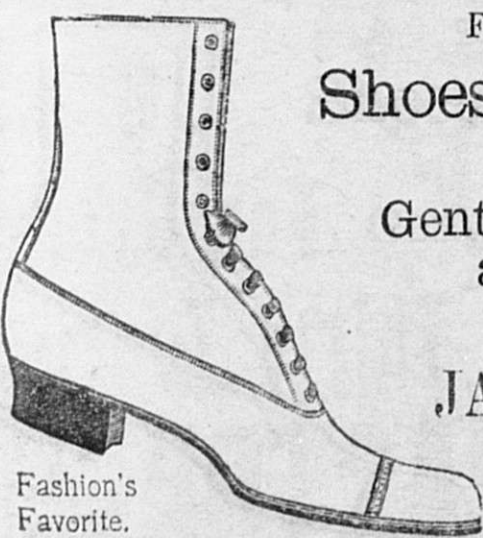

#### Army Officers in Demand.

The annual report of General J. C. Breckenridge, inspector general of the army, is a voluminous document and covers every phase of the military establishment and each department, bureau and command in the army. It contains more than fifty recommendations and suggestions relating to improvements in the army, most of which pertain to technical matters and minor conditions. Much of the report necessarily has been covered in reports of chiefs and commanding officers. Gen. Breckenridge finds much to commend in all branches of the service and reports progress and improvement everywhere.

The most serious criticism is in regard to absenteeism, where officers are on detached duty, leaving their regiments short of officers. In the Philippines especially, it is found that many companies are without captains and the companies in command of new and untried officers. He attributes this to lack of officers in the service to fill the details and detached assignments.

Gen. Breckenridge shows that instruction in the army is progressing satisfactorily. He recommends the fortification of Pearl harbor in the Hawaiian islands as a strategic point. He says that water transportation in the army is fast assuming stable and economical methods.

#### Beet Tops For Cattle.

L. S. Boutell, of Bay City, who has become interested in experiments regarding the use of by-products of sugar beets, has placed 200 cattle on a farm near Millett, in Eaton county, and will ascertain the result from allowing them to eat the beet tops. Very little attention has been paid to this part of the beet, but from observation it has been ascertained that both cattle and sheep prefer the tops to any other kind of green food that they can get. Cattle that are put in a field, as these with which Mr. Boutell is making his experiment, eat nothing but the tops, although the next field, to which they have free access, contains good pasturage.

An analysis has shown that the beet tops have about the same food value as clover hay, so far as the fattening qualities are concerned and both cattle and sheep like the new food very much.

Farmers in this vicinity have paid little attention to the disposal of the beet tops, except to use them as fertilizer. If this experiment proves the success that is anticipated beet growers will have one more source of revenue from the sugar beet.—*Caro Journal.*

#### New Two-Cent Stamp.

For the first time since 1869 the postoffice department, with the insurance of the new series of stamps now in preparation, will make use of the American flag in one of its designs. This will be a part of the two-cent stamp, which will bear little resemblance to the one now current. The familiar portrait of Washington, so well known to the stamp-using public, was drawn from Hodon's profile cast and will be succeeded by a photograph taken from Gilbert Stuart's famous painting.

Stamp experts think that this new 2 cent stamp, with its superb likeness of Washington, its draped flags, its wreaths of laurel leaves in the lower corners, and the general balance of text and artistic effect, together with the remarkable excellence of the mechanical work, will make this the finest postage stamp ever produced.
