### Supervisors' Proceedings.

Continued from Last Week.

Saturday, Oct. 18, 1902.

The board of supervisors of Iosco county met in annual session in the court house in the city of Tawas City, said county, on Saturday, Oct. 18, 1902, pursuant to adjournment from yesterday. The board was called to order by chairman Geo. Sutherland, who ordered the clerk to call the roll.

Present—Supervisors Brown, Ely, Gardner, Jackson, Karis, King, McAnisland, McDonald, MacFarlane, McLeod, Patterson, Ramage, Rawden, Stockman, Searles, Venners, Sutherland, Warren, Waterbury, West, Wiltzie, Wood—22. Quorum present.

The minutes of yesterday's session were at this time read by the clerk and there being no objection they were declared by the chairman unanimously approved.

The matter of the Wenona Salt & Lumber Co. taxes came up for discussion.

Moved by MacFarlane supported by Karis that matter be referred to committee on judiciary. Carried.

Moved by Waterbury supported by Patterson as an amendment that matter be laid on the table. Carried by unanimous vote.

Moved by Patterson supported by West that Pros Atty be instructed to proceed against all parties whose delinquent taxes have been paid by the county, whom he thinks are liable and able to pay for same. Carried. Yeas 21; nays 0.

Moved by Patterson supported by Ramage that the committee be allowed \$1.00 per day and 10 cts mileage when meeting to discharge their duties. Carried. Yeas 20; nays 0.

WHEREAS, it having come to the knowledge of this board that there is an apparent delinquency in the matter of tax collection from the Wenona Salt & Lumber Co. of Tawas City, Mich., on the part of county treasurer Robert Blum; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the prosecuting attorney be and is hereby instructed to investigate such delinquency, and if found to exist that he bring action to recover the amount found to be due.

Moved by Waterbury supported by Searles that above resolution be adopted. Carried. Yeas 20; nays 0.

Com. on Finance from the H M Loud's Sons Co in regard to a rebate of taxes was read to the board, and on motion was referred to committee on judiciary by unanimous vote.

Bill of Dr. Thompson, expert testimony in justice court, amount \$10.00, was presented to board. Moved by Karis supported by Searles that bill be allowed in full. Carried. Yeas 18; Nays—Brown and Wood—2.

Moved by Karis supported by Waterbury that we transfer \$2,000 from general fund to poor fund. Carried. Yeas 17; Nays—Jackson and Wood—2.

Moved by Brown supported by McDonald that this board adjourn at 2 o'clock until 9 o'clock, standard time, Monday morning, the 29th. Lost. Yeas 15; nays 11.

On motion board took a recess until 12:30 p.m. standard time.

**IT IS ASSURED!**

**The Erection of Tawas Sugar Company's Plant to Be Commenced at Once.**

**The Company Is Practically Organized and Stock Subscribed.**

WORTHY L. CHURCHILL, OF BAY CITY, WILL BE PRESIDENT OF THE COMPANY.

The Tawas had plenty to be thankful for yesterday, as the committee which has been investigating the agricultural resources of this locality for the past week, met the capitalists interested in the new sugar company at the Holland hotel, Wednesday afternoon and made the most satisfactory report, and the organization of the company was at once commenced, and before another issue of the Herald reaches our readers will be completed, and the contracts for the building of the factory will have been let.

The company is capitalized at \$500,000.00, all of which has been subscribed—\$100,000.00 of the amount having been taken by local capitalists. An assessment of 15 per cent of the stock has been called to be paid by next Monday, December 1, at which time the articles of association will be filed with the secretary of state.

The directors of the company will be W. L. Churchill, of Bay City, C. B. Warren and C. Bewick, of Detroit, G. A. Prescott, of this city, C. W. Luce, of East Tawas, E. F. Loud, of An Sable, H. D. Churchill, of Alpena. W. L. Churchill will be president and general manager, while Mr. Welch, who has acted as promoter of the company, will be secretary and resident manager.

At their meeting Wednesday the stockholders voted to begin building at once, and instructed Mr. Churchill to make contracts forthwith. Bids for the construction of the plant had already been received and the work will be under way within a few days.

Next week we will give our readers a more extensive write-up of the industry which means much for the future prosperity of our county. The company want contracts for 3,000 acres more of beets than they now have, and those who have been backward about contracting because of their doubts as to the erection of the plant should come forward at once and make liberal contracts.

