Rev. Fr. Kinney returned from
Gr. Rapids last Saturday, after a weeks
visit with relatives. His sister, Miss
Blanche, accompanied him home and

The board of state canvassers has
completed the canvass of the vote cast
at the recent election. According to
figures given, Gov. Bliss' plurality
was 37,184, and that of Fred M. War-
ner, for secretary of state, 75,228,
showing that Bliss ran behind his
ticket about 38,000.

The Bank of Cheboygan is the name
of a banking institution which will
begin business in that city January 1.
The bank is capitalized at \$50,000.00,
a majority of the stock is held by
Cheboygan capitalists. F. F. French,
of Detroit, formerly of East Tawas,
has \$10,000 worth of stock, and will
have charge of the business.

The official figures given out by the
state tax commission show that the
total aggregate of the property of the
different railroads in Michigan is
placed at \$208,212,500. The tax go-
ing into the state treasury out of the
pockets of the different railroads will
thus be \$2,850,231.22, provided the
figures of the tax commission stand.
This tax is twice as large as under the
old system.

Some three or four weeks ago a dis-
patch from Lansing to the daily papers,
stated that an investigation of the
state factory inspectors, among the
women employed in the silk factories
at Belding, this state, demonstrated
that the health of 50 per cent of them
were injured by the employment, and
that this was 25 per cent higher than
that of any other industry. The Belding
Star of Nov. 27, in commenting on
the dispatch, brings out the fact that
it contains no truth and that the health
of the women employed is above the
average. It substantiates it claim by
the statements of five reputable physi-
cians, including Dr. Bell, president
of the state board of registration in
medicine. Belding Bros. & Co., the
owners of the factory feel that much
injustice has been done them, when
the facts are that no more healthy or
pleasant employment is offered to
women.

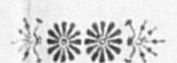
