion prevailed, whereupon the chairman declared Benjamin F. Oakes elected county canvasser for the term of 2 years.

George C. Anschutz of Tawas township was nominated. There being no further nominations, it was moved and supported that the rules be suspended and that George C. Anschutz be elected by acclamation.—Motion prevailed, whereupon the chairman declared George C. Anschutz elected county canvasser for the term of 2 years.

At 3 p. m. the special order of business, viz: the election of a county school examiner, came up. The chair appointed supvs. Warren, Venners and Wiltzie as tellers.

Wm. Hartley of Reno township, and Archie A. Ellsworth were nominated, and the Board proceeded to ballot: Total number of votes cast, 23; of which Wm. H. Hartley received 13, and A. Ellsworth received 10. Wm. H. Hartley having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared elected.