**Conference of Health Officials.**

The sixth general conference of the health officers in Michigan will be held at the State Laboratory of Hygiene, in Ann Arbor, on Thursday and Friday, January 15 and 16, 1903.

The objects of the conference are: The presentation of facts, and the general comparison of views, on subjects relating to public-health work, by the health officers and other delegates of local boards of health among themselves, and with the members of the state board of health.

This will not be a medical convention; it is for all health officers and delegates, professional and non-professional. It is hoped that all phases of public-health work will be dealt with by persons actually engaged in the work, and propositions discussed which will be to the advantage of every community represented.

The conference of health officials is held for the benefit of every locality in Michigan. It is hoped that many localities may have delegates there, thus securing the most direct benefits. Every state and local officer will probably learn much that will enable him to do better service in guarding the public health.

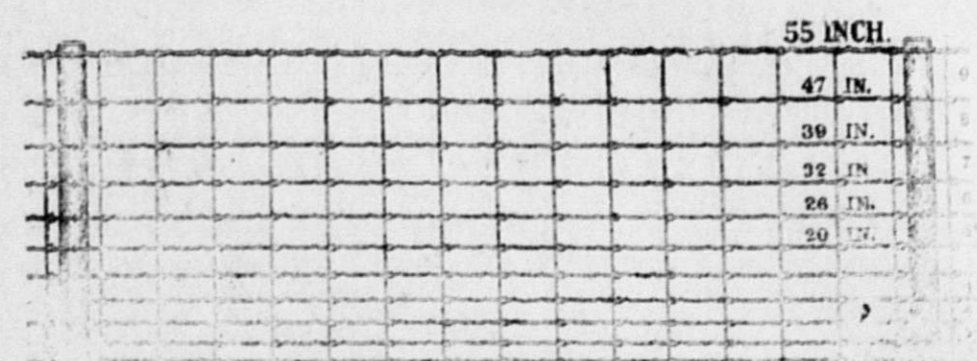

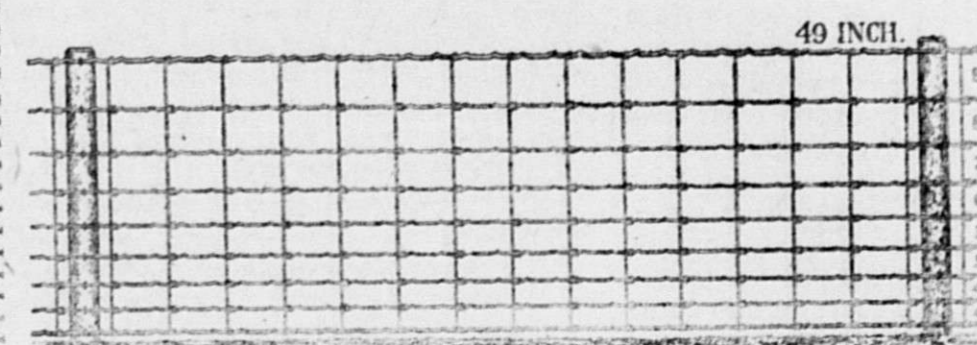

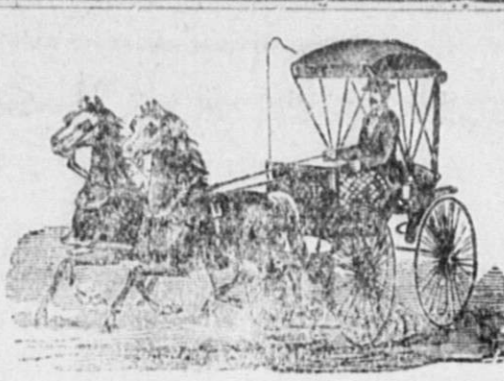

### Correct.

It is evident the purpose of the aldermen to pass an ordinance—according to the official proceedings published in the News—prohibiting the indiscriminate distribution of patent medicine samples from house to house. One of the provisions of the proposed ordinance will be a section requiring that all samples to be distributed shall be submitted to the health board and health officer for inspection, and the distribution shall not be permitted if the board of health and health officer decide it to be detrimental or dangerous in its possibilities. During the past half year several deaths—the result of eating patent medicine samples—have been recorded by Michigan newspapers—the number of children who have been dangerously ill as the result of eating patent medicine samples is appalling. Patent medicines have a place in the world—and oftentimes are beneficial—but they have no places on porches or in yards where they pass into the possession of children. The proposed ordinance should be strict in its provisions and it should be enforced impartially and all the time.—Cadillac News.
