Rural Free Delivery.

The officials of the postoffice department look forward now to the extension of rural free delivery throughout the United States. They have made their estimates as to what it would cost to deliver letters on every American farm or plantation in sparsely settled or thickly settled parts of the country. The cost will not be trifling. To deliver every rural American his mail will take about \$24,000,000 a year.

Should the present service be extended at the rate of 12,000 routes a year until the 700,000 square miles of territory yet to be covered have been taken care of, there will be for several years an annual deficit in postal revenues of from \$8,000,000 to \$10,000,000. The deficit will, it is asserted, disappear gradually, as the revenues increase by the reason of the improved postal facilities.

There is no doubt whatever, but that when the letter carriers make their trips to every farmer's gate the bulk of the mail to this class will increase and that very rapidly. The farmers will make much more extensive use of the mails than they do now, and in turn the revenues of the department will expand as they have whenever better facilities have been provided. Even if the deficit were not to be taken up the general welfare of the farmers would be promoted by the expenditure, which brings the farmers of the country in closer touch with the busy world, from which many of them have been removed.

Appropriations for 1904.

The secretary of the treasury Monday transmitted to congress estimates of the appropriations required for the government service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1904, as furnished by the heads of the several executive departments. The total appropriations asked for are \$585,189,112, which is \$21,638,576 less than the estimates for 1903 and \$33,050,014 less than the appropriations for that year.

Following are the four largest department estimates: Treasury, \$172,313,530; war, \$130,986,600; navy, \$84,725,800; interior, \$163,018,620.

The Scholtz Trial.
The regular December term of circuit court convened Monday, with Judge Main J. Conine presiding.

R. N. Weishuhn plead guilty to violating the liquor law, and was fined \$100.00, or five months in the county jail. He paid his fine.

C. J. McDonald plead guilty to a like charge and was fined \$30, or 30 days in jail. Fine paid.

Isaac Muncy charged with violation of the game law pleaded guilty and was fined \$40.00 or 60 days in jail. The fine was paid.

Monday afternoon the trial of Ernest Scholtz, on the charge of murdering his wife in this city on September 28 last, was begun. John E. Simonson, of Bay City, appeared as attorney for defense, and Prosecuting Attorney Jahraus for the people.

The regular panel of jurymen was exhausted and an extra panel of 25 drawn, besides nine talesmen before a jury was secured. The following were finally selected: Mike Lynch, Justus Rogers, Thomas Tate, Vernon Peltier of Au Sable, Noah Herringar, H. E. Martyn, of Oscoda, A. R. Griffin, William Allen, William Searlett, of Grant, Raudo Allen, Herbert Londo, of Plainfield, and John Robinson, of Alabaster.

The taking of testimony was commenced Tuesday afternoon, and has continued since. The principle testimony has been in reference to the statements made Mrs. Scholtz accusing Scholtz of the crime.

Dr. Clark, an expert chemist, of Detroit, was on the stand yesterday afternoon and testified as to the examination of certain articles, including some of Scholtz's clothing, which was supposed to have blood spots on them. He failed to find any blood stains on the clothing of Scholtz.

Much interest is manifested in the trial and at each session of the court the room is crowded to its utmost capacity.

The trial will undoubtedly last until the middle of next week.

A Visit From The State Pardon Board.

The State Board of Pardons, consisting of Judge R. R. Pealer, of Three Rivers; G. S. Giddings, of St. Johns; Judge Kendrick, of Saginaw; F. M. Schumway, of Williamson, and W. E. Reardon, of Jackson, were in session at the Holland Wednesday, taking testimony in the matter of petition for pardons for Jacob Katterman and William Reynolds, who are serving life sentences at Jackson, for the Scholtz, which occurred in 1884. The general feeling here is that the men should be pardoned and favorable action of the board is hoped for.

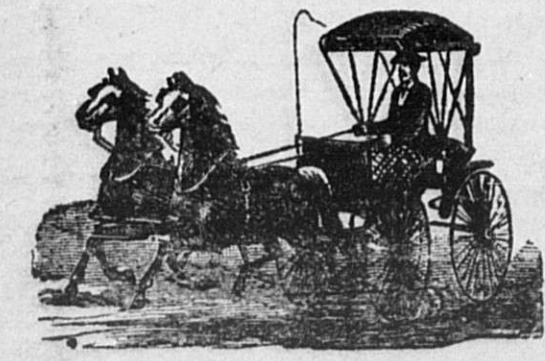

State Association of Live Stock Breeders.

The annual meeting of the State Association of Breeders of Improved Live Stock is set for Tuesday and Wednesday, December 16 and 17, in Detroit. The headquarters of the association will be at the Griswold house, where rooms for the various breed meetings will be furnished. It is proposed to have all the latter meeting closed up on Tuesday, so the entire day of Wednesday can be given up to the combined meeting. The program being arranged for this meeting will be of the most practical description, the various topics discussed being opened by experienced men.

This state was the first to start such meetings, where those interested in the various breeds first met and attended to matters pertaining to their special breed, and then met in general convention to discuss questions of interest to those engaged in the breeding of all kinds of improved live stock. The result was very satisfactory, and had much to do with broadening the view-point of breeders generally, and disseminating information regarding the history and characteristics of all the improved breeds. Other states have followed Michigan's lead in this matter, especially New York, Illinois and Ohio, and are showing a larger attendance and more general interest than is apparent in this state.

It should be remembered that everyone interested in improved stock; although they may not own a single head, are cordially welcomed to these meetings, and that the young farmer who is seeking for knowledge in this direction can get the advice and experience of veterans in the business by attending them. The breeder, the feeder, and the general farmer can get a great deal of good out of these meetings if they will attend them and take part in the discussion, if it is only to ask questions. We should have a thousand people at these meetings, and every one possible should make it a point to be in attendance.
